Latest hi-tech developments



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To innovate or not to innovate... that is the question

We are living in a period of incredibly fast-moving technical advancement. For manufacturers trying to become the first to adopt and benefit from these opportunities the costs can be very high and the end result is far from guaranteed - so why risk it?

Companies investing in these areas are hoping that the technology will result in game-changing or more cost-effective products that will be widely adopted by customers and give them a competitive edge.

In our feature on page 77 we take a look at the latest hi-tech developments coming on stream such as Virtual Reality and Augmented Reality.

There are however still many technophobes who prefer simple, 'low-tech' machines, that are easier to maintain and repair and perhaps cheaper to purchase. Taking a slightly cynical view, manufacturers not at the 'cutting edge' may benefit by waiting and watching and then adopting new ideas only when they become mainstream and have been proven.

In the aerial lift market some product sectors have changed little over the past 20 years, reducing the incentive for users to replace older machines given that new ones offer little extra in terms of performance. After all, a five to 10 year old scissor, boom lift, crane or telehandler fetches roughly the same rental rate as a brand new one. This is driving the increasing number of older machines being refurbished, giving them a new lease of life for about half the cost of new.

Manufacturers which adopt the 'lower tech' approach can still do well - proving that the latest technology is not everything, so long as the equipment does the job, is reliable and well supported. Some recent developments however, such as outrigger sensing and automatic load chart or working envelope selection do change the game, while others such as on-board diagnostics and telematics are now coming of age as rental companies discover that they can improve efficiency and customer service. Technology such as this almost guarantees to obsolete older machines and provides a powerful reason to replace and upgrade.

Occasionally buyers rebel with a 'back to basics' attitude - usually when technical progress appears to over complicate or have gone too fast - history tells us though that the long-term trend is towards ever greater sophistication. How many of us for example would be happy using even a 20 year old car for our everyday transport? Very few I think.

The current pace of development is breath-taking, with new ideas popping up before previous ones are fully adopted. Augmented Reality is one area that will could take the industry to another level, creating a gap between the hi-tech manufacturers and those who prefer a more basic approach. Those that embrace and develop this progress are likely to reap the greatest long-term rewards.

GMG enters aerial lift market

A new brand of aerial work platforms - GMG or Global Machinery Group - is to be officially launched at Vertikal Days, with a seven model range of slab electric scissor lifts. The US-based company with locations in California and the Netherlands is part owned by Jim Tolle who was recently with MEC Aerial Work Platforms. The identity of the other owners and backers have not been released.

GMG says it is focussing on new equipment for the rental market, including aerial work platforms, earthmoving and industrial machines. It plans to source the equipment from different manufacturers on an OEM basis and will evaluate each product in-depth, redesigning as required. In some cases, a new model may be designed from the ground up and then sourced from a manufacturing partner.

Each model the company adopts will be subjected to a rigorous test programme before being submitted to a leading notified body for third party evaluation and certification. To obtain the lowest prices GMG says it will commit to substantial volumes of each model from the supplier. The company says that each of the above stages have already been completed for the new slab scissor lift line and it already has some large provisional orders subject to customer's evaluating the final production units. GMG has refused to reveal the manufacturer of the scissor lift line apart from saying that it is a 'highly experienced' Chinese manufacturer. The products will be sold throughout western markets.

The first models on display at Vertikal Days include the 10ft 1030-PA, 13ft 1330-ED, 19ft 1930-ED, 26ft 2632-ED, 33ft 3346-ED, 40ft 4046-ED and the 46ft 4646-ED. They are designed to be simple in terms of layout but will feature electric direct drive wheel motors and use proven international componentry. A two year warranty will be provided, and prices will be - according to the company - 10 to 25 percent below current market levels. Further products are planned for launch later this year.

Tolle said: "The GMG team is made up of seasoned veterans, we know and understand the equipment business, we know what works and what doesn't and we know what our customers go through in order to maintain a successful business. It isn't easy for rental companies in today's market to be competitive but still offer reliable equipment and yet remain profitable. GMG products are high quality, innovative, long lasting machines at wholesale pricing, it doesn't need to be anything else."

Catamount launches crawler boom

New company Catamount has launched its first product the 25ft 25.10 telescopic crawler boom. Outreach is limited to 5.1 metres with 80kg or 4.6 metres with the maximum platform capacity of 150kg/one person plus tools. The machine weighs just 2.55 tonnes and an overall width of less than 1.6 metres, allowing it to be towed on a two axle trailer. The new lift uses a three section, octagonal boom, is mounted on low profile rubber tracks with a non-marking option and has Yanmar power.



The Netherlands-based company is owned by Caspar van Woerden of Van Woerden Trading International, who said: "The development work has taken two years with the whole machine - including boom and undercarriage - fabricated by us in-house. Production capacity is around two units a week and we have plans for a larger machine weighing about 5,500kg and with a working height of about 12 to 13 metres."



New 50t Sennebogen crawler

Sennebogen has announced a new 50 tonne lattice crawler crane, the 1100E, the smallest model in its current range. Boom lengths range from 10.3 to 52.3 metres and as with other Sennebogen cranes the 1100E switches into a safe mode when the capacity on the hook exceeds 90 percent of the load chart. It can also lift on slopes of up to three degrees. Overall weight of the basic machine is just 30 tonnes and transport width three metres. Power comes from a Cummins Tier IV diesel coupled to multi-circuit hydraulic system for simultaneous crane operations. A Tier Illa option is available for developing markets. The main hoist has a maximum speed of 125 metres a minute and is driven by a high pressure adjustable hydraulic motor for maximum efficiency.



Maeda has launched a new five tonne mini crawler crane, the CC985, the second model in its new CC mini crawler crane line, joining the significantly larger six tonne CC1485.


The CC985 features a five section 16.5 metre pentagonal boom and a 4.5 metre telescopic swingaway extension for a tip height of 23.5 metres. The air conditioned cab features a rear view camera and seven inch monitor as standard. Pick & carry capacity is two tonnes and overall weight is 9,450kg five tonnes lighter than the CC1485 - and it is more compact, with an overall width of 2.32 metres, overall length of 5.2 metres and an overall height of

compliant Isuzu coupled to a hydrostatic transmission.



A new 22 metre Manitou boom lift

Manitou has launched a new 66ft telescopic boom lift, the 220TJ and a heavier, larger platform + version.



Compact Snorkel RT scissor

Snorkel launched two super compact Rough Terrain scissor lifts, the 22ft S2255RT and 27ft S2755RT with an overall width of 1.45 metres.

Platform capacity is 420kg and 300kg and the overall weight 2,360kg and 2,580kg respectively complete with standard levelling outriggers and 1.2 metre roll-out deck extensions, making them light enough for a standard two axle trailer.



220TJ Manitou

Big platform Multitel

Italian manufacturer Multitel Pagliero has developed a new mega platform truck mounted lift in partnership with Skyworker Trade of Switzerland.

The 10 metre MS100, features a two-section telescopic boom topped by a 3.3 by 1.85 metre platform with a capacity of 400kg and up to 500mm of lateral movement. Mounted on a 3.5 tonne Nissan NT400 Euro 6 chassis, overall width is 1.9 metres including stabilisers. A six metre working height is possible free on wheels, while an hydraulic friction drive provides travel at up to 5kph while elevated.



Compact Versalift

Versalift has unveiled the nine metre LT-23-90-TB aerial lift mounted on a compact Fiat Doblo WorkUp chassis which does not require outriggers.

The new lift features an overall length of less than five metres and an overall weight of 2.5 tonnes with 250kg of spare cargo capacity. Outreach is 4.2 metres and the one-man fibreglass bucket has a platform capacity of



120kg. A capacity upgrade is available as is a detachable tow bar.

Another CTE MP

Seven years after it launched the 20 metre MP 20.13, CTE has decided to take the concept up a notch with the new MP 32.19 on a 7.5 tonne chassis.

The new model has a two-section lower boom topped by the slew ring, three section top boom and a two-section telescopic jib with almost 180 degrees of articulation. The unit offers 300kg platform capacity and up to 19 metres outreach at an up and over height of more than 12 metres.



