It's specialist showtime

As the exhibition season reaches its peak it's all a little confusing.

At one extreme we have very

successful and well established shows such as Hillhead deciding that this year is too hard, postponing the event until next year; SED went ahead in a greatly reduced mode with most of the 'bolt on' sectors such as recycling and access giving it a miss and then we had Intermat where it was almost business as usual although attendance was down around 10-15 percent.

It would appear that the economic crunch may well have finally polarised companies' views on shows and it seems the ayes are with either the specialist shows or the mega annual show. For our sector this means Bauma, Conexpo and Intermat (yes, I think that it still has a valid place in the three year, global show cycle).

That leaves the specialist shows. At the same time as SED there was the Safety & Health Expo at the NEC. Only the first time I have been to this but I was impressed with the vitality, attendance and positive buzz. Cranes&Access' own Vertikal Days - solely aimed at the cranes, access and lifting sector - is now in its third year and despite the current climate, 2009 has more exhibitors than ever before. With about 60 access manufacturers represented it looks set to be the biggest access equipment show yet in the UK (not forgetting the 30 or so crane and numerous other affiliated companies attending).

But why are the specialist shows doing so well?

Companies may finally be realising that the general equipment exhibition attracts customers after 'general equipment' and for visitors it is easier and better to have a show where every exhibitor is of interest? For the exhibitors the returns are better at a show that may be smaller, may have less visitors but where every visitor is a potential customer.

If you haven't yet been to Vertikal Days at Haydock Park it is well worth making the effort. A full show guide - including information on exhibitors, seminars and meetings - is included in this issue as well as a run-down of all the World, European and UK launches - and there are quite a few.

Yes there is a global recession, but an enormous amount of business is still being done. And the best way to get more business is to meet more companies in your sector and the specialist show is probably the most cost effective way of doing it.

See you at the end of June - oh and bring an umbrella. After all, it is England in the summer!

WD Bennett fails and re-emerges

UK tower crane company WD Bennett Plant and Services was placed into administration in early May following a difficult trading period and having lost a major accident lawsuit. The Sharpness, Gloucestershire-based company was ultimately owned by Edward and Karen Seager and ran a fleet of 121 tower cranes.

The company had implemented a rapid fleet renewal programme, in response to the increased focus on tower crane safety. However with the recent downturn and law suit, had no choice but to seek protection under the UK bankruptcy rules.

However the company's owners did a 'Pre-Pack' arrangement forming Bennetts Cranes Ltd which then purchased 18 cranes from the Administrator, along with the debtors and the goodwill. He has also purchased a further 24 cranes from various finance companies and will continue the Bennett business from the same premises with the same staff. Seager essentially paid £534,149 for the business, most of which was financed by Lloyds TSB Corporate Finance, the main preferred creditor of WD Bennetts. The purchase price was made up of the encumbered asset value of £458,749, £74,496 of other assets plus £1 for each of the following: customer lists, existing contracts, goodwill and intellectual property rights. Seager provided Lloyds with personal guarantees of £175,000 in order to secure the funding.

Ainscough's first big crawler crane goes to work

The first of Ainscough's big crawler cranes, a Terex Demag CC2500 ordered last August, has started its first job, a long term project in the UK. The crane was originally scheduled for delivery later this year. The 500 tonne CC2500, one of two on order, is understood to be signed up for a job in the London area. Since announcing its first purchases in August 2008 the company has been on a £20 million plus spending spree and has added a 1,250 tonne CC6800 for delivery next year, two 600 tonne CC2800-1, the first of which is also on its way and a 600 tonne Liebherr LR1600/2 for delivery towards the end of this year.



First **Youngman Boss X3** delivered

The first batch of Youngman Boss X3 push around scissor lifts have been delivered to London Tower Services (LTS).

Teupen founder Alfons Thihatmer has acquired a majority stake in Teupen Hungaria which recently launched the Traklift brand. The company, established in 1995, was equally owned by Thihatmer, a colleague and the Fekete family which in spite of owning just 33.3 percent of the shares had a controlling veto.


Teupen Hungaria built the smaller trailer and track mounted spider lifts for Teupen which it sold under the Teupen brand. Teupen Hungaria did much of the design work on the machines it built incorporating Teupen patents into those designs. It began building up its own distribution network with the Traklift name after Nord Holding acquired a majority stake in Teupen last year. This triggered a

legal battle which appeared to be going in favour of the Feketes. However following the recent buy-out, all sales of Teupen Hungaria products under the Traklift banner have been suspended and the future of the marque is still uncertain.



PB Liftechnik, the German-based heavy duty and narrow aisle scissor lift manufacturer, has appointed Ranger Equipment, which also trades as The Spiderlift Company, as its distributor for the UK and Ireland. The two companies will formally launch their partnership at Vertikal Days later this month. Ranger Equipment has expanded rapidly in recent years and was recently appointed as the UK distributor for Aichi booms and scissor lifts. The company also handles Teupen tracked, trailer and truck mounted lifts and Dinolift trailer and self propelled lifts.

The Spider Lift Company offers the larger and more unusual products for re-rent, and it is possible that it will add a few PB lifts to the fleet in order to help it establish the PB brand in the UK.



PB will be distributed by Ranger Equipment.

Access Rentals in administration

One of the UK's largest aerial lift rental companies, Access Rentals, has filed for administration, appointing KPMG to restructure the business. The business which is/was largely owned by Keith Kendall had piled up debts and fallen out with at least one of its largest creditors.

Alex Lee, the recently appointed managing director left the company in May, although he continues to manage Access Rentals Scotland, in which he has a financial stake and which is not affected by the administration of the English business. At time of going to press Kendall was attempting to obtain the agreement of the finance companies that fund the fleet to acquire the business. However KPMG had given manufacturer Haulotte a period of exclusivity to acquire the business as a going concern.

Elavation acquires Safeline

Elavation, the Milton Keynes-based powered access rental company has acquired the powered access rental division of Safeline Access Solutions, also based in Milton Keynes, for an undisclosed sum. Safeline, which sells and rents the Latchway Mansafe safety system, developed its powered access division to compliment the products it provided to its petro-chemical and industrial power client base, but has now decided to focus its efforts on its core business while Elavation will supply the powered access.

Stuart McClurg, managing director of Safeline said: "The synergy between both businesses made the acquisition a seamless fit. Elavation shares the same core commitments to service and quality that we built our business on. This move will allow us to develop our core business at a time when there is huge innovation and growth in our industry."

Mani Gonzalez of Elavation added: "This is a fantastic opportunity for Elavation to develop its business into this notoriously difficult marketplace, with an existing customer base and innovative machines that command premium rates.



Genie is centralising its European regional distribution in the Netherlands.

New European distribution centre for **Genie**

Terex AWP/Genie, has announced a restructuring of its European distribution organisation, centralising all logistics and distribution functions for new products and replacement parts into a dedicated logistics centre in Roosendaal, the Netherlands.

The new operation will offer same day shipping for most machines and replacement parts and includes a paint shop offering custom livery options and a workshop for pre-delivery inspections and the fitting of options and accessories. The new operation opened for parts business on June 2nd and is expected to be fully operational by the end of November.

Genie customer support centres in France, Germany, Spain, Sweden, and the UK will remain as the main commercial bases for those markets and will continue to include product

support staff focused on the local market. In the UK, the Grantham location will include the refurbishment, used equipment, parts fabrication, service and training centres, while the Dubai facility includes a local spare parts operation for fast moving items.

The new facility - managed by Howard Wilkinson - will also become the base for Dutch-based sales and support staff, and will include around 30 Genie staff responsible for whole goods and parts inventories for all Genie aerial lifts, telehandlers and Terex lighting towers. Customers will have the option of accessing the new facility via the web, for parts orders or local toll free numbers. They can also continue to call their local Genie service centres. Some jobs will be lost at the local centres, while new jobs will be created in Roosendaal.

Tadano confirms Knecht appointment

Tadano has confirmed that Alexander Knecht, previously chairman of Terex Cranes, has joined the company, succeeding Masaharu Nakanishi as president and chief executive of the Tadano Faun Group. He has also joined the board of Tadano, Japan as director/executive officer.

Knecht will be joined by Minoru Sakuta as vice president Faun GmbH who returns to the German business after seven years in Japan, and Satoru Oyashiki heavily involved in the acquisition of Faun in the



early 1990's - who becomes president of Tadano Faun GmbH, the sales, marketing and service organisation. Oyashiki replaces Shinichi limura, who returned to Tadano Japan as director in charge of overseas sales operations.

GGR on air

Unic mini crane master distributor GGR has launched Airlift, the world's first fully ATEX certified Zone 1 compliant series of compressed air powered spider cranes.

Developed primarily for the petrochemical, offshore and underground controlled sectors, the six model AL series of spider cranes have been engineered for working in Zone 1 and Zone 2 environments.

The EU ATEX 94 (Atmospheres EXplosibles) Equipment Directive came into effect in the UK in March 1996 and required the classification of working areas into zones where hazardous explosive atmospheres may exist and prohibits the use of petrol or gas engines.

The six model range spans from the AL529 - 2.9 tonne capacity to 8.8 metres maximum height - to the AL660 with a six tonne capacity and 19.5 metre lifting height. All cranes offer light weight, small footprint, low point loadings and ease of installation with their compact dimensions ideal for working in confined spaces and areas with restricted access.

Van Riel takes first GCK

Dutch-based crane rental company MJ Van Riel has ordered the first Grove GCK3045 city crane. The company - which operates from three locations in Tilburg, Oss and Eindhoven - already runs the 40 tonne, three axle Terex Demag AC40 City crane and so has experience of this type of crane.

