### Safe use of remote controls

Following two fatalities in the last few months involving radio remote controls on loader cranes, ALLMI has launched an intensive campaign to raise awareness of the issue and promote the correct and safe use of the equipment.

ALLMI technical director, Alan Johnson summarises: "Remote controls can bring many benefits to lorry loader operation, particularly in relation to the versatility and positioning options they allow the operator. However, they can also create some significant potential hazards and for this reason all operators using them should be periodically retrained and reassessed, as part of or in addition to the basic lorry loader training they receive. In the case of the recent fatalities, it is suspected that the operator failing to isolate the remote control whilst attaching/detaching the load may have been the cause of the accidents and so this will be at the heart of our message. However, there are many other factors which operators need to be aware of when using remotes and the campaign will address these using a variety of tools. Amongst other things, we will produce information leaflets aimed at operators and their immediate

#### Safety Tips for Operators using Remote Controls

- Always check site rules to confirm that the use of a remote control is permitted.
- Always use the belt/neck strap provided.
- The operator must always be aware of the working area, including their proximity to the load and vehicle.
- Never stand between the load and a fixed object such as the vehicle or a wall.
- Never walk whilst operating the remote control.
- Always use in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.
- Always ensure the remote is de-activated when not in use.
- Always store the control unit in a suitable place when not in use.