Larger Almac tracked scissors

Almac has launched two larger tracked scissor lifts, the 33ft 1270-HE and the 39ft 1470-HE.

The new units, do not level from the tracks but rely on jacks which can level the machine up on slopes of up to 11 degrees. They are also fully self-propelled up to six metres.

First Palazzani articulated spider lift

Palazzani has unveiled its first spider lift with an articulated boom, the 32 metre TZ330. The tracked lift is similar to the TCA Falcon FS320Z with a two-stage sigma type riser, four section telescopic boom and articulated jib.

Since then the company has grown at a steady pace and is now home to more than 460 employees with operations in more than 40 countries. The company has been responsible for a number of innovations that have led the market, from a simple Bi-Energy power unit for its small booms, to the SioPs built-in secondary guarding system and the first true hybrid powered work platforms.

Bowden is also passionate about engineering education and involves local schools with the company's engineering projects, while supporting the development of more than 120 apprentices and undergraduate engineers. Niftylift is also a long-term sponsor of the Engineering Education Scheme which nurtures young engineers and he runs an Institution of Mechanical Engineers Development Scheme.

Dinolift unveils 85ft RXT

Dinolift has announced the 85ft 280 RXT semi self-propelled all terrain boom lift, the new machine has two metres more working height than the existing 260RXT at 28 metres, more outreach at 16 metres, more up and over reach at more than eight metres, with a new articulated jib.


New Safety Alert Protocol

The UK's Strategic Forum Plant Safety Group's mobile elevating work platform sub group - whose members include the CPA, IPAF, HSE, CITB, BCSA, FASET, SAFed, NPORS, major manufacturers and a number of major contractors - has developed a Safety Alert Protocol which sets out a voluntary standard for the writing of Safety Alerts issued by contractors following an incident on site that they believe may be related to equipment design, manufacture or maintenance.

The guidance aims to help those writing the alert ensure that it is authoritative and helpful for those that receive it. A standard layout format is included along with clear and concise tips of when and when not to issue a widespread alert.

IPAF technical and safety executive Chris Wraith said: "Safety Alerts are always issued with good intentions, but sometimes omit key information, which can lead to speculation and over-reaction. We hope this protocol will help improve safety whilst maintaining productivity."

Riwal acquires AFI GmbH

Dutch international rental company Riwal has acquired German aerial work platform and telehandler rental company AFI GmbH from owner Günther Aust.

AFI GmbH was established by Aust in 2003 with the support of AFI in the UK although the connections between the two companies ended not long after the German business 'found its feet'. The company runs a fleet of 1,300

machines from nine depots across Germany and 110 employees.

Aust will remain on board as managing director for the next three months and will stay involved as an advisor for at least another nine months after that. Riwal chief operating officer Søren Rosenkrands will be in charge of the integration with Riwal Germany which will continue to be managed by Nick Field.



New 103 metre Palfinger... **Palfinger Platforms has**

launched an updated version of its 103 metre WT1000 truck mounted lift rebranded the P1000.

The P1000 offers up to 35 metres of outreach and variable platform capacities from 200kg at full height or outreach to a maximum of 530kg. It also includes most of the new technology from the company's new Jumbo NX Class. The biggest change is the updated five axle Tadano crane carrier with a new cab and a 600mm narrower outrigger footprint.

...And another new spider lift

Palfinger also unveiled a new 18 metre P180 AJTK spider lift at Apex, the second in the company's all-new spider lift range. The new model follows the P150AJTK launched last year, and will be built in Italy by Palfinger Italia. It offers up to 7.7 metres of outreach, an overall width of 790mm - without

basket - while overall length with platform is 4.44 metres or 3.85 metres when removed. The machine weighs 2,400kg and power comes from a petrol/ gas engine,





New 24m GSR

Italian manufacturer GSR has launched a new 3.5 tonne, Euro 6, 24 metre articulated truck mounted lift, the B240PX.

The new machine features a dual sigma type riser and three section telescopic boom with 12.3 metres of outreach and an up and over clearance of around eight metres. Maximum platform capacity is 250kg with 140 degrees of platform rotation and the new machine is available on either the Nissan NT400 or Mercedes Sprinter MB311 chassis.



New 22m telescopic from CMC

Italian truck mount and spider lift manufacturer CMC has launched a new 22 metre telescopic truck mount on a 3.5 tonne Euro 6 Nissan chassis, the PLA220.

The new model has an innovative open frame superstructure design and offers up to 15 metres of outreach with 80kg while maximum platform capacity is 220kg. Jacking can be inboard or with front outriggers extended to provide the maximum performance though 360 degrees. A 25 metre version, the PLA 250 is on the drawing board for launch later this year.



Hiab delivers first **HiVision**

Hiab has delivered its very first crane equipped with **HiVision Virtual Reality** remote control system to a customer in Sweden.

The Loglift forestry crane incorporates four cameras on top of the crane structure giving the operator a realistic 270 degree view of operations, allowing him to operate the crane from a remote controller in the chassis cab. The first customer Ackestens Åkeri added the option to its latest crane - mounted on a Scania truck - after seeing a demonstration last year. Hiab says that further cranes with the HiVision option are scheduled to be delivered in Europe and Japan later this year.





Financials round-up

First half revenues at JLG fell five percent to \$1.2 billion, sales of aerial lifts were two percent lower at \$603.1 million, telehandler sales plunged 28 percent to \$254.9 million while other revenues improved four percent to

\$354.4 million. Operating profits were 31 percent lower at \$66.5 million, although \$17.2 million of this is due to restructuring charges. The bright news is that the order book at the end of March is up 11 percent to \$723.2 million.



First guarter revenues at Genie /Terex AWP were nine percent lower at \$472.4 although order intake improved 38 percent, lifting the company's

backlog 21 percent. Operating profits plummeted 43 percent to \$21.7 million.





United Rentals first quarter revenues were \$1.36 billion, almost four percent higher than last year. Pre-tax profits for the quarter jumped 10 percent to \$161 million. In light of the results the company increased its full year forecasts by five percent. Rentals

Haulotte's first quarter revenues increased 16 percent to €133.3 million thanks to a 33 percent rise in European and Pacific region sales, offset by slower sales in the Middle East and North America which fell 20 percent.



Terex Cranes has reported first guarter revenues just over 14 percent lower at \$263.9 million, while the company's operating loss increased from \$16.6 million last year to \$32.8 million this year. Order intake was a bright spot improving 17 percent and pushing the order book up two percent.

Cramo reported first quarter revenues of €162.9 million, 4.8 percent up on last year, while pre-tax profits jumped 83 percent to €15.9 million. All regions posted higher revenues and improved profitability. Capital expenditure was almost 16 percent higher at €35.4 million.



Liebherr mobile and tower crane sales in 2016 declined 4.5 percent to €2.48 billion. Of this mobile crane sales were €2.07 billion - a fall of four percent

- while tower crane sales were 6.8 percent lower at €410 million. Maritime crane sales dropped 15.4 percent to €816 million, taking total Liebherr crane sales to €3.3 billion.



Vp has acquired the assets and business activities of the mechanical & electrical equipment sales and rental activity of Jackson Mechanical Services (UK) Ltd - JMS M&E - for £3.6 million in cash. The transaction does not include the JMS Plant Hire -Powered Access Division.

Dutch international rental group **Boels** has acquired UK tool hire company Supply UK Group from its management for an undisclosed sum. Supply UK operates from 25 locations with revenues of £15.4 million and a pre-tax profit of £946,165.



Full year revenues at UK rental group HSS were 9.6 percent higher at £342.4 million, but pre-tax losses increased to £17.4 million from £13.8 million last year. The company is looking for a new CEO.

Sunbelt Rentals, the US arm of Ashtead, has acquired New York-based aerial lift rental company Pride Ashteod Equipment for \$279 million in cash.





UK-based Banner Plant has acquired Premier Plant and Tool Hire which operates from two depots in Leicester. The fleet includes telehandlers, aerial work platforms and scaffold towers.