The GCK3045, is a compact 45 tonne, three-axle, single cab unit with classic city 'Nose down' design. Its 34 metre main boom is said to be best in class, while the fact that it requires no extra counterweight and offers asymmetric outrigger settings are significant benefits for work in congested areas. The crane has an optional 6.3 to 10.2 metre 'twist' jib which

attaches through a simple elevation of the boom and then a twist of the jib by the operator before pinning into position. The entire operation is said to be a one-man job and can be done within the crane's 2.55 metre overall width, meaning full boom and iib can be rigged in a narrow street or aisle. The hook block stows automatically for travel. Martin van Riel, CEO and owner said: "I have been running and operating cranes for the past 20 years and this GCK3045 is a perfect crane. The best feature is its size. It is just three metres high so we can get it into all kinds of places. It's also shorter than similar cranes which is another advantage."



New Faun on the Horizon

Horizon Reinforcement & Crane Hire of Falkirk, Scotland has taken delivery of a new Tadano Faun ATF220G-5 from UK distributor Cranes UK. The company runs a fleet of All Terrain, truck mounted and loader cranes as well as providing a full, steel reinforcing supply and service.

The new crane now the largest the company's fleet, will allow it to carry out a significantly wider range of work in the area. The company is owned and managed by the Dougall family.

Isoli to appoint UK dealer

Following discussions at Intermat, Italian specialist truck platforms, breakdown recovery vehicles and military vehicles manufacturer, Isoli is poised to announce Promax Access as its new UK dealer. Promax continues as distributor for the popular Platform Basket and Bil-Jax machines. The plan is to launch the new partnership at Vertikal Days later this month.

Sholz joins Sany

In a move seen by many to underline Sany's crane intentions, Sascha Scholz, previously with Terex Demag's engineering team, has joined Chinese manufacturer Sany as head of R&D - mobile cranes. Sholz will be based at Sany's new facility in Koln Germany.



Jekko unveils new mini crane

Italian crane manufacturer, Jekko will unveil an all new tracked mini crane at Vertikal Days later this month. The new model, its largest to date, is the SPX1040, with a maximum lift capacity of four tonnes and a maximum tip height of 23.5 metres.



The new model is a narrow-aisle, pedestrian

controlled crane although it can pick and carry up to 2.4 tonnes and is available in a variety of configurations. The basic model comes with rubber tracks, a 14.5 metre four section boom and heavy duty 4.8 metre swingaway with optional 2.7 metre stinger extension, which gives it a class leading tip height of 23.5 metres with an offset capability of up to 25 degrees.

The standard counterweight is 700kg, with a 1,000kg option which is normally paired with an optional extendible - 1.45 to 2.05 metre - undercarriage, steel tracks and a shorter, three section, 11 metre boom for maximum 2.4 tonne pick and carry capability. With the narrow fixed chassis and rubber tracks this is reduced to 1,000kg. A load chart will be available for the crane without counterweight, which reduces the GVW to just 5,000kg.

The SPX1040 is equipped with a fully automated rated load limiter and includes automatic monitoring of outrigger configuration and selection of the appropriate load chart. As with larger cranes it also includes an easy to use zone limitation device with automatic cut-out when the crane approaches the restricted area.

So how does it stack up?

The new Jekko fits between the Unic 504/Maeda MC405, the new Unic 547 and the Unic 706 but in some areas competes with the Maeda LC mini crane models, in that with it offers respectable pick & carry duties, particularly with the wider chassis and steel tracks.

The 21 LC 750 replaces Comansa's LC 8952, and says the company, features technical improvements and be much easier to produce.



deck carries the same rating as the main deck and platform width extends virtually to the edge of the machine on the narrow units and to within 100mm on the wider. The specification looks strong and one assumes that the Holland lift structural quality will not be sacrificed. The 32ft narrow model could be a very attractive compromise between the 800mm wide Genie 3232 concept with jacks and more normal 1.2 metre wide 32ft scissor lifts. The official launch of the new range will be at Bauma next year.

SED down but not out

This year's reduced size SED at Rockingham race circuit near Corby struggled to attract anything like its usual visitor numbers, despite the sunny weather. The total of 12,500 attending is almost 50 percent down on its peak in 2005. Traffic problems - which usually haunt the show at this venue were non-existent, obviously helped by the reduced numbers of exhibitors and visitors. Halving the show's physical size also helped to create a 'busy' feel with most exhibitors reasonably upbeat and several reported sales.

With very few cranes, access equipment or telehandlers on display, the show appeared to be returning to its original format general contractor's plant. Those lifting related exhibitors that did attend were reasonably pleased with the results.

Skyking, King's access business, obviously benefited from the lack of competitors at the show as it received a number of enquiries particularly from utilities and local authorities interested in its new Land Rover chassis/Matilsa vehicle mounted boom lift and new Skyking E140TJV telescopic van mount.

NRC had by far the largest crane stand, launching two new models from Link Belt - the 75 tonne HTT-8675CE Truck Terrain and 70 tonne telescopic crawler crane



What a difference a year makes

In our last telehandler feature a year ago we reported on the enormous market expansion, growth of the compact machines and developments within the sector. Companies were claiming record sales and market leadership in almost a 'chest beating' fashion and all was sweetness and light. My, how times have changed. Mark Darwin takes a look at a sector a decimated by the current market conditions. Or is it?

The telehandler sector appears to have gone from boom to bust within six months with sales to the construction sector in several major markets evaporating almost overnight.

Rough estimates suggest that last year around 7,000 telehandlers were sold in the UK. About 3,000 of these were sold into the agriculture sector (which has been growing along with food prices) leaving in the region of 4,000 units going to the construction/industrial sector. The problem for the market-leading manufacturers such as JCB and Manitou, is that the vast majority of these (around 3,000) are employed in the house-building sector which has almost completely dried up. In stark figures this is a 43 percent fall in total sales or more than a 90 percent drop in that sector. However, as always, there is some hope in the form of the remaining

sales. Telehandler manufacturers offering specialist niche products such as higher reach, larger capacity, compact and 360 degree models are fairing quite well, with buyers looking for a telehandler to do a job rather than mass market, rental machines.

It is also apt that we feature self erecting cranes in this issue. Looked at logically, the self erector and telehandler should be in direct competition on low to medium level housing developments. In fact there should be many more self erector and small city tower cranes used in the UK than at present but the main advantage of the telehandler is its vast availability, low rental rate, (even more so at the moment), its ability to place and move materials inside a building and its ease of mobility. Unfortunately for the self erector, its many advantages are all too often dismissed or overlooked by UK

Liebherr has concentrated





contractors content to continue doing things "the way we always do it" or by looking at the low initial outlay rather than the space and productivity benefits. (See self erectors page 32).

Still developing

Despite the global problems, manufacturers have continued to develop and improve their telehandlers and this includes several new entrants finally making it to market. Two relatively new machines trying to gain a foothold in the UK market a year ago were Haulotte and Liebherr. The Liebherr product was never intended or priced to be a big seller, and the company in the UK has concentrated on growing its rental fleet making it available to rental companies on a rehire basis. Haulotte after some initial success with its 14 and 17 metre machines is currently resigned to selling in small numbers and is

consolidating its operations to maximise sales when the market returns.

In the same way as a traffic jam equalises the performance of a supercar and banger - a recession hits all manufacturers - even market leaders. And both market leading telehandler companies - JCB and Manitou - have had their own set of problems recently.

Troubled times

Manitou is going through a sticky time renegotiating the financing of North American telehandler, skid steer and mini excavator manufacturer Gehl that it acquired last September. The purchase, which looked expensive even at the time, is inevitably impacting on the whole company. Manitou had looked long and hard at ways to increase its market share in North America, however the market was already falling in September and has fallen drastically since as

residential and some commercial construction has dried up.
Six months after the purchase, and with a predicted 40 percent fall in revenues, Gehl was in serious trouble and in breach of its bank covenants. The company has currently entered into a forbearance agreement with its lenders while a deal is finalised, avoiding Manitou's threat to seek Chapter 11 protection. It has also repaid a portion of the outstanding credit line using cash generated from operations.

The collapse of the housing market in both the USA and UK has presented JCB with its own problems and it has made several sizeable headcount reductions in the UK as it slashed output. The company said that production in the first quarter of 2009 was 75 percent lower than the first quarter of 2008, and the anticipated upturn in the second quarter was showing no sign of materialising blaming the poor sales primarily on the lack of credit facilities from banks to fund machine purchases along with low levels of business confidence.

"Back in November we forecast a moderate second quarter recovery in 2009 based on the fact that Governments around the world had pumped a huge amount of money into recapitalising financial institutions and had committed to stimulus packages which included significant spending on public construction projects," said chief executive Matthew Taylor. "Two months later, despite the recapitalisation, customers are still struggling to buy machines because of a lack of available credit. And with Government-funded construction projects not moving forward quickly enough, this means the anticipated second quarter recovery simply won't happen."

Agriculture saviour

For certain manufacturers, the impact of the decline has been partially offset by the buoyancy in the agricultural sector which after several hard years is replacing and adding new machines for feed and materials handling.

JCB has strong links in the agricultural side as does Merlo with more than half of its UK sales in the agriculture sector along with a strong range of specialist products including its market leading Roto models. The company says that "while the





market is still tough it is fairing a lot better than most". It recently introduced two new models at the SIMA agricultural show, intended for 2010 production.

The Super-Compact P25.6 will take

Merlo back into the compact sector which it pioneered with the P20.6 SC of the early 1990's. It says the most obvious feature of the new machine is the massive cab which has "fantastic visibility". At 995mm wide, the cab is identical to that of the larger Merlo models, even though the machine is just 1,800mm wide and 1,920mm high. With 2,500kg lift capacity and six metre lift height, the P25.6 uses Merlo's normal permanent four wheel drive hydrostatic driveline concept, albeit with a single speed central drop box, permitting a maximum road speed of 30 kph. The P25.6 was shown with its optional three point 2,500kg rear linkage and hydraulic Power Take Off.

The second new Merlo model was the Multifarmer 40.9 CS - the third line of Merlo tractor/telehandler products. Heavy duty axles from the P55.9 CS telehandler, gives this four tonne capacity machine a purposeful look. The Category 3,

rear mounted three point linkage will lift seven tonnes and has a standard 540/1000 rpm mechanical Power Take Off. The three section boom reaches 8.8 metres and Merlo says it will be making a two-section seven metre version available.

Another new feature on the Multifarmer is the 40.9 CS cab module - incorporating hydro-pneumatic cab suspension. Inside the cab, there is a completely new layout which will look very familiar to tractor drivers.

A 103kW diesel drives the permanent four wheel drive at up to 40 km per hour through a hydrostatic transmission and a three-speed drop box with oil-immersed clutch for 'on the go' range changes. Like the P25.6 this new Multifarmer will be homologated for use on the road as a farm tractor in many European countries.

Merlo UK, recently delivered its 7,000th telehandler - a 25 metre Roto 40.25 MCSS - to GT Lifting solutions of Lancing West Sussex, 15 years after it began importing the Italian-built machines.

GT's managing director, Graham Trundell said: "This brings our fleet to eight, 25 metre Rotos and demand is continuing to grow, in comparison to the general house building market. The Roto offers spectacular performance and can often replace several machines on-site."

Trundell was one of the early converts to the Roto concept, buying his first unit in 1997 when he was special projects manager for Gamble Jarvis. GT Lifting Solutions now has several heavy-lift Merlo six and 10 tonne capacity telehandlers as well as the 18-strong Roto fleet with 16, 21 and 25 metre lift heights.

Merlo UK says that the specialised telehandler market remains strong, and believes the manufacturer is well placed to weather the current economic conditions with no borrowings, a very high percentage of its products manufactured 'in-house' and an unusually high level of automation.



Attachment success

The combination of compact dimensions, loader-like performance and wide range of attachments has, says Bobcat, helped boost sales of its T2250. Now a new factory-installed second auxiliary line option and several more attachments extend its versatility further.

The second auxiliary line allows the machine to operate attachments requiring two hydraulic lines such as the angle broom attachment. It also allows the use of attachments with the hydraulic Quick-Tach system without having to disconnect the couplers.

Another feature on the latest version is the Speed Management System - a form of creep control - which is now standard. It allows the operator to decrease the forward speed at any engine speed and gives precise control on auxiliary flow when using attachments. Two new jib attachments are also available for

JLG manufacturing

JLG - with its Gradall, Lull and Skytrak as well as the JLG branded European and North American ranges has by far the widest portfolio of any manufacturer in both product and brand terms, although only the JLG brand is marketed in Europe.

Late last year JLG announced that it is to drop the Gradall brand name re-badging the products as JLG but retaining the grey/blue colour scheme which will continue to be applied to the distinctive rear pivot steer models.

A much smaller player outside of its home market of North America, JLG also produces a range of ag machines for sale under its own name as well as building a version for Deutz-Fahr. Three new JLG models at the SIMA show, the L2906H and 2906H both offer 5.8 metres lift height and 2,900 kg maximum lift capacity with the L model featuring a two metre overall height, while the 3507H has a 6.9 metre lift height and 3,500kg lift capacity.

and a faster response for the bucket attachment. Optional automatic wheel alignment allows the operator to change more rapidly between the three different steering modes. Improvements also include a tighter turning radius, increased fuel capacity and enhanced access to service areas.

Robert Monteban, director of marketing for Europe, Middle-East and Africa, said: "The compact range of JLG telehandlers was developed to be a highly reliable and complementary work-tool on the farm. We see many business opportunities with the launch of this compact range of telehandlers."

In total there are eight JLG agricultural telehandler models with lift heights ranging from 5.6 to nine metres and lift capacities from 2,500 to 4,000kg.

JLG also manufactures machines

eight and nine metres respectively with a 4,000kg maximum lift capacity.

The telehandlers are based on JLG's European model range, as such they have a slightly longer wheel base than some other purpose built ag telehandlers which, says Deutz-Fahr, helps provide a more stable base for heavier loads.

The new models include a new load-sensing high volume hydraulic system, powershift transmission with four forward and three reverse gears providing a top speed of 40 km per hour. The cab is equipped with air-conditioning and a high quality pneumatic seat as standard, while chassis levelling is optional.

Telehandlers at Intermat

The recent Intermat show in Paris saw the launch of several new telehandlers including the first from a Chinese manufacturer, Sunward.



the construction market. The first is a crane jib with hook. Bobcat is also offering a new extension jib, which like the crane jib, is Quick-Tach mounted.

The first of the new agricultural attachments is the Bob-Tach mounted pallet frame with bale spikes designed for transporting compacted hay or straw bales using two small-diameter forks.

With the new tubular bale squeeze handler, the T2250 telehandler can be used to transport straw bales with diameters from 1.0 to 1.3 metres. The handler is provided with two hydraulically operated tubular arms which retract to firmly grip the bale. The tubular bale squeeze handler is available with both Bob-Tach and Quick-Tach mounting systems.

Developed and produced at the JLG production facility in Maasmechelen, Belgium, all three feature Tier III Deutz engines and high-torque hydrostatic transmissions. Other enhancements include improved hydraulics with increased flow for smoother boom operation





After showing its prototype at Bauma in 2007, Sunward is now ready to market the machine although it has still to appoint dealers or finalise a pricing structure for Europe. The Sunward SWTH3514 is a 3,500kg capacity, 13.65 metre lift height machine powered by a 75kW Perkins engine. Its two speed forward and reverse hydrostatic transmission claims a top speed of 35 km per hour and 60 percent gradeability.

The boom is stowed in a low position allowing the operator good visibility and the chassis - made from 22mm thick plate to reduce

twisting and deflection - can level on slopes up to plus or minus eight degrees and offers the usual three steering modes. This is not a compact machine (less than two metres high), the unit has a width and height of about 2.5 metres.

Compact telehandler manufacturer Bourgoin - based in Bournezeau, France displayed two of its three model compact telehandler range. Smallest is the 1,400kg, 4.80 metre CT1250 which weighing just 2,650kg, can be transported to site on a trailer behind a 4x4. The five metre CT1865 has an 1,800kg lift capacity and the CT2280 is capable of 2,200kg and 5.2 metres. Bourgoin is currently looking for dealers.

Another compact telehandler shown in prototype form at Bauma 2007 and now ready for sale following significant changes is the MZ 2706 from Imer. The compact, 2,030mm high, 1,860mm wide machine has a 2,500 kg maximum lift capacity and can lift 1,200kg to its maximum lift height of six metres. Powered by a Kubota 50kW, four cylinder engine

with hydrostatic drive, it has a maximum speed of 25 km per hour.

Spanish producer Ausa unveiled its new Taurulift T276H which features a 6.1 metre lift height and a maximum capacity of 2.7 tonnes. A big brother to the two tonne capacity, 4.2 metre lift height T204H launched at Conexpo, it features permanent four wheel hydrostatic drive and Kubota power. Italian telescopic manufacturer Farasin did not add to its range but said that its 4.5 tonne to 18 metre Roto 1845 Storm is the next telehandler to be updated. It also indicated that there may be a new 3.5 tonne capacity, 10 metre model ready for next year's Bauma.

With one of the most impressive

outdoor stands, Dieci continued its

tradition of launching several new products at almost every show it attends. The largest machine on its stand was the new 10 tonne capacity Hercules 210.10. Two smaller models the 160.10 and 120.10 were shown at SAIE but the range has undergone several technical improvements including improved ground clearance.

The Icarus 40.17 will have a new cabin for next year and the Dedalus 26.8 - basically a 26.6 with an eight metre boom - will also be introduced. Dieci said that the Spanish market continues to be 'really bad', and that the UK was not much better. "We can see it being very quiet up to September after that maybe it will improve".

A few years ago its 14 metre Icarus

40.14 was a very popular model selling 4-500 per year. Now it is just four! Taking its place is the 17 metre Icarus 40.17 with man basket or jib, which will have a new cabin for next year. The company's current best seller is the 50.21 a 360 degree, 21 metre machine with the seven tonne capacity. In 2007 it opened its new factory and produced 2,200 units, this would have grown to 2,500 last year, however production in the last two months of the year dropped considerably - running about 40 percent below 2007 levels.

New Cats

The JLG/Caterpillar telehandler alliance has been rather quiet since the Cat TH255 was launched almost two years ago, however it has just introduced the new Cat TH514.

Aimed at tough applications, the TH514 has a load capacity of just



under five tonnes, lift height of 13.7 metres and forward reach of 9.2 metres.
Load-sensing, flow-sharing hydraulics allow for all three boom functions to be operated simultaneously and proportionally.

The unit is powered by a 74.5 kW (101 hp) Cat C4.4 DITAAC mechanical control, turbo charged engine as standard and certified to Stage IIIA (Tier3) emission regulations. Also standard is a limited slip differential fitted in the front axle.

A range of Cat work tools extends





the versatility. A high visibility manual IT coupler comes as standard, with the option of a hydraulic quick coupler to allow work tool changes without leaving the cab.

Cat says the new cab has good visibility and features a new heating and ventilation system with optional air conditioning. The single lever

joystick with roller switches is easy to use, and all controls, including auxiliary hydraulics, are fully proportional. An in-cab LCD displays a wide range of information, and the keypad can be used to select various operating modes, including the three steering modes.