Speedy says annual revenues should be seven percent higher in 2016, with pre-tax profits well ahead of last year.



Dutch rental company HWS is opening HWS Rental UK in partnership with ex-Riwal manager **Tim White**. The company will focus on long-term re-rental and sales of niche aerial lifts, such as heavy-duty scissor lifts and hybrid boom lifts. It is also working with Collé to distribute AB Lift products in the UK.



Palfinger has reported record first quarter revenues of €361.9 million up 13.5 percent on last year, with most growth coming from its European loader crane business and Russian ventures.



First guarter revenues at Alimak jumped 71 percent to SK776.6 million

(\$88.7 million) thanks to contributions from Avanti Wind Systems and Facade Access Group. Pre-tax profits were up more than 55 percent to SK74.7 million (\$8.5 million).



Hiab has reported record first quarter sales of €270 million a 10 percent rise on last year, operating profit for the quarter was 23 percent higher at €39.5 million. Sister company Kalmar saw revenues fall one percent to €364 million, but operating profits improved six percent to €26.6 million.



Maxim Crane Works has agreed the acquisition of Coast Crane Company

from Essex Rental in a \$72.5 million all-share purchase deal.





Ruthmann has reported record revenues for 2016 and a strong start to the new year. Total revenues were €143 million, almost 25 percent up on 2015, much of it due to the Marti acquisition, now Ruthmann Italia.



Manitou has reported a 22 percent jump in first quarter revenues to €380 million, with order intake rising 41 percent to €433 million, taking the order book to €461 million, up 34 percent on the quarter.

Crawler crane incident report

St James Group - the contactor of the site where the Hitachi-Sumitomo SCX400T telescopic crawler crane boom came down in January - has released a report with full details of the investigation.

The operator was lowering the boom while lifting an 800kg compressor, when the pressure transducer on the boom lift cylinder sheared off causing the boom to descend rapidly. The operator was able to retract the boom and little and slew a little to avoid injuries and damage. The full report is on the Vertikal.Net online Library.

120ft electric boom lift

Riwal has unveiled an all-electric conversion for the 120ft JLG 1200SJP telescopic boom lift. The diesel engine and fuel tank are replaced with an electric motor, large battery pack and charger.

The vast majority of the machine remains unchanged, including the 38 metre working height and 23 metres of outreach, but with zero emissions and drastically reduced noise levels. The company is adding the new machine to its rental fleet but also building units for sale to other rental companies and end users.

Manitou acquires Terex Construction India

Manitou has acquired Terex Equipment Private Limited in Greater Noïda, which specialises in the design, manufacture and distribution of construction equipment, mostly loader backhoes, dumpers and skid steer loaders with revenues of around €30 million - mostly in India and Southern Asia.

Manitou chief executive Michel Denis said: "This acquisition perfectly fits our strategy to reinforce our presence in emerging markets. Terex Equipment Private has a solid dealer network which we will continue to further develop. It will be a strong industrial base for Manitou to develop new product ranges for Asia and emerging countries."

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

Keep on tracking

At the end of last year (C&A Vol 18 issue 8) we compared Rough Terrain and telescopic crawler cranes for work on poor ground. Despite their obvious differences, they offer similar benefits of easy, quick set-up, ability to cope with tough ground conditions, plus pick & carry capability.

The market for Rough Terrains has been sluggish over the past year or two, principally as a result of the economic conditions in the oil & gas sector. Sales however are now beginning to recover. At the same time demand for telescopic crawler cranes has continued to ao from strenath to strenath. albeit from a relatively low, niche base. The telescopic crawler is rapidly becoming a more mainstream product and will be spurred on by several new models that have recently been launched into the market.

Interest in larger capacity telescopic crawlers must surely be based on the increased use and awareness of smaller crawler cranes along with the growth in spider cranes, a concept that began in Japan. These cranes have helped to break down preconceived conceptions encouraging users and buyers to be more open-minded to the benefits of all telescopic crawlers.

Around for a while

Telescopic crawlers have been around far longer than most people put superstructures onto crawler chassis, while in the UK Coles attempted to market a standard product and Kato introduced a product in Japan. In the early days, most crane users did not understand the point of putting a telescopic boom on a slow heavy set of tracks preferring more versatile Rough Terrain or truck cranes. The market for telescopic crawlers was largely limited to a niche end-user purchase, although a few specialist manufacturers - such as Spandeck-Mantis in the USA and IHI in Japan - began to carve out a market from the 1980s.

The whole purpose of the telescopic boom is that it remains with the crane for transport, allowing rapid set-up once on site without the need for booms to be rigged. It was therefore often limited to short term work where the set-up savings were of most benefit. Only a few users appeared to have appreciated the benefits of being able to retract the boom every night, or to travel under overhead obstacles etc. However in recent years there has been enormous development





and improvement in the lifting performance, design and versatility, choice and cost of telescopic crawlers helping spur on further take-up.

The ready availability of telescopic crawler cranes has also been an issue, with most rental companies only purchasing them for specific customer requirements such as on large tunnelling contracts or where the crane had to work or pass through areas with low headroom. As more rental companies have added telescopics to their fleets the more end users have specified them, and the more manufacturers have entered the market.

New crane launches at Conexpo

At Conexpo in March the telescopic crawler was one of the stars of the show, with several new launches from a wide range of manufacturers. On home turf, Link-Belt showed its biggest telescopic crawler to date, the 227 tonne TCC-2500, which is also the largest telescopic crawler crane currently produced eclipsing Liebherr's 220 tonne LTR 1220. There was also new model from Grove, the latest product of its agreement with German manufacturer Sennebogen, two new models from Tadano Mantis and one from Chinese manufacturer XCMG as well as several smaller mini telescopic crawlers from the likes of Maeda, Jekko and Sunward.

Biggest Link-Belt

Most telescopic crawler crane sales fall within the 40 to 120 tonnes range, with larger models quite rare. Liebherr ceased production of its mammoth 1,200 tonne LTR 11200 around two years ago due to the lack of sales, resulting in its next largest - the 220 tonne LTR 1220 becoming the biggest available. So the launch of Link-Belt's TCC-2500 is quite newsworthy.

Link-Belt has been producing telescopic crawler cranes since 2005 and since then has expanded its TCC range to five models ranging from 46 to 227 tonnes. Initially it aimed the cranes at powerline utility applications, where the low ground bearing pressure and ability to cope with rough ground are ideal. However as their popularity has grown, sales to rental companies and general contractors have increased, not only in North America but also in Australia, Europe, South America and Singapore.

In last November's issue just after the first details of the big Link-Belt were announced we compared it with the Liebherr LTR1220, which showed that in terms of boom and overall reach the new crane stacked up well. A few weeks later US crane and access rental company ALL Erection & Crane Rental showed its confidence in the new crane with an order for six TCC-2500s with deliveries spread throughout this year and into the first half of 2018. All Erection president Michael Liptak


The TCC-2500 features a seven section, 67.9 metre pinned main boom, which can be further extended with a three piece -3.6/12.1/20.4 metre - bi-fold extension with up to 45 degrees of offset that can be further extended with two 7.62 metre inserts for a maximum tip height of 105.4 metres. Power for the new crane comes from a Tier 4 Final Cummins diesel. The matching main and auxiliary winches feature extra wide drums that allow it to handle its maximum permissible line pull of almost 13 tonnes through the fourth layer of rope and the rear mounted

Maximum line speed is 123 metres a minute.

The TCC-2500 can self-unload and self-install its tracks and counterweight thanks to its standard jacking system with wireless remote controls. Full working track width is 6.21 metres, while twin bar grouser track pads have standard nylon pad inserts for use on more sensitive ground surfaces. The new crane can pick & carry its entire load chart and comes with load charts for slopes of one, two, three and four degrees.

The operator's cab tilts up to 20 degrees and features a new 10 inch full colour touch screen crane interface which incorporates both rated capacity limiter, telematics system, ground bearing calculator and engine data. The display can


counterweight and tracks - weighs 48.6 tonnes, while the nine-piece superstructure counterweight totals 69.8 tonnes. This allows the entire crane to be transported across most states in eight trailer loads, all seven component loads weighing no more than 20 tonnes.