Specialist telehandler sales are holding up relatively well.

A Longitudinal Stability Indicator for the machine's forward stability provides a constant and progressive check on load safety with a cut-out for the extend and lift down functions should the rated load be exceeded. A built-in start code device reduces the risk of theft and unauthorised use. Service points are readily accessible and major components are at ground level. Service access points are conveniently located under the engine cover, and routine daily maintenance is now reduced to checking fluid levels and a walk-around inspection.

Looking at the current telehandler sales figures it would appear the sector is having a torrid time. For some this is true, however by offering specialist machines not used by the housing sector, sales

are holding up relatively well.

Niche rules

However, with more and more users experiencing specialist equipment, the 'run of the mill' telehandler may not have it all its own way when the market picks up. Contractors are now seeing

the benefits of the 360 degree, compact and large capacity telehandler models, while at the same time there appears to be a growing acceptance of the self erector and small city tower cranes for residential development. It will be interesting to see what sort of effect this will have on mid-range fixed frame telehandler sales when rental companies begin renewing their fleets.

The largest assembly kit in the world?

What is possibly the largest assembly kit in the world - a 600 acre oil refinery in Milford Haven - is being moved to Pakistan by industrial process plant dismantling and erection specialist company, Ailsbury.

Built in 1964 the refinery now belongs to Dutch oil group Petroplus but has not been producing for the last 12 years. Grant Thomas, Ailsbury's logistics manager explains: "Many developing countries need to increase their processing output quickly. To design and build a plant like this would take 10 years and probably cost £10 billion. It seems an enormous undertaking, but dismantling a previously-used facility and re-assembling it on a new site can take a third of the time and have a similar cost saving."

Thomas has been on-site for two years and the project is now in the final dismantling stage. The scale of the work is staggering and has required 1,000 tonne cranes and

twenty axle, self-powered, remote control hydraulic trailers. Five ship loads of the larger dismantled plant items have already been sent to the client, Bosicor Oil, along with some 400 shipping containers. In all, about 80,000 tonnes of parts have been carefully catalogued and bar-coded for 'easy' identification at the point of reassembly.

This kind of work can't be attempted without the right equipment and Thomas claims that the job would have been impossible without his fleet of 12 Merlo telehandlers.

"The Merlos have been fantastic," he says. "We currently have six of the largest Rotos, three 17 metre lift Panoramics and three 13 metre units."

Specialist rental

All are rented from Scarborough based specialist Greenwood Hire, which with 140 units boasts the UK's largest Merlo fleet. He says that the attraction of the Roto is its ability to quickly and safely access difficult and tight spots and complete the lift far more rapidly than if he had to bring a mobile crane in.

"With many of the lifting jobs being pipe work, these four tonne capacity machines are seldom stretched for capacity. The Rotos are terrific for loading the containers and for dismantling within the confines of the refinery structures," adds Thomas. Each Roto 40.25 MCSS is equipped with a four tonne intelligent winch attachment. The load control system of the MCSS machines was designed and built in-house by Merlo. Unlike off-the-shelf systems, it allows the maximum safe capacity to be used at all times, adjusting automatically to asymmetrically outrigger extension and the like, very useful in tight quarters.

So important are the Rotos to this operation claims Thomas, that Ailsbury has trained and certified 30 operators as 360 degree telehandler drivers.



Versatility the key

Thirteen JCB Loadall telescopic handlers originally purchased for winter road maintenance duties are proving productive summer performers for highways maintenance specialist Ringway. Horsham-based Ringway is responsible for the ongoing maintenance of large sections of the country's road network under long-term service contracts with several local authorities. The company purchased the JCB 531-70 models earlier this year to load salt-spreading vehicles at each of its county depots. However, as weather conditions improve, the machines are proving equally adept loading aggregates into the company's ongoing highway maintenance vehicle fleet.

"We are committed to providing services to highway authorities throughout the year so these machines are in regular operation," says Ringway group plant and fleet manager Gary Condon. "To maximise our investment it is important they are permanently employed with material handling duties irrespective of seasonal weather changes, so versatility was a key consideration."



Don't write off Intermat yet...

Despite all the economic problems and lack of certain exhibitors, almost 185,000 visitors voted with their feet, made the effort to go to Intermat and had a very good show. Whilst attendance was almost 12 percent down on 2006, Intermat remains one of the world's largest international equipment shows with 45 percent

or 85,000 overseas visitors.

Direct comparisons with Bauma with its half a million plus visitors are now unrealistic, but it still has a place in the three year, Bauma, Intermat, Conexpo cycle. Whether or not the show would have attracted more visitors if all the major manufacturers had attended is debatable, but even with total visitor numbers down, there were still major benefits for manufacturers attending the show. Contacts made and built-on here could pay dividends when customers think about buying in big numbers again. Were 1,470 exhibitors wrong to attend?

Those who decided to stay away, will point to the fact that there were times early in the week when stand personnel significantly outnumbered visitors. This was certainly true on some of the major construction equipment stands, however, it is rare for any stand - even at Bauma - to be constantly busy throughout a six day show. And there were deals being done.

The show gained pace during the week with an exhibition 'buzz' on Wednesday and Thursday. We spoke with several companies in our sector that did not attend. The access manufacturers said they were uncertain if they had missed out however, the crane companies after visiting the show were sorry not to have been there.

2012 will hopefully be more of an upbeat year for the next Intermat and it will be interesting to see if companies return or find an excuse to stay away. Overall, this year's show was good, and with an improving global economy 2012 should be even better.

Our Intermat preview in March and the Intermat stop press in last month's issue covered the major launches at the show. So we have focused our review on the products not previewed.

Haulotte

Haulotte, the largest access company exhibiting had an interesting stand (in black, of course). As well as its new 10 metre, 4x4x4, zero tailswing articulated compact HA120PX, it unveiled the Compact 14 - a 12 metre platform height, 1.2 metre wide scissor lift. Based on the other Compact models, it features a short overall length and 350kg lift capacity. Also on display was a Holland Lift heavy duty scissor, marking the

recent distribution agreement between Holland Lift and Haulotte for France, Italy and former Yugoslavian states.

Multitel

Multitel's new MX225 caught the attention not because of its 22.5 metres working height mounted on a 3.5 tonne chassis, but its 10 metre outreach with stabilisers set within the width of the vehicle.

According to export director Jerry Kist the machine's secret lies in the lift geometry with the first boom giving an increasing stabilising moment as it telescopes out. The unit has two outreach curves for 120kg and 200kg and utilises the same 180 degree cage rotation system as the larger MX270.

Overall travel height is just over 2.4 metres with overall length is

6.35 metres. Production is said to be starting this month with several orders already received. For those wanting a closer look, the MX225 will be officially launched in the UK at Vertikal Days in June.

Some stands early in the week were a bit quiet

Imer

Light construction equipment company Imer showed several new products including a compact telehandler, the MZ 2706 with 2.5 tonne capacity and six metre lift height and two models of a three model range of spider lift platforms, the fruits of its joint venture with Japanese manufacturer IHI.

The 15 metre LEM 1500 and 18 metre LEM 1800 on display at Intermat will be joined by a 12 metre model. Maximum capacity in all three platforms is 200kg.

Platform Basket

At the centre of Platform Basket's stand was its new 21.70 metre working height 21.10 spider lift. With an unrestricted lift capacity of 200kg, the platform has a maximum working outreach of 10.3 metres. Features include two position adjustable stabilisers, radio remote control with a permanent cable connected control panel in the basket, a choice of either Kubota diesel or Honda petrol engines (and 220/110V), hydraulically adjustable tracks - from 940mm to 1,250mm - all internal hose and cabling in the boom for increased protection, a 1.5 metre jib and removable basket.

Chris Taylor of CAT Access Solutions shook hands on a deal for a new machine with Shaun Day of UK distributor Promax Access. Taylor has been steadily expanding his fleet of machines since purchasing the first Platform Basket early last year. Platform Basket has also been working with Promax to develop an articulated, 14 metre rail mounted platform which may be available later this year. The company is also working on several other new platforms including a 15 metre and 18 metre trailer lift aimed at the Scandinavian, German and UK markets for possible launch at SAIE in October, and a self propelled 18 metre and possibly 25 metre telescopic and articulated booms for next year.

Traklift

Traklift may be new to most in the industry but it has been around for quite a while under its corporate name, Teupen Hungary. Its future is now uncertain however following its acquisition by Teupen founder Alfons Thihatmer (see news page6).

It used to manufacture the smaller tracked machines for Teupen, but was showing its own range of platforms under the Traklift brand. Four spider lift models were available with working heights of 12.1, 14.9,17.6 and 20.6 metres respectively. Horizontal outreach ranges from 5.6 to 9.6 metres which is very similar to the up and over clearance heights. Adrian Fekete of Traklift said that the company had sold an 18 metre unit into Scotland and is looking at manufacturing van mounted platforms. What happens after the acquisition remains to be seen.



Dieci

Liebherr

We have extensively covered Liebherr's new mobile cranes - the 350 tonne LTM 1350-6.1 and the MK88 self erecting tower crane in our previews - but there were several other interesting products on display.


To meet the market's demands for heavy lift tower cranes, Liebherr has introduced the 130 EC-B 8 FR.tronic flat-top crane with a maximum lifting capacity of eight tonnes, replacing the 130 EC-B 6 FR.tronic. Power from the standard continuous FC hoist gear has been increased from 30 to 37kW and now allows hook heights up to 190 metres and hoist speeds up to 105 metres per minute. All loads are carried in two-line mode and at 60

although not seen by many in Europe - were the 600 tonne LR1600/2 (on Ainscough's recent crawler crane shopping list) and the 40 tonne heavy duty cycle HS 825HD.

The company was also promoting its remote diagnostic Teleservice product through a live crane simulator which is now an important part of crane driver instruction at Liebherr's Biberach training centre. Consisting of a software supported simulation and large screen graphics within a tower crane cab, it gives operators a very realistic but totally safe environment to practice and improve crane skills.

Raimondi

Making sure everyone knew it is still in tower crane business - albeit with new owners Ramco Group of Qatar - was Raimondi. After a cost reduction exercise which included about a third of its staff, the company is again in the market under the Raimondi Cranes S.p.A banner, this

Maeda

Tucked away on the extremities of the crane area was Maeda. Even though it was hard to find, more than enough visitors saw the two new models, the six tonne capacity pick and carry LC1385 and the 590mm wide, 1.72 tonne MC174

Furukawa Unic

Furukawa Unic showed its range of straight boom loader cranes. Whilst not popular in Europe, its range of 11 models in five different categories offer lifting capacities from one to eight tonnes and it says, gives better capabilities than articulated loader cranes.

The smallest model, the A100 lifts just under a tonne at 1.8 metres and with a four stage boom can lift 250kg at its maximum radius of 4.8 metres. The larger W series cranes have capacities from 2.3 tonnes to more than four tonnes and are designed for light to heavy duty trucks. The W540W for example has a maximum of six boom sections and handles 250kg at 15.47 metres.





Palfinger

As well as its loader cranes and 103 metre Wumag WT1000 truck mounted lift, the first in France, sold to Mediaco - Palfinger also launched the P260B, a 25.8 metre working height platform mounted on a 3.5 tonne chassis.

C&a

Using extruded aluminium profiles to keep the weight down the platform has a 12.5 metre outreach to the side and front with 100kg in the platform which increases to 13.5 metres over the rear of the machine.

Four different outrigger modes are available giving the operator enough flexibility to set up in most terrain or space situations.

Hinowa

We only published very brief details of Hinowa's new 20.9 metre working height truck mounted Orchid Lift 21.11, its main attraction. The company's first truck mounted platform uses the popular 3.5 tonne Nissan Cabstar and double pantograph boom arrangement, with parallel vertical movement up to a height of nine metres at a constant outreach of 10.6 metres, lift capacity is 200kg. The two position, vertical stabilisers can be used within the width of the chassis reducing outreach to about eight metres and working height to more than 18 metres.



Oil&Steel

Italian truck and spider platform company Oil&Steel probably had more new products on show than any other manufacturer. We were expecting four new platforms - two truck mounts and two tracked spider machines - but an additional spider was also unveiled.

The Snake 1770 Compact and the 2512 Compact mounted on a six tonne chassis join the Snake 2010 launched last year. The three machines now cover 17 to 25 metre working heights and use three different stabiliser systems - within the width of the chassis, variable stabiliser width and the Gekko system.

The new tracked 15 and 18 metre Octopussy EVO series machines were on show for the first time, priced above the existing Octopussy machines they offer extendable tracks, rotating basket, and jib and new offset outrigger system - to justify the additional expense.

The other 'brand new' machine on show was the 'bare bones' tubular steel frame Octopussy 1400 Classic. Available in two versions - the 120kg capacity 4001 and 200kg 4002 - the unit is a more basic machine that will obviously be popular with plant hirers.

Giraf Track

Giraf Track's has already delivered 10 units of its impressive - particularly with its 13 metre long platform - tracked boom lift/crane/telehandler. It is currently working with an electrical supply/maintenance contractor for projects in the UK. The final machine





can be seen at Vertikal Days at Haydock in June and will feature an operator cab with joystick controls and front blade for stabilisation. The tracked machine can lift two people with a 250kg transformer outperforming regular boomlifts.



Impressive with its 13 metre long platform, the Giraf Track can be seen at Vertikal Days this month with operator cab and front blade.

French mast boom manufacturer ATN showed its first boom lift, the Zebra 12, a 12 metre Rough Terrain articulated boom with 8.5 metres outreach. Sales manager Patrick Biasin said that the company is looking to extend the range, to include 16, 18 or 20 metre models. The Zebra 12 has good ground clearance, is simple to operate and has its own in-build diagnostic screen allowing users to monitor the machine's performance without plugging in laptop computer.

Böcker unveiled two new products, the 2.3 tonne material or 12 person rack and pinion Superlift LX which fits between the Superlift MX and the Giant Lift, it offers lifting speeds up to 40 metres per minute up to a maximum lifting height of 200 metres and the more interesting 31.4 metre hook height AK 32/1500 PLC aluminium truck crane. The company says that the combination of a smaller chassis and a fixed semi-trailer means that driving license class BE is sufficient to drive the crane.

GGR Unic

The GGR stand was a mixture of red and yellow as it launched its new GGR AL series of Airlift mini cranes. In its bright yellow livery, the air-powered mini cranes claim to be the world's first fully Atex certified Zone 1 spider cranes. Designed primarily for the petrochemical, offshore and underground controlled sectors the AL Series can work in Zone 1 and Zone 2 environments with all the attributes of the standard Unic mini crane. GGR has developed six models from the 2.9 tonne AL529 to the six tonne AL660. Included in the range is the AL740 which is based on the new four tonne capacity Unic URW-547 but which has an improved working radius of 17.83 metres and 18.6 metres lift height.



Good problems?

As if the current economic climate isn't hard enough to deal with, self erecting tower crane rental companies (particularly those with small fleets) have a variety of other problems to deal with. Cranes & Access takes a closer look at this and at the pros and cons of using small tower cranes rather than telehandlers for on-site material handling.

When a customer wants to extend the hire of your self erector or top slewing city crane, you would initially think that the extra revenue would be welcome. It can, however, cause a major headache for the smaller rental company, particularly if the crane is already booked on another long-term contract - which it often is. If the crane remains on site even for a few more months - it may mean loosing the other contract which could be for a year or more. Passing the work on through a cross-hire deal rarely works in this market, and even if it does, the company then has the challenge to find a similar contract for its own crane when it comes free a month or two later. A tricky situation in the current environment, but one that smaller companies relying on full utilisation have to deal with on a regular basis.

However, there is a growing trend for the opposite to happen but with a very similar end result. Feedback from crane rental companies suggest some customers are increasingly negotiating 'long term' hires (50 weeks plus) to obtain a very good rate but then off-hire the crane well before the end of the hire contract, often after just 30 weeks or so. Again a tricky situation.

It the rental company enforces the original contract period and goes looking for the money through the legal system, most hirers said that they were concerned that they would not obtain work from that customer again so this route is rarely followed. The practice is all the more galling if as many think the customer 'over estimated' the rental period for financial gain. The problem is further compounded if the crane was purchased specifically for the long-term contract with financing/purchase/cash flow arranged around the length of the hire. Occasionally there are instances



where contracts actually end early, possibly because the tower crane in this instance its own worst enemy - has enabled the contractor to save time during the construction and complete the work much guicker than envisaged. The use of a self erector or small city crane is despite having first arrived in the UK more than 40 years ago - still in its infancy in this country and the speed and efficiency of the equipment compared to more traditional plant and equipment can be a surprise to new users. However, the general sentiment of the tower crane rental

companies we spoke to thought there is a definite trend for the original rental period 'exaggerated' just to get a lower rental rate. Perhaps this is an area where the industry ought to agree strict contract terms or better still rental companies maintain their pricing but making the last month or two free of charge. For the genuine contractor he still benefits from the keen contract price, while the fraudster doesn't. So what are the benefits of using a self erector or small city crane rather than its main competition, the telehandler?

The above table (with an addition and 'tweak' or two) was taken from a Manitowoc presentation on 'The Advantages of self erecting cranes' aimed at convincing users in North America of the benefits of the self-erector. Ignoring the obvious manufacturer bias, the article highlights the self erector's advantages which are still applicable and which more and more customers in the UK and North America are now realising.

The combination of superior reach, safer operating techniques and quieter operation means self-erecting cranes can outperform telehandlers on many projects. The cranes can be used in areas not accessible by a telehandler and reach across the entire jobsite instead of one area, place materials exactly where they are needed - and not on the edge of the building requiring further handling - improving safety and speeding up the construction process.

Radio remote controls have really boosted the efficiency and safety of the self erector, by allowing operators to place themselves in a location with the best visibility to handle the lift. Users also benefit from the crane's ability to work on environmentally sensitive sites or in residential areas with electric power, even when generated, being quieter and cleaner than mobile diesels. A final advantage is the ground is not cut-up by heavy machinery moving around the work site and site traffic is significantly reduced.

Many users also claim that self erecting cranes save on manpower with one company stating that on average, it has six to eight fewer workers on site when using compact tower cranes.

Key attributes

erectors have the same key attributes. They are easy to set-up - if you know what you are doing - have a small on-site footprint and good lifting characteristics. The site power supply can be used, if available, although most cranes have a standard or optional generator to obtain power. Self erectors can be positioned in some of the tightest, most inaccessible areas of a site. There are occasions however where this is not possible. purely because the positioning/towing vehicle - usually a telehandler cannot position the crane without blocking itself in or it cannot physically get into the space. Even this problem has now been solved with a motorised mobile power pack such as the Italian-built Gapo, available in the UK from Ladybird Crane Hire.

Whatever the manufacturer, all self

Bigger is better

Sales of self erector tower cranes in the UK or Ireland have never been large, although in Ireland contractors have been far more willing to adopt the technology than in the UK. The current economic climate has seen a drop from those low levels. The reduction in the smaller residential and retail/office developments means that utilisation among the larger crane rental fleets has fallen significantly, to the point where Belgian-based Arcomet has shipped a portion of its UK inventory to other markets.