Grove 30 tonner

At the opposite end of scale Grove recently unveiled its smallest telescopic crawler to date - the 30 tonne GHC30 - with deliveries scheduled from this summer. The new model joins the current three model range that includes the 50 tonne GHC55, 70 tonne GHC75 and the 120 tonne GHC130 with boom lengths up to 40 metres. All four cranes are built by Sennebogen in Germany and are currently only available in the Americas, sold through the Grove/Manitowoc dealer network and fully supported by Manitowoc Crane Care.



Sennebogen has been building heavy duty telescopic crawler cranes for more than 20 years and has its own range of six models with capacities from 16 to 120 tonnes. It entered into the long-term strategic partnership with Manitowoc/Grove just over two years ago. The three larger Grove cranes are based on Sennebogen's standard 653, 673



As with the 50 tonne Grove GHC55 which was launched in 2015 a few months before Sennebogen unveiled its own version the 653E - it is likely that the company will shortly announce its own version of the 30 tonner as it does not yet have an equivalent model in its range.










The GHC30 features a three section 25.2 metre main boom with an optional 6.5 to 13 metre offsettable swingaway extension, taking the maximum tip height to 40.2 metres. It can pick & carry 100 percent of its load chart through 360 degrees and lift on slopes of up to four degrees. The crane has an overall transport width of three metres, is 10.6 metres long, with an overall height of just three metres and a tail swing of 3.3 metres. The tracks can be hydraulically extended and retracted and have three working widths of three metres, 3.75 metres anf 4.5 metres with 700mm pads.

The fully assembled crane can be transported on a single truck, ready to work immediately it is unloaded. The 15 degree tilt cab features air suspension, heated seat and climate control system, a seven inch screen shows views of the hoist, rear and right side camera images and a graphical RCL system. Two engine options are available - a Tier 4 Final Cummins with a Tier 3 model for international markets where required.

Product manager for Grove GHC cranes John Bair said: "We talked to a number of dealers and customers about the telescopic crawler line and about how we could expand the range to benefit certain applications. Customers in utility, energy, construction and barge mounted work for example, indicated that a crane with a smaller footprint, which was easy to transport and offered 100 percent pick & carry ability with a robust, full power boom would help increase efficiency on many job sites."





Smaller capacity telescopics?

Given the growth in the larger capacity telescopic crawlers it is surprising that the smaller crawler cranes have not caught on more rapidly. Perhaps this is because of the wider availability and range of spider cranes from manufacturers such as Maeda, Unic and Jekko? Even the smallest mini crawlers are heavier than spider counterparts, due to their more compact footprint and lack of outriggers. They also include an operator's cab, can pick & carry their full load chart and set up in confined areas, while a spider crane's footprint is huge in comparison to its compact travel dimensions. Over the years, there



have been numerous manufacturers of mini telescopic crawler cranes including Maeda, Marchetti, IHI, Sennebogen and Hitachi.

AGD Rentals based in the UK claims



to have been a pioneer in the European mini crane rental market. It is now more than 20 years since it purchased its first 30 tonne capacity IHI CCH300T which proved popular with construction, civil engineering and piling contractors. But while the CCH300T - and its 50 tonne brother the IHI CCH500T - were popular, AGD has been gradually replacing them with new telescopic crawlers in the 25 to 80 tonne capacity range - most with tilting cabs for improved visibility, ideal for work on road, civil and utility contracts.

Three new five/six tonners

Over the past few months three manufacturers - Maeda, Sunward and Jekko - have launched new mini telescopic crawler cranes in the five/six tonne capacity range.

In recent years the Maeda LC

In recent years the Maeda LC series has led the market, originally available with three, five and six tonne lift capacities (the LC385,



LC785 and LC1385 respectively). This range has been redesigned and rebranded as the CC series, reflecting the fact that Maeda is now using its own tracked undercarriage, moving away from one supplied by Komatsu.

Maeda's new CC1485S-1 is an upgraded version of the LC1385 but still retains the six tonne maximum capacity at 2.6 metres and its 16.3 metre five section boom. However the CC1485 uses a heptagonal shaped boom and is 100mm lower at 2.86 metres. Overall weight has also been reduced by more than a tonne to 14,400kg - with rubber track pads - and features the new Stage 3B engine which is said to be 40 percent more efficient. Overall dimensions are very similar but the tail swing has been reduced by 50mm on the new model and its pick & carry capacity remains at two tonnes. Other new features include a new seven inch monitor with LMI and greater space for the operator by removing floor mounted travel pedals.

Sunward's new crawler

Last year's Vertikal Days show saw GGR unveil a small telescopic crawler crane from Chinese equipment manufacturer Sunward, that it hopes will help it break into the European market. The original model was not the right specification and it was back to the drawing board for Sunward. The new crane will feature on the GGR stand at this year's Vertikal Days this month and is hopefully an indication that the new version ticks all the boxes. The new crane, the 4.6 tonne SWTC5C, is the smallest crawler crane in a six model range that includes a 16, 26, 35, 55 and 75 tonner.

The SWTC5C features a lightweight hexagonal five section 15.6 metre main boom and is powered by a Yanmar Euro IV engine. Sunward says that it plans to add a three tonne and a nine to 10 tonne model at the end of next year.

Jekko SPK60

Jekko has also introduced its all-new six tonne capacity SPK60 mini crawler crane with the optional four section telescopic luffing jib, giving a maximum tip height of almost 28 metres. Maximum radius with the jib is 19 metres. The Italian company was formed 15 years ago as a division of Ormet to develop special spider cranes for the international market which it sold under the Imai brand. It then launched a new range of standard models under the Jekko brand in 2006.

The new SPK60 mini crawler crane has several features not usually found in this size category such as extendable tracks to increase

stability and capacity and zero tail swing allowing the machine to work more easily and safely in restricted spaces. The crane can pick & carry up to three tonnes.

Another feature is that it can be fully operated - including travel - by remote control allowing the operator to be out of the cab and in the most advantageous position for the work being carried out. The SPK60 can be fitted with several optional attachments, which are automatically recognised by the LMI and loads the relevant load chart to the display. The cab features two video cameras for a better view of the working area and a customisable control system.

Major changes have been taking place at the company over the past three or so years and with a growing product line, year on year growth is currently 30 percent. This year it hopes to ship around 300 cranes and move into a new 15,000 square metre facility - 50 percent of which is covered.

The Sunward has a lower maximum capacity than the other two, with a substantially lower overall weight and most likely lower duties through the load chart. On paper the Jekko with its longer boom, greater overall reach and compact dimensions comes out on top.

Tadano adds two more global Mantis crawlers

Tadano Mantis unveiled two new telescopic crawler cranes at Conexpo - the 60 tonne GTC-





600 and 80 tonne GTC-800. Both new cranes have been designed to "meet the needs of the power transmission, bridge, civil and

foundation sectors while expanding the broader appeal of the crane toward the lift crane markets".

Both cranes use the purpose

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designed, Tadano round profile telescopic boom with Tadano winches, jib, hydraulic cylinders, AML-C load moment indicator and Hello Net telematics. Currently only the GTC-800 is CE marked. With Japanese built booms and Tadano design and quality criteria justifying the G designation, we might see the company begin to offer a wider range of these heavy duty telescopic crawlers through its global distribution network.

The larger GTC-800 is already proving very popular with orders placed at Conexpo by US companies Empire and Scott Macon. Empire founders Luke and Paul Lonergan said: "Having seen an increase in rental utilisation and quoting activity with the Tadano Mantis product, we saw the need to position ourselves to better meet the customer's requirements in the Northeast. The new GTC-800's market leading boom length on a crane under 100 tons, along with cutting edge features such as Opti-Width and superior out-of-level charts, make the GTC-800 a definite winner in comparison to the competitors."