However it seems that it is common for many users to 'overspec' the crane, selecting a model with more reach and capacity than necessary, even if it costs slightly more. Hence the demand for the smaller radii self erector is not as great as for the larger cranes, particularly 40 metre working radius cranes.





Small city or self erector?

Let's suppose you are one of the enlightened, and have decided on a small tower crane for your project, what do you go for, a large self erector or small city crane? From a rental point of view, the city crane will be cheaper, the complicated self erector being more expensive to purchase (possibly twice the price in the case of a large crane) and therefore also to rent. Both need a similar pre-prepared base although size for size, the self erector is heavier and therefore tends to have the higher foot loading. But the three main criteria that will decide one way or another are: the under hook height, maximum jib radius and space to position the crane on site.

Generally higher under hook heights and risk of lower level obstructions, tend to suit a city crane. Most self erectors have fixed mast heights and jib lengths whereas a city crane can add sections up to its maximum. There are exceptions, of course, with a self erector such as the Potain Igo T85 and the San Marco 45N, both launched last year.

The Igo T85 has a lattice mast that can offer working heights of between 20 metres and 35 metres either by telescoping or adding sections. With its jib luffed to maximum it has a maximum tip height of 51 metres and an on-site footprint of 4.5 metres square. With the jib fully extended to 45 metres the crane can lift 1,250kg, or with the jibfolded to 33.8 metres the crane picks 2,350kg at jib tip.

San Marco's 45N has a maximum capacity of 1,500kg at 45 metre radius and is the first model in a new series that can add up to four, 2.5 metre tower sections, giving various under hook heights from 26.5 - 36.5 metres.

The 45N has a maximum lift capacity of 6,000kg and final testing and

certification should now have taken place with production scheduled to start this year.

City cranes tend to have greater working radii and the base takes up less space on the site. The downside is that the self erector is easier and cheaper to erect (about half the price) so for contracts under about 20 weeks or so it is the obvious choice given that it fits the other criteria.

Dunham Cranes, the Ramsbottom/
Bury-based developer and distributor for Italian-built FB Gru self erectors, is one company that sees the benefits. It did a job last year with one of its self erectors that reduced the build time by three months. This alone saved the client £50,000 in finance costs without even counting any of the other financial savings through having a crane permanently on site.


Why the UK construction industry has not yet realised the benefits of small tower cranes is a mystery. True, the popularity of the machines in mainland Europe is probably as much related to contractors owning their own cranes as anything else. In the UK the tendency to rent equipment, means that contractors rely on what rental companies have available and most are still unsure or unwilling to invest in self erectors which are less versatile than mobile cranes.

Using a self erecting tower crane does mean organising the site differently and changing some of the existing working practises. But with significant time and cost savings to be had, it can't be too long, before they are more widely adopted, can it?



Vantislooks overseas

Irish self erecting crane manufacturer Mantis, launched its new four tonne capacity 36.10 at Intermat and plans to expand is export markets further. The new model supersedes the 35.10 and has been designed to utilise ballast weights from the Mantis 32.10 thereby providing a cost saving to owners who may have both models. The 36.10 also shares the same hoist and trolley motors and other components.



One of the key features of the 36.10 is the relocation of the trolley motor to the bottom of the tower which simplifies maintenance work, and allows adjustment of the trolley brake, without need to dismantle the crane.

The new crane can set up with jib lengths of 36, 32, 28 and 14 metres, giving a maximum hook height with jib fully luffed of 27 metres or 22 metres with a horizontal jib. The crane can also operate in winds of up to 72 km per hour depending on load dimensions.

A new radio remote control unit is used which, apart from operating the crane, also displays a variety of information, including the weight on the hook, trolley distance, hook

height and wind speed. As an alternative the crane can be operated using a cable control, while few operators will choose this option, it is useful as a backup in the event of the radio remote control unit being damaged.

The 36.10 requires a 400V, 50Hz mains electricity supply or a 30 to 40kVa generator. Just two trucks are required for transportation - a low-loader for the folded crane itself and a flat-bed for the ballast. With its own wheeled chassis it can be quickly dismantled and moved around on site to different positions using a site vehicle equipped with tow hitch or a powered tug such as the Gapo.



If required, Mantis can supply an axle kit with brakes, incorporating lights and other features to comply with road regulations, allowing the crane to be towed behind a truck on its own wheels - common in mainland Europe but seldom used in the UK or Ireland.

The new model is the largest in a growing, range of six self-erecting tower cranes manufactured by Mantis at its facilities in Ireland. Its current line-up comprises the 23.09, 30.10, 32.10, 35.10, 36.10 and the TC 25. Apart from manufacturing, the company also has a fleet of self-erecting tower cranes for hire throughout the UK and Ireland.

General manager Robert Rowlette says: "We are trying to educate contractors and builders of the economics that self-erecting tower cranes provide, their ease of use, flexibility and adaptability. We have also designed our own range of self-erecting tower cranes to meet the specific requirements of the construction industry in the UK, namely the Mantis TC 25 which has its own on-board generator and can be transported with its full complement of ballast enabling the crane to be erected for work in less than 30 minutes from delivery."

"We are now looking to expand into other countries," he adds. "Although we are initially focusing on Poland, CIS, Czech Republic and the Baltic States we are prepared to talk to dealers anywhere. We have already sold cranes directly into mainland Europe, Africa and the USA. I believe that now is a good time to start working with dealers who can deliver the required level of customer service. Being small has its advantages, we can react to customer needs quickly and efficiently."




Back in production

Raimondi's recent problems - six months out of production - are now in the past, with the company - under new owners Ramco Group of Qatar and exhibiting at the recent Intermat show.

A review of costs meant about one third of its staff were let go, but the new company is back in the market and selling cranes under the Raimondi Cranes S.p.A banner and has already sold 14 new cranes to its new owners. The range has been reduced to six models although there are plans for a new 70 metre, seven tonne capacity crane to slot between the MRT126 and the MRT294.

Easy does it

Manitowoc's latest self erector, the Igo 30, is available in two versions: a 30 metre jib version that has a tip capacity of 900kg and a 28 metre jib version that can handle 1,000kg.

Maximum capacity for both versions is 2.2 tonnes, which the crane can take to 14.6 metres radius. Height under hook is 21 metres and the jib can luff to either eight or 20 degrees. With a total weight of less than 26 tonnes, it can be transported on a single truck in most markets, reducing transportation costs.

The crane also features the SmartCom system that incorporates special sensors and an on-board computer to improve efficiency and bring additional safety to folding and unfolding operations. For ease of set-up, it has side ballast, which means the counterweight does not need to be moved during erection and dismantling. This is especially



is not possible or where there are strict rules regarding the position of the jib during out-of-service operation. All of the mechanisms are frequency controlled and radio remote control is included.

"The emphasis on the Igo range is to make everything about the job as Milan, Manitowoc's senior product manager for self-erecting cranes. "When designing the cranes, we focus on transporting it to the site, rigging, maintaining, operating on site and then moving on to the next job."

Looking for something bigger

Dunham Cranes, the Ramsbottom/ Bury-based distributor for FB Gru self erectors which introduced its largest machine, the 1,000kg at 36 metre radius GA136 last year, has seen the demand for the longer radius self erecting cranes increase in the UK. Unfortunately its request for a larger FB crane has so far gone unheeded, so it has entered into an agreement with Benazzato to distribute its 40 metre self erector.

Dunham director, Alan Dunham said: "We now have an arrangement with Benazzato and its UK dealer to take the 40 metre crane should we need it. We have been asking FB for a while to produce a larger self erecting crane but this does not look like happening in the near future."

Dunham also thinks that the small city tower crane has great potential in the UK.

"FB Gru's new GHS 401 is much lighter and needs a much smaller base than a self erector - 2.8 metres by 2.8 metres compared with

about 4.5 metres square," he says. Dunham took delivery of the first GHS 401 in the UK last year. Designed in six metre modules, the unit can be easily handled and transported to site on one truck. The units can also increase its height with the addition of more tower sections, unlike the fixed height self erector.



New four

While the UK has something of a blind spot for self erectors, it does like the mobile version which can offer many of the advantages of a regular self erector while retaining the mobility of an All Terrain crane. Liebherr has recently introduced its four axle MK88 mobile tower crane, the successor to the MK80 of which sold nearly 150 units. Like the three axle MK63 and

five axle MK100 models in the Liebherr's range, the new MK88 is an extremely compact, manoeuvrable design and therefore ideal for use in town centres where space between buildings is limited.

Transport dimensions are similar to the MK80 but the crane superstructure is distinctly larger allowing a maximum hook height with the jib in the 45 degree 'super steep-angle' position to increase to more than 57 metres

and the maximum working radius to more than 44 metres.

The completely new design, the two-section lattice-construction telescopic tower is said to be exceptionally rigid and has three standard steep-angle jib settings: 15, 30 and 45 degrees.

The electric power supply for crane erecting and operation can be taken either from the standard compact 48-kVA generator on the superstructure or by connecting to an outside source. The generator allows the crane to be erected and operated where no suitable outside power supply is available - a major bonus in town centres and noise protection areas.

The cranes radio remote control includes a full display of the essential load and operational information, including actual working radius, hook height, lifting speeds and the load on the hook.



Some assembly required

At the recent IPAF summit in Dublin, Kevin O'Shea of Mastclimbers Inc made a presentation extolling the virtues of renting mast climbing work platforms, particularly during the current recession. His pitch focussed both on the contractor benefits of using mastclimbers on a project, as well as the profitability potential for access rental companies.