The GTC-600 features a full power, four section 36 metre boom, while the GTC-800 is 43 metres. Both cranes offer an optional 10.1 to 17.7 metre bi-fold swingaway extension with offsets of 3.5, 25 and 45 degrees. Maximum tip height is 55.5 metres on the GTC-600 and 60.4 metres on the GTC-800. There is also the option of a 2.5 metre heavy lift jib with a 20.3 and 21.4 tonne maximum capacity that offsets at 3.5 and 30 degrees. The cranes have automatically selected out of level - up to four degrees variable width load charts and full chart pick & carry capability. The 'level' ground load chart is for slopes up to 1.5 degrees.

Both cranes feature Tadano-Mantis' Opti-Width asymmetric track position allowing them to work on a reduced track width on either side, with the position of each track continually monitored by the crane's AML-C system, which sets the optimum load chart for the track positions. The tracks can easily be extended and retracted and the crane can operate in any position. When tracks are set in the middle width, a zoned load chart is said to give up to 50 percent higher capacity than the same track width when in the symmetrical mid track position.

Both cranes are powered by the same Cummins Euro stage IV diesel, while options include a 340kg capacity boom mounted work platform giving a working height of 40.7 metres - almost 50 metres on the extension - and a boom mounted auger system for variable radius drilling.

Chinese crawlers

While Chinese manufacturers are happy to churn out lattice boomed crawler cranes, very few of the major manufacturers produce larger telescopic crawlers. One exception is XCMG with its three new XGC series cranes which includes the 25 tonne XGC25T, the 55 tonne XGC55T and the 100 tonne XGC100T.

A quick comparison of the XGC100T with the Link-Belt TCC 1100 reveals

that on paper at least, the XCMG performs well. It has 10 metres more main boom, a more compact overall length, lower overall height but a wider extended track width. The Link-Belt is however slightly lighter and narrower and has a more powerful engine. In fact the XGC cranes all have very good main boom lengths - the XGC55T has a 11 metre longer boom than the Grove GHC55 - although it is 15 tonnes heavier.

New 65 tonne Hitachi Sumitomo

Yet another new crane is the 65 tonne Hitachi Sumitomo 650TLX. Only brief details have been released so far, but they include a four section 30.1 metre hexagonal profile main boom designed to be strong enough for foundation work. As such the crane features a hydraulic

system that can cope with cycle work attachments such as augers and vibro pile drivers, and offers a third winch with free fall option. The overall transport

width is 2.99 metres and the crane can completely self-assemble.

Also worth a mention are the Italianbuilt cranes from Marchetti and TCM. Unusually both manufacturers offer crawler telescopic cranes with outriggers, improved lifting performance for their weights. Piacenza-based Marchetti produces two cranes - the 70 tonne Sherpa 70.42L and the 25 tonne Sherpina 25.35 - the Sherpa having outriggers allowing it to set-up and level, with a 200 percent higher lift capacities than if working on a four degree slope. TCM has four telescopic crawler cranes from 28 to 70 tonnes capacity with two - the 35 tonne RTC 35 and 70 tonne RTC 70 - having hydraulically extending outriggers.

When US-based contractor Malcolm Drilling was faced with working under a low bridge to drill caissons for a new five-span welded steel box girder bridge project in Glenwood Springs, Colorado, finding the right machine required considerable time and effort. It eventually decided to use a 100 tonne Link-Belt TCC-1100 telescopic crawler crane for the work.

The contract to replace the old Glenwood Springs river bridge which dates back to 1953, involved constructing 26 caissons - drilling a shaft 16.4 metres deep then lowering the rebar cage into the hole before filling with concrete. The resulting piles support the concrete pier caps for the new bridge. The TCC-1100 was chosen because it could pick & carry the 25.4 tonne hydraulic casing oscillator under the existing bridge with an overall headroom height of just 10.9 metres. Once under the bridge the equipment was lifted into place to carry out the caisson construction. When constructing some of the caissons the clearance between the boom head and the girders was just 230mm. The second critical crane requirement was being able to lift a 13.6 tonne rigged pile starter section up and over the oscillator before drilling the shaft.

Access to the jobsite comprises a back-filled access road no more than 13.7 metres wide along the Colorado River and under the bridge. The TCC-1100s boom tip, load capacity and height specifications were key consideration in the crane selection.

Malcolm Drilling superintendent Todd Williams said: "We were constrained with no extra room to move, get the drill spoils out of the way, get the rebar cages to the Link-Belt crane, or to even physically swing and work around ourselves. With so much equipment in such a small space means watching each other's back continually, especially as the concrete was poured after the rebar cages are placed. While pouring continued, the oscillator worked the casings up until the TCC-1100 grabbed and lifted them out of the way."

The new bridge will cross the Colorado River, Union Pacific Railroad and four lanes of Interstate 70 and is scheduled to be completed in May 2018, helping alleviate traffic congestion coming off the scenic I-70 Interstate west of Denver into downtown Glenwood Springs.





Big toys for big buoys

The Tönning Water and Shipping Authority is responsible for the safety on the North Sea waterways along the west coast of northern Germany. This also includes maintaining the large conical-shaped navigation buoys weighing up to six tonnes each that mark the shipping lanes in the water.



The buoys need to be cleaned difficult to see - then they are bi-annually on board a buoy tender ship to remove and repainting. barnacles, mussels and plant

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
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Spiders are buzz

Over the past few years spider lifts have become one of the most exciting and innovative sectors of the aerial lift market. Although one or two Chinese manufacturers have dipped their toe in the market, European companies dominate the market with more than 98 percent of all spider lifts shipped last year coming from - at the last count - 26 European producers. There has been a lot of activity over the past year or so, with at least one new entrant, two takeovers, lots of new models and some major new fleet investments, so it is difficult to know where to start.

It is always interesting to cover a new entrant into the market, particularly when it is an established manufacturer branching out into a completely new sector. The latest to enter the spider lift arena is Palfinger which took many by surprise when it launched the 15 metre P150 AJTK at Bauma last April. In hindsight, the addition of a new spider range was fairly predictable following the acquisition in 2013 of a controlling stake in SkyAccess rebranding it as Palfinger Italia. Its aim was to design and produce a more cost-effective, simpler range of small truck mounted platforms to take on the cost-competitive Italian-built products mounted on 3.5 tonne chassis, the traditional route into the spider lift market.


At the same time fellow German truck mounted platform manufacturer and arch rival Ruthmann also announced its entry into the spider lift market, taking a 60 percent stake in Italy's Marti group, owner of Bluelift spider lifts and RAM 3.5 tonne truck mounts. Given the copy-cat rivalry between the two companies, the news was almost inevitable!

The P150 AJTK is a typical smaller 'Italian' spider with an overall width of 800mm and capable of clearing a two metre overhead restriction. Features include a two-entry point, side opening basket with retractable steps and power is either diesel, petrol or electric. Its unusual tow hook option can be used to attach a trailer for tools, work equipment or materials.

A year on and Palfinger is adding a second model to the range - the 17.7 metre working height P180 AJTK. According to Palfinger Italia's managing director Paolo Balugani, the 15 metre P150 is now in production and two further models will follow the P180 - with 21 and

25 metre working heights - which will complete the range. The fourmodel range will use the basic lift mechanisms and components from its 3.5 tonne Smart truck mount line. The P150 and P180 both feature dual sigma type risers, two and three section telescopic booms and articulated jibs. Booms, cylinders and major components will be manufactured by Palfinger around Europe, mostly at its facilities in Bulgaria, with assembly at Palfinger Italia's head office in Modena. northern Italy.

But what about the 30 metre plus market?

Unlike Ruthmann and Bluelift which has a wider existing range - from 12 to 26 metres - Palfinger Italia surprised everyone last September by signing an agreement with fellow countryman Palazzani to provide branded spider lifts above 25 metres with key changes to differentiate between the products that the two companies sell. This could potentially mean a further 10 Palfinger spider lift models, ranging

from 27 to 52 metres. Although this looks like a win-win situation for both Palfinger and Palazzani, Palfinger will have to be very careful that it maintains its level of product support that customers have come to expect with its other products. JLG for example, also followed the badging route for its range of spiders working with the leading spider lift manufacturer Hinowa. While Hinowa has a very good reputation for product support, JLG still had to invest heavily to ensure that all of its aftersales departments supported its spider lift range in exactly the same way as for the products it manufactures itself, a major undertaking.

Teupen Puma

Although the Puma 42GTX was launched just over a year ago it would be remiss not to mention what is probably the most unusual and interesting spider lift produced so far. The Puma combines the articulated boom and frame superstructure from the 40 metre Teupen Leo40GT spider lift, mated



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to the Swiss-built Menzi Muck M545 4x4 self-levelling walking spider excavator chassis. The end result is an amazing, go-anywhere platform with 42.7 metres working height, 16.7 metres outreach and a maximum capacity of 400kg - 300kg

The lift uses the twin telescopic booms with four lower riser sections and a three section top boom plus short articulating jib. Weighing 17.6 tonnes the Puma has a travel speed of 10kph and can wade through 1.2 metres depth of water.

at maximum outreach.

Overall dimensions are 9.2 metres long, 2.48 metres wide and three metres high. The Puma - developed in partnership with four prospective buyers - can also be used with a reduced working height of 29.7 metres as a fully self-propelled boom lift. In this configuration the chassis is levelled with all four wheels operating at the same level. This would be something like JLG's new auto levelling boom concept displayed at Conexpo which uses a JLG 460J superstructure mated with a self-levelling chassis capable of levelling.

The spider lift's go anywhere capability means it is becoming the platform of choice for a number of applications

On the Puma 42GTX the boom pivot point is located onto a patented adapter that connects to the standard excavator pivot and raises the boom clear of the machine and its moving legs. This allows a high degree of articulation so the unit can travel, walk and climb over all manner of terrain with the centre of gravity moving freely between the four wheels to ensure ideal balance and safety. The current chassis will allow for further models to be developed up to about 54 metres.

Full controls are located in the platform and all electronics and systems are Teupen designed and assembled and fully integrated. The technology includes automatic boom stow and return along with full diagnostics on a large in-cab screen.

The Puma 42GTX is not cheap costing about twice that of a Teupen Leo40 spider lift and is aimed squarely at a variety of specialist applications, from remote pylon replacement and repair, tree maintenance along railway lines and cuttings to working on steep slopes, cliffs, quarries or in ports - anything on rough and/or hard to reach terrain.

One of the first companies to purchase the Puma is the UK's largest specialist spider lift rental company Higher Access which was acquired by rental group Vp at about the same time. Higher Access initially took delivery of two Pumas, part of the 10-15 or so anticipated annual worldwide sales forecast by

As well as the Puma, Teupen has five new T-series models from the 19.2 metre Leo19T to the 35 metre Leo35T. All are available with its latest high strength steel booms, with all cables, hoses and hydraulic cylinders routed internally - on a 1.58 metre wide chassis. The three largest models - the Leo27T, Leo31T and Leo35T - will replace the Leo25Tplus, Leo30T and Leo36T. The new T-series Teupens have high strength steel booms, with all cables, hoses and hvdraulic cylinders routed

All-new T series lifts have a 250kg maximum platform capacity with the Leo35T having a maximum outreach of 19.9 metres with 80kg. Other features include height and width adjustable tracks - hydraulic adjustment is optional. This feature, previously only available on the larger GT models, is now also available on the Leo18GTplus. Teupen will also launch the Leo 21GT later in the year, again with 250kg platform capacity and 12

metres maximum outreach.

With its rubber non-marking tracks, variable widths, levelling capability and multiple power sources, you might be forgiven for thinking that

the spider lift is a 'jack of all trades' platform, suggesting that it only does everything adequately but this could not be farther from the truth and is more than a little unfair as the spider lift is actually the best machine for so many applications and apart from the needs of its outriggers, has very few down sides.

Often the main problem for many mobile work platforms is getting close to the point of work. The spider lift's compact dimensions and low weight not only helps make it easier to transport - with models up to about 22 metres able to be towed behind a 4x4 on a standard equipment trailer - but it also means that it is also able to travel down narrow aisles or passageways, through standard doors, up and down stairs and steep inclines and can cross some of the roughest terrain. And then once in position the outriggers can level the machine up even on very significant slopes. One of the spider lift's few downsides is that while it can drive into very tight situations, it does need considerable space to deploy its legs, although models with variable leg positions help with this. Spider lifts are also among the first aerial work platforms to incorporate lithium ion battery power, often in conjunction with an internal combustion engine to create a type of hybrid machine.

When working indoors their relatively low weight and crawler undercarriage results in a low ground bearing pressure and the non-marking tracks allows them to

operate without damaging delicate floors or surfaces. This go anywhere ability means that the spider lift is becoming the platform of choice for a number of applications from window installation to bridge inspection and tree care particularly with local authorities and public utilities.

Delivery safety issues

As IPAF accident statistics reflect, loading and unloading platforms is the most dangerous activity when it comes to injuries. Spider lifts - due to their narrow stowed width and relatively high centre of gravity - are particularly prone to toppling over sideways, particularly when travelling down ramps and across slopes. A classic example of this went before the UK courts last September when company director Kenneth Thelwal was jailed for 12 months, following the overturn of one of the company's 18 metre spider lifts in January 2014. The machine landed on delivery driver Paul Williamson as he walked alongside the lift using the remote controls to track it to his truck. The investigation revealed that Williamson had not been adequately trained in the use of ramps, the delivery truck or for the new spider lift. The gradient of the ramps were greater than the manufacturer's specification and they were not properly secured to the truck.

Rampless loading/unloading

One solution to the problem of loading and unloading larger spider lifts adopted by companies such as Ommelift, TCA, Teupen and more recently CMC are high lift, high clearance outriggers which raise the machine to a sufficient height and width to allow a trailer to be reversed underneath so that it can then lower itself onto the truck bed. To unload the process is simply reversed.

Teupen has taken this one step further with its purpose-built transport frame which can be specified for transport vehicles up to 10 tonne GVW. CMC has recently launched a new self-loading outrigger system for its 32 metre S32 spider lift. The design incorporates 425mm long pinned extensions which fit within in the lift's outrigger legs to give the machine additional jacking height up to a clear under track height of 1.3 metres with sufficient width to allow a trailer to be reversed underneath.

The leg extensions - made from high strength steel - are connected with two pins on each leg and an internal retention cable. A system of waterproof magnetic safety sensors prevents the machine's boom from operating with the extensions extended in what the company refers to as 'Auto Loading' mode.



New entry level Hinowa

Hinowa is set to launch its new 13.3 metre Lightlift 13.70 Performance IIIS at Apex and Vertikal Days this month. At the bottom end of the spider lift working height range, the new model is entering an interesting sector that appears to be regaining popularity. When spider lifts first appeared on the market 12 to 14 metre machines were the big sellers, but when manufacturers began to offer an extra boom section to take the work height to 15 to 17 metres, sales of the smaller units dried up. With new features and a more mature market, buyers are rediscovering the smaller machines, which are still more than capable of handling a large slice of the day to day applications.

The Lightlift 13.70 has an overall length of just 3.28 metres - with basket removed - an overall width of 870mm and is less than two metres high. Maximum outreach is a little more than seven metres and it has an unrestricted platform capacity of 230kg. Its outrigger


footprint measures 2.8 metres square and power options include a Honda iGX390 petrol/propane, a Hatz 1B40 diesel or Hinowa's lithium ion battery pack option. Standard features include gradient control, which automatically decelerates the tracked undercarriage when driving on potentially hazardous slopes, built-in fork lift pockets, lifting eves on the outriggers, the innovative **RAHM** control and diagnostics system for remote diagnostics and troubleshooting, real time GPS tracking, while a range of optional extras include a wider, two-speed undercarriage with extending tracks.