It is surprising that some 50 years after the first mastclimbers were first introduced, they are still not perhaps with one or two exceptions - the façade access product of choice. No matter how you look at it, mastclimbers provide a more convenient, safer and more efficient working platform for the vast majority of façade work than regular scaffold, whether system or tube and fitting.



In spite of the obvious benefits that mast climbers offer façade scaffold is still the by far the most widely used access method for buildings.

There are of course a few applications where the façade scaffold, even a tube and fitting façade scaffold is the best tool for the job. However they are few and far between and

limited to the occasional job where it is essential to have tradesmen working on multiple levels at the same time. Multi-level mastclimbers are available but probably best for long term jobs such as cathedral/large church renovation and cleaning where the shapes are very awkward and where the platforms will remain in place for several years.

When it comes to costs O'Shea quoted savings of more than 50 percent when using mastclimbers on a typical façade job. Most of the saving comes, of course, from the fact that the delivery cost and set up time is substantially lower. When you add the other benefits to the equation, such as the time saved climbing ladders, the elimination of a material or personnel hoist, the fact that



tradesmen are always working at the optimum height, which in itself brings in productivity and quality of work benefits and it is hard to imagine why mast climbers are not always the access method of choice for façade work.

O'Shea argues that given the fact that mastclimbers, like scaffolding, are an integral access solution for a building, it must be designed even on the most basic level - unlike just turning up and unloading a scissor lift. This fact tends to favour the better organised companies, which run solid quality control procedures and can prove their competence to serious contractors.

It also allows, he points out, companies to be paid for their expertise, something that has all but vanished from most day to day crane or powered access rental businesses.

The design and build element, along with the fact that most mastclimbers tend to be tied into the building, make the rental far more permanent, not subject to mid contract undercutting and temporary off-hiring, allowing the rental company to safely predict the contribution over the life of the project. With a mast climber placed on say a four month project, the rental company has all that time to seek out a new

contract for it and can generally plan his sales efforts far better than the day to day nature of mobile work platforms.

If you go back to the late 1980's, mastclimbers were the hottest new product in the UK and Ireland and a good number of powered access rental companies added them to their fleets. On the whole it was a disaster as everyone cut the rates for the simplest jobs and then found that they had underestimated the work required to design and install the equipment and lost money while distracting themselves from their core boom and scissor husiness

Gradually all of them exited the market, with the net beneficiary being Andrew Reid and his young company Mastclimbers. Having spotted the fact that the logistics and design skills were more important than the product itself, he set out steadily building a business based on these lines. Mastclimbers gradually acquired most of the competitive fleets in the UK to a point where it almost had a monopoly. It became part owned by SGB after absorbing its mastclimber fleet and today is an integrated division of SGB UK, itself owned by the US-based conglomerate, Harsco.

mast climbers

While powered access companies took a stab at the market in the 1980's the scaffold industry largely ignored it, seeing it as a competitor to their products and services. This in spite of the fact that the skill sets required to operate mastclimbers efficiently are precisely those needed for contract scaffolding.

The big scaffolders made and are still making the same mistake as the coaching companies when the railways arrived, thinking that they were a coaching company rather than a transporter of people. One or two scaffold companies are now getting the message and we take a look at one of the fastest growing companies below.

O'Shea certainly makes the mastclimbing rental business look very appealing and it has been shown to be a first class, highly rewarding business. Is it a good bolt-on for boom and scissor rental companies? We think not - it needs to be set up as a specialist stand alone business or division. While scaffold companies already have most of the skill sets and stand to



loose most from the growth of mastclimbers, they also appear to be highly conservative and slow to adopt new technology so perhaps it will be the new entrants that will benefit the most. Much will depend on the demands from contractors and the speed that they switch over from scaffold. One interesting recent development is the arrival in the market of one or two tower crane rental companies, such as HTC. While they may not be well versed in the access industry, they have the design, delivery and erection skills and are usually one of the first companies on site. Maybe over the next 10 years we will see the emergence of the specialist tower crane/hoist/mastclimber supplier?

Going from strength to strength



One UK company that has gone from strength to strength by spotting trends in façade access and putting its money where its mouth is, is BFT Mastclimbers of Leighton Buzzard, Bedfordshire. The company started out as a traditional tube and fitting scaffolder. After some years in the business it spotted the potential and the benefits of switching to system scaffold and dropped most its traditional inventory and invested in large volumes of Layher equipment, which helped it to grow and move ahead of the pack.

Then three years ago BFT recognised the fact that for the vast majority of applications, (90 percent it claims) mastclimbers would or should be replacing scaffold. As a result the company began buying mastclimbing work platforms from Spanish manufacturer Alher. The company's managers quickly realised that to make the most of the new equipment it had to fully stake its belief in the concept and exit the scaffold business in order to focus all of its efforts on mast climbers. Managing director, Robin Head says that trying to keep a foot in both camps is a

hard balance to pull off well. "If you are passionate about what mastclimbers can do and believe that they are the best tool for the job you effectively end up selling against traditional scaffolding. If you also have a scaffold division and try and put the same passion and belief into that product, you need to be selling against mastclimbers and can end up tearing yourself apart as two parts of the business compete with each other."

"There is also the case of course where most of the company's mastclimbers are out on rent but you have scaffold sitting in the yard. At that point, that is what you would inevitably end up selling to the customer regardless of whether it is the best solution for his application."

"Once we got into the mastclimber business it became very clear to us that this was the way forward - the future - and that few if any contactors will return to scaffold once they have used a mastclimber," adds Head.

BFT currently operates a fleet of 220 mast climbers all of which are




made by Spanish manufacture Alher. Until recently utilisation has been as close to 100 percent as is physically possible, which has caused some problems with availability. A further 30 units were added late last year, in spite of the poor exchange rate between sterling and the Euro, simply to keep up with demand. After a slightly slower start to the year utilisation is back in the high 90's with a reasonable forward order book. Head says that he expects to add further platforms during the year as the market grows and, he says, due to winning increased market share.

The company's latest product from Alher is a lighter weight, more compact mastclimber, the PM60 with easier to handle triangular mast. BFT says that it is targeted at the London market where it feels its compact, lighter weight components will suit the space limitations so often found in the capital. The ultra compact base is just 800mm wide and can be moved with a simple stack truck. 1.5 metre mast sections weigh just 44kg and yet the PM60 retains

much of the versatility of the larger products with up to 60 metres lift height, and 750kg lift capacity on a single mast or 900kg in double mast configuration.

The company prides itself on the fact that when profiling a building it always uses purpose designed mesh floored deck extensions rather than loose scaffold boards. Details such as this, combined with a real 'can do' customer service attitude, together with the small specialist company focus should help ensure the company's continued growth as it plays its part in expanding the market.





British Aircraft warning light solution specialists Delta Obstruction Lighting, is currently installing a lighting system on the cooling towers at the new Cairo West power plant in Egypt. Raising the profile

The Guggenheim Building in Rochester, Minnesota is one of the landmark features of a city center which is steeped in the highest traditions of architecture and design. Built in 1974 and part of the Mayo Clinic's portfolio, it recently required some serious renovation work. The contact was awarded to local company, Building **Restoration Corporation and** Tom Fee, project manager for the job explains the main work involved.

"The support steel which holds the stone cladding in place required replacement. To achieve this we had to remove around 200 stone panels, each weighing between 550kg and 1,100kg. Our personnel



needed a stable working platform which could access 100 percent of the profile of the façade so that we could achieve high productivity. Working with Atlanta-based Mastclimbers, we developed a square profiled 'U' shaped, twin-mast platform which enveloped the full façade."

Mastclimbers worked closely with Canadian manufacturer Fraco to

customise an ACT8 Electric, mastclimber. Kevin O'Shea of Mastclimbers said: "Fraco worked

its introduction to the project, has revolutionised the task. The productivity benefits are huge, and operationally the task is infinitely easier with mast climbers than any other form of access."

"The training requirement consisted of taking experienced construction trades people and introducing them to new technology. You won't get them on any other type of access now!" adds Fee.

Sloping

When we think of malt whisky distilleries in Scotland, traditional building's steeped in tradition come to mind. However the new Diageo distillery at Roseisle, Speyside is a futuristic building with sloping sides that presented several challenges when it came to cladding. Contractor Rok quickly understood that this was a job for mastclimbing work platforms and called in SGB's Mastclimber division.

The £40 million building is the first new distillery to be built in Scotland for 30 years and while it adopts traditional malt whisky methods within the dramatic architecture by Austin Smith Lord, the building houses traditional copper stills.

The long 10 bay, 15 metre high façade, inclines 15 degrees ruling out the use of scissor lifts and would also have been a challenge for traditional scaffold - not to mention the inefficiencies of using non powered access for the job.

SGB used a 15 metre high twin mast assembly which covered half of the building's length. Once the cladding was completed the masts were dismantled and relocated to

complete the other half.

Working closely with Rok, SGB developed a design which minimised interference with the installation of the cladding and insulation materials, allowing the cladding subcontractor to install thermal insulation as well as the cladding panels over the steel frame. The inclined towers were supported on a special base unit with the built-in offset, designed by SGB to transfer the loads directly to the ground. The masts were also supported at the top of the façade and at intermediate points to provide the necessary lateral stiffness.

Rok senior project manager Tom McLaughlan said: "We were

originally going to use scissor lifts with extending platforms, but this presented problems of instability at maximum working height.


Scaffolding seemed to be the only alternative until we consulted SGB who proposed the use of mastclimbers, which it had used on inclined facades before."

"SGB was very involved in the design process, working with us

and the designers to determine the anchor points for the masts and taking into account the position of the various openings in the façade. What started out looking like a very complicated access problem actually turned out to be a straightforward operation that worked well and went very smoothly", added McLaughlan.



The answer to your prayers



Munich's Frauenkirche is currently hidden behind scaffolding in order to deal with serious moisture damage - particularly on the windward side of the building which is costing €500,000 a year. The renovation work currently being carried out on the north tower, is being assisted by a new Geda Multilift P18 Comfort passenger and material hoist supplied by Geda's dealer BNS in Chemnitz, working closely with the Munich scaffolder SGM.

The 90 metre hoist can stop at any one of 23 levels. The hoist's integrated

level pre-selection control system with digital display is simple and practical to use, with each level to be reached selected with the simple push button, like any hotel elevator. The hoist's inbuilt frequency control eliminates jerky starts and stops, while reducing wear and tear on the brakes, track rollers, etc. Numerous safety features have been built in to allow for the combined passenger and material application, including the overspeed safety brake, overload protection with top and bottom limit switches and interlocked safety gates.

A Titanic development

Belfast-based mast climber rental company AER is working with Harcourt Construction on the regeneration of the historic Titanic Quarter in Belfast. Harcourt gave AER the challenge of finding a practical way to provide access to all areas of the Gateway Building, a key part of phase one of the huge project. The building has a concrete frame with an external façade consisting of stone cladding and

glazed screens to a large double atrium.


The solution consisted of a number of single and twin masted Alimak-Hek mastclimbing platforms, equipped for a combination of light duty work and bricklaying. The machines have to be positioned in 30 different

configurations throughout the duration of the project, working at widths of up to 24 metres with


heights of up to 25 metres. AER staff make daily calls to the site in order to ensure that all platforms are functioning as planned and to discuss any fine tuning or platform repositioning. The site was originally planned for system scaffold, but having carried out a feasibility study concluded that mast climbers would be both faster, provide better access and be less costly.

Fitting a loader crane requires careful selection of the vehicle to suit the size of the crane being fitted (see ALLMI Guidance Note 007). Even so, it may not always be possible to achieve the required stability for the rated capacity of the crane through 360 degrees, with some installations requiring reduced capacity in areas, such as over the vehicle cab. In such cases the stability limit has to be found and the rated capacity indicator and limiter need to be

calibrated accordingly, and it is these issues that the guidance note aims to address. It can be downloaded from www.allmi.com





Fall costs £4,700 due to lack of training

Thornett Mechanical Services, of Napier Street, Coventry, was fined a total of £2500 plus costs of £2151.50 on 13th May, following an accident on 2nd December 2008 at a unit in Bilton Industrial Estate, Coventry, in which an employee fell 3.5 metres dislocating two fingers, fracturing his left wrist and injuring his eye socket.

The employee was constructing the roof of a 3.5 metre high acoustic booth. A mobile scaffold tower was used to gain access to the top of the booth, however in order to undertake the roof work, it was necessary for the employee to work on the roof and so two planks were placed on top of the booth to kneel and stand on. He was kneeling on the edge of the booth, drilling, when his drill bit broke, jolting him forward. As a result, he lost his balance and fell onto a concrete floor.

HSE investigating inspector Pam Folsom said: "Thornett Mechanical Services failed to carry out a risk assessment or plan a safe system of work. This could have involved fabricating the roof at floor level and lifting it into position so that the perimeter fixings could then be undertaken from the tower scaffold. or erecting edge protection around the roof's perimeter as the tower scaffold only covered the width of the booth.

"The injured man had not been trained to work at height and his supervisor had not been trained to conduct risk assessments. Furthermore, the supervisor had not done any work at height training himself."

"Such failures are unacceptable, especially as HSE has published a wealth of advice and guidance for employers to help them reduce the risk of falls from height. HSE has also recently launched the 'Shattered Lives' campaign to raise awareness of slips, trips and falls in the workplace."



IPAF lapa training awards

Training award for Lavendon

He also said that it was not possible to put out any cones as it was too close to a busy side road. He also referred to the fact that the company has an exceptional safety record on this site and that it does take safety very seriously.

We agreed to publish his response and explanation of events and all of his written correspondence follows. While we respect that Frank Rodgers is a reputable company we are still unconvinced that it was not at fault in this case. The reader who took and sent us the photos is a safety professional and was totally shocked when he saw this and pulled over to take the photo. Clarke argues, perhaps validly, that if it was so dangerous the photographer should have ran over and intervened, rather than stand and take a photo - Perhaps? The fact is that the machine could have been properly cordoned off, or a different more compact machine used that was able to pull off the road?

I very much appreciated your Comment in the latest Cranes & Access 'When is pricing predatory' I think if we are all honest with ourselves we would like to be able to discuss pricing with our competitors, not that it would be likely to work in this industry. I recall 'in the bad old days' when crane hirers used to get together at industry meetings the discussion of rates was one of the main subjects, that and crane driver's pay. And we did make agreements on pricing, but any such agreement would barely last a week before someone broke it and the whole thing would collapse with recriminations fired back and forth at the next meeting.

However most of us also recognise that any suggestion of such practices is just not even worth contemplating these days, just watch the faces at any association meeting if you even mention the word! It has almost become socially unacceptable ...like drink driving. BUT the laying down of some strong professional guidelines by associations like the CPA, IPAF and others, would be a good start. Other trades or professional bodies (lawyers, doctors etc.) do it in order to foster a professional and consistent approach by their members and if in doubt we can always cite the favorite excuse of the day "It is for Health and Safety reasons" after all as you say in your article changing equipment over mid contract can be construed as adding increased and unnecessary danger - Imagine how a site agent would feel if one of his men was killed while unloading or loading equipment during such a change over?

Perhaps we members should lobby our associations to draw up some solid codes of practice and then be prepared to strike off those who disregard them? I seem to recall reading somewhere that one of the scaffolding associations is starting to do something along those lines and suggesting that contractors should not employ non certified companies.


This was only meant to be a quick note. Just really wanted to say that I like the fact that you are prepared to speak out-we need

IPAF report puts rentals in good position to weather crisis

Rental revenues in Europe for MEWPs peaked in 2007 at almost €5 billion, according to the IPAF European Powered Access Report 2008 released at Intermat in Paris. According to the report MEWPs account for 24 percent of the total European market for construction equipment rental. While the overall market increased by almost 21 percent in 2007, it is estimated to have slightly declined during 2008 and will decline further in



2009 as a result of the current economic crisis.

However, the report predicts that the reduction in rental revenues due to lower overall demand will not reduce the incidence of equipment rental within the various national markets. Lower rental rates and poor credit availability will make rental a more viable option for many users both within and beyond the construction industry. Despite the economic downturn, rental penetration rates for MEWPs are expected to rise.

The IPAF European Powered Access Rental Report 2008 can be purchased at €175 (IPAF members) or €265 (non-members). IPAF has also published the IPAF US Powered Access Rental Report 2008.

Seize market opportunities in difficult times, says United Rentals CEO at IPAF Summit

Access rental companies should face the current economic crisis with "open minds and open eyes" and dare to take strategic decisions, be it changing their sales structure or leveraging on size, said United Rentals CEO Michael Kneeland at last month's IPAF Summit in Dublin.

The chief executive of the world's largest construction equipment rental company was addressing more than 200 delegates who had come to learn more about "Dynamic powered access solutions in difficult times".

"Price is something we shouldn't play with," said Kneeland, highlighting recent United Rentals research that showed customers putting price as their fifth priority. "Your best customer will pay a higher price, because you are giving them something they value. Go out and create value. Be good stewards of the industry."

Commenting on the role of IPAF in the powered access industry, Kneeland said: "That's what excites me about



Top Notch



The Liebherr LG1550 lattice boom mobile crane is an older design which has a maximum capacity of 550 tonnes and can lift to heights of up to 180 metres. It has a range of boom options available and is mounted on an eight axle carrier. This 1:50 scale model is made by the small Taiwanese company YCC which has built a reputation for highly detailed models. The model is licensed by Liebherr but is not sold by them directly.

It comes in some exceptionally high quality packaging, and is complete with good instructions, and technical information about the real machine. As a more complex model it takes a

good few hours to build but the effort is well rewarded.

The underside of the carrier is excellent with very good transmission and suspension components detailed, and they are all-metal too. The tyres even feature the 'Michelin' logo on the outside. This level of excellent detail continues throughout the

carrier, and the metal outrigger beams are beautifully made with hydraulic lines detailed within the castings. The spreader beams and pads contain magnets which allow them to stick together which is a first rate design detail.

The high quality continues into the crane body. The sheaves used are metal and are painted to match the crane colour so they look very good indeed, and the counterweight slabs are top notch, with each one having excellent lifting points and the Liebherr name and weight clearly visible within the casting detail.

Moving on to the boom sections. YCC's skill continues to be evident with fine metal mesh walkways and

Lifting a smaller crane very nice rollers for allowing ropes to run smoothly. Two alternative boom head sections are provided with either 16 or four metal sheaves. Also included is a rooster head/auxiliary boom nose, this difficult section is superbly made with a folding line pulley and tiny rollers to enable it to roll on the ground if needed during erection. Three hook blocks are supplied with the model and this approach is to be particularly commended as it gives the collector flexibility in rigging the crane. Each one is excellent in its

All the crane functions work well, the four winch drums in the superstructure body are accessed by using removable magnetic side panels. This excellent design feature allows the model to be operated without having unsightly access holes in the side of the structure. A strong feature of the model is that

it is made in the modular system which replicates the real machine and can therefore be configured in many different ways.

This model from YCC sets the highest of standards in mobile crane models, at a price of around €640. It is made in limited numbers and some versions are produced in various rental company liveries which suggests that it is likely to hold its value in the longer term. It fully deserves an 'Outstanding' rating.