The 13.70 is also the first model to feature Hinowa's version of the JLG SkyGuard secondary guarding system, which will eventually become standard equipment across the range, while a new basket option features rounded corners and is said to help with positioning the unit close to walls and with delicate manoeuvres say when working in









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Spider lift rentals on a national basis

Hinowa is the world's largest spider lift manufacturer and is experiencing growth in both its own sales and increasing volume through JLG. Product dipped substantially during the recession but has now bounced back and is reaching new levels. The company recently became the supplier of smaller spider lifts to the UK's largest aerial lift rental company Nationwide Platforms, supplying 56 spider lifts this year, following an initial order for 36 machines last year. We understand that another large order may be pending. This will give Nationwide a fleet of more than 100 Hinowas including the 15.4 metre 15.70, 17 metre 17.75 Mk 2, 20 metre 20.10 Mk 2 and the 25.7 metre 26.14. It has also ordered eight 31 metre Teupen Leo31Ts.

This is a major U-Turn for Nationwide, following a decision four years ago to divest itself of all of the spider lifts that it had gained through acquisitions etc.. preferring to re-rent from a specialist spider lift rental company - mostly Higher Access. Nationwide Platforms operations director Peter Douglas said its new 'tracked boom' division has been a fantastic success since launching last year. Originally it focused on the south east region with its initial 36 machines based in Luton but is now expanding the division to provide national coverage this year.

Narrow width

Overall width of any aerial platform is important however for spider lifts the ability to track through doorways and down corridors is part and parcel of their raison d'être. The smaller spider lifts - and some specialist larger machines such as those from TCA - are designed to pass though single doorways, with overall widths in the region of 800mm, while the 26 metre Hinowa has a width of 990mm, and the new 31 metre Teupen Leo is 1.58 metres. The 27 metre Platform Basket Spider 27.14 is therefore an attractive proposition at 890mm, which it claims is the narrowest 27 metre platform on the market.

The tracks will extend to 1.29 metres for improved stability when space allows. It does though come with a hefty overall weight of just over five tonnes. The Spider 27.14 has a double sigma type riser, three section telescopic boom and articulating jib, providing 15.1 metres of outreach, 10 metres up and over height, 230kg maximum platform capacity at up 12.7 metres

- 136kg at full reach, a narrow outrigger setting 400 degrees of slew, radio remote controls, lithium ion battery back and hybrid power and a fibreglass basket option which is now available on all Platform Basket spiders - predominantly to meet demand from arborists.

Platform Basket intends to use a similar 890mm wide chassis on its new 30 metre Spider 30T which it is planning to launch later this year as well as having a lower overall weight than the 27 at 4.3 tonnes. Details leaked prior to the launch suggest the lift has a new design which allows the jib to be stowed


under the main boom without removing the basket, resulting in a very compact transport length. Also all hydraulic and electrical lines will be routed through the boom to avoid damage particularly on tree care work. Other features include full radio remote control with auto outrigger set up and automatic boom stowage.

Platform Basket has also introduced a hoist/winch option on the 27.14 and 22.10 to allow them to be used for material handling work, and now offers the lithium ion battery pack option on every spider lift in the









The smallest Platform Basket is the 13.4 metre Spider 13.80 super compact lithium-hybrid model with eight metres of outreach, a 2.9 metre wide working footprint. Other model improvements include the Spider 18.90 PRO with fibreglass bucket platform, radio remote controls, two speed tracking and auto set-up.

Ommelift hybrid

Ommelift has launched a new compact hybrid spider lift - the 18.40 RXJ - with a working height of 18.25 metres and 10.5 metres of outreach with 200kg platform capacity. The unit is 4.85 metres long when stowed, with an overall width of 790mm and is just under two metres high.

The hybrid lift has an engine and battery power with automatic recharging of the battery pack when the engine is running. Continuous re-charging is also possible using an on-board charger which continues charging even during lift operations. In order to be reliable during long-term usage a back-up transformer for direct mains connection is

included. This provides the user with a variety of options for working both indoors and outdoors. The 18.40 RXJ articulated riser extends vertically in a perfectly parallel line and has a good up and over outreach. An end mounted platform leaves the underside of the platform clean, avoiding the damage which often occurs with pedestal mounted platform connections.

Octopus 23

Oil&Steel was one of the first companies to introduce the spider lift concept to a wider range of rental companies and end users, with its Octopussy range around the turn of the millennium. Some product and corporate challenges a few years back resulted in it losing market leadership and falling behind. But the company, under new ownership with Manitex is making a comeback with several spider lift families, including the Twin, Classic and Evo which are all in the 14 to 18 metre range, as well as the 21 metre Octopussy 2190. Its latest and largest spider to date is the 22.3 metre Octopus







23, with an outreach of 11.5 metres and 200kg unrestricted platform capacity. Overall stowed width is 990mm and it weighs around three tonnes. A special feature is the jib with can rotate by up to 45 degrees either side of the main boom. When coupled with the platform rotation it allows the operator to reach around obstacles or access more difficult areas without moving the machine base. The basket also has water and compressed air outlets and the chassis has one-sided height adjustable tracks for travelling on side slopes etc.

New and unusual

With the total number of manufacturers producing spider lifts nearing 30, there are several that are new or only sell in certain markets. Vertikal Days will see two of these - French access specialist ATN with its new Mygale 23 and

Finland's Leguan with its unusual tracked or wheeled skid steer chassis.

ATN's first and only model, the Mygale 23 offers a working height of 22.85 metres and 11 metres of outreach. Since its official launch last year things have been very quiet, although the final production version of the new lift will be displayed at Vertikal Days this month, and with a new sales manager on board and Alpha Services in the UK to provide local product support, it will hopefully start to make inroads into the market.

Leguan will also be at the event, with its new 19 metre 190 spider lift with an outreach of 9.6 metres and a platform capacity of 230kg, along with the new 16.5 metre Leguan 165 spider lift which is based on the 16 metre L160. The first L165




to be arrive in the UK was delivered earlier this year to Timber-Tech Tree Services. The new model supplied by dealer Central Platform Services - has an outreach of 7.85 metres and 230kg platform capacity. The lift is supplied on a wheeled chassis although it is also available on tracks. The company said that it opted for the wheeled chassis for increased operator comfort and better drive capabilities. However should they require tracks in the future, this model is reasonably straightforward to swop from wheels to tracks.

Multitel

Multitel has expanded on its range of spiders adding the new 17 metre SMX 170 E with Lithium power which has been designed with a transport length of just over three metres and compact enough to fit into a goods lift. The new spider has up to 7.5 metres of outreach and weighs 2,200kg. Layout is similar to the other SMX spiders with a three section lower and three section upper boom.

The existing Multitel range continues with only minor changes - its largest spider the 'go anywhere' SMX 300 HD now has an upgraded cage payload of 300kg as well as adding some new options. The SMX 250 continues unchanged but according to Multitel is the only 25 metre working height platform on the market that can be towed legally on a trailer behind a 4 x 4 pick-up truck. weighing 2,770 kg including soft ground plates. Most other 25 metre or similar working height platforms, it says, are about 500kg heavier. The 19 metre SHX 190 is an all hydraulic, low-cost spider that is simple to maintain - no electronics reliable and basic.

And finally to the Chinese...


Although so much equipment is produced in China, very little sees the light of day outside of the country with only a few manufacturers breaking out into nearby regions, let alone Europe or North America. There are however a few Chinese companies that have shown spider lifts further afield and these include Sinoboom and Goman Lift while Dingli is currently working on a model.

Sinoboom - now producing scissor lifts for JCB - produced its first small spider lift in 2012 and this was to be the basis of a four model range. However currently it has only one model - the 30 metre GTSZ30J with 12 metres of outreach a maximum platform capacity of 200kg - or 80kg at 14 metres, height and width adjustable tracks and remote controls are standard, while overall weight is 4,500kg.

Goman Lift or Hubei Goman Heavy Industry Technology has an extensive range of telescopic and articulated spider lifts from 15 to 53 metres, many of them looking like clones of European models. However its latest model is the 21 metre X21, articulated lift with twin sigma risers, three section boom and jib, with 200kg platform capacity and 9.5 metres of outreach. The X21 is said to comply with EN280 standards, and has CE approval. Hoses and cable are internally routed, and power comes from either a 220 volt AC motor or diesel options. Overall weight is 2,800kg and stowed width 800mm.

Dingli has also shown a spider lift at the odd exhibition in China as it dabbles with the market. The 19.13 metre GTBZ19AS has an unrestricted outreach of just 4.9 metres with 200kg platform capacity, or 6.08 metres with 120kg. Overall Width is 1.45 metres and up and over clearance 7.69 metres.



Hi-tech aids performance and safety! ITIVR

It has been almost 50 years since man first walked on the moon - an amazing achievement at the time considering the technology of the day was analogue and the most basic of computers the size of a house. Since then technology has advanced beyond all recognition, with the arrival of the internet and smart phones and is millions of times more powerful than NASA's computers in the 1960's. The pace of development, far from levelling out is accelerating at a pace far faster than engineers can keep up with.

The lifting sector has seen more than its fair share of the changes, with new developments almost weekly offering better. more efficient ways to buy, rent, maintain, or operate equipment. The buzz word in recent years has been 'telematics' - a combination of wireless technologies and computational systems. The word itself is derived from the French word 'télématique' - a merger of 'telecommunications' and 'informatique' - coined in the late 1970s about the computerisation of society particularly the transfer of information using telecommunications. In the commercial market it now generally refers to vehicle telematics.

Development in all areas still continues apace but with other technologies now taking the limelight. If you thought Virtual Reality (VR) was the latest technology in the lift market, think again. Augmented Reality (AR) is now at the cutting edge with several access companies - such as Platform Basket and JLG - already working on integrating it into their product offerings - but it is still a little way off yet. The new technology sweeping in is aimed at providing easier, more cost-effective and efficient ways of carrying out everyday tasks. It is also no longer just about components but about how those components can connect with each other to create intelligent sub-systems that dynamically adapt



and respond to machine and user requirements.

Radio remote controls

One of the first popular uses of telecommunication technology in the lifting sector was is the radio remote control of equipment such as loader cranes, self-erecting tower cranes and more recently aerial work platforms and spider cranes. On loader cranes take up for remotes now exceeds 60 percent and far higher on larger machines. While there are still users who prefer to keep equipment simple and supposedly more reliable and easier to fix, manufacturers know that the future is in the opposite direction and are driven to develop the very latest technology in order to keep themselves at the forefront of equipment design and production. Remote controls are of course an

extension of the main controls that simply allow the operator to position himself in the best location to see the lift, and even move around the work area to gain a better perspective of the operation or keep a safe distance from the machine when necessary. Manufacturers have strived to make the remote controller consoles as all-encompassing as the main controls on the cab, with ever more comprehensive and sophisticated graphic-displays. Those with built-in screens are also able to integrate camera feeds to display interchangeable live video footage from a number of cameras mounted on the equipment, eliminating blind spots and giving the operator an even better view of the work.

hi-tech

Italian company Autec has been at the forefront of such controls for self-erecting tower cranes for a number of years. Its AIR Series now include dual band radio frequencies - 433MHz and 915MHz - automatic frequency search at start up, this together with automatic frequency search at start-up means better reliability, faster response to commands and fast switching in case of interferences. The AIR also

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includes a four light arrangement for system feedback, two or three-axis digital or analog joysticks, and a user identification function that allows the creation of individualised access avoiding unauthorised use and user tracking. The key holds the unique address of the radio control which is not reproducible and information that defines the operating mode. A tower crane for example typically has sensors that detect the weight lifted by the hook, the hook height, the position of the carriage on the jib, the load moment and the wind speed. Thanks to continual bi-directional communication, information on the status of the machine can easily be sent and displayed on the operator's remote control unit.

SiteZone personal safety monitors

Operator safety is currently one of the biggest drivers of new hi-tech products in the lifting sector. One of the latest to hit the market is SiteZone - a new telematics proximity warning system that uses sensors to alert site workers if they are straying too close to or in the vicinity of mobile cranes, telehandlers, aerial lifts and other vehicles or equipment. By combining it with Trakm8 telematics - which collects a huge amount of data used to score driver behaviour, monitor vehicle health and continuously improve the security and operational efficiencies of customers' vehicles - site managers can spot trends and eliminate

potential accident hot spots.

SiteZone uses RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) to produce a detection zone around the machine or even a restricted area. Using vibration as well as audio and visual alerts, it warns the machine operator whenever a pedestrian is within the vicinity as well as warning the wearer that their safety is compromised.

OverSite - which combines SiteZone's RFID technology with telematics and Big Data analysis from Trakm8 - goes one step further, by providing real-time alerts on zone breaches to site managers, as well as the analytics that contractors can use to identify and eliminate bad practice. Hosted in the Cloud, users can remotely access OverSite via a dedicated log-in. A dashboard provides key performance indicators such as the number of unauthorised breaches of a safety zone and the amount of time spent within it. The user-friendly system also enables managers to quickly generate reports that highlight key issues and trends. This helps companies effectively monitor the interaction on site between vehicles, equipment and personnel. Managers can then use the information take steps to change behaviour or provide re-training. Hot spots - where equipment and people are frequently required to work in close proximity - are easily identified and monitored more closely to help reduce the risk of further incidents.





Virtual Reality and **Augmented Reality -VR** and **AR**

Over the past few years an increasing number of companies have been developing Virtual Reality systems, primarily for training purposes. Most of the pioneers have been the large manufacturers such as Liebherr, Manitowoc and Hiab, although more recently there has been an explosion in the number of smaller software companies developing systems.

A prime example of how the technology is changing helping change the way we work is Hiab's HiVision, a VR remote control system which is now in production and deliveries underway. Developed for operators using its forestry cranes in very cold climates such as in Northern Scandinavia, the system allows the operator to remain in the warm cab and operate the crane from the passenger seat with his back to the crane and the cargo, avoiding the freezing conditions and risks such as slipping on ice when climbing to the elevated operator crane cab. And by doing away with the external cab the weight saved means more timber can be carried.

The system uses a camera with wide angle lens mounted on its own folding mast which sits about a metre above the slewing axis of the crane, giving the operator a 270 degree view of the both the crane and work area. The live image is seen by the operator using VR goggles sitting in the passenger seat with a set of joystick controls to operate the crane. A year after it had its first public showing, Hiab delivered its first crane equipped with the system to a customer in Sweden. The customer says that it only took a short time to become accustomed to the new system and that in addition to the stated advantages it has helped improve productivity, not only saving the time to reach the external cab, but also speeding cycle times, possibly

due to the improved view of the overall work.

VR training

The improvements in 3D graphics and software has provided developers with the ability to create life-like simulations, ideal for operator training of aerial work platforms and cranes etc... Now machine novices and the unexperienced can learn and experience real-life situations some dangerous - in the safety of the training room environment. At Conexpo there were at least five companies offering VR training, some with compact light weight mobile units using a lap-top that can be used on any small table or desk with VR goggles, and others with full mock-ups of crane cabs or work platforms with motion seats or platform floors, both of which add a realistic feel to the audio visual output.

While the goggles are the best option in that no matter where the operator looks he remains in the virtual environment - this is particularly useful for crane operation when looking up to the boom nose and back down to the load is essential - some users can experience a sort of 'motion sickness' as the brain tries to

straddle the real and the virtual.To this end developers find keeping the virtual slightly unreal is best. Even some of the systems that use the large screens, can cause issues as movements in the motion seat reproduce the feel of large variables such as wind speed leading the 'operator' to feel quite queasy. However overall, all of the latest VR systems we have seen and briefly tested provide excellent training on a wide variety of machines, so the system chosen is likely to come down to the user requirements and budget.

AR versus VR?

Many companies are currently working on AR - Augmented Reality - but what is it and how does it differ with VR?

AR and VR are dissimilar but they have one thing in common - they have the capacity to alter our perception of the world. VR can transpose the user to another place through goggles, visor or screens, blocking out everything around. Augmented Reality takes the current reality and adds something extra. One analogy may be comparing scuba diving to going to an aguarium. With VR you can swim with sharks, with AR you can watch a shark jump out of your desk. Italian spider lift manufacturer Platform Basket - using a local software development company - is already demonstrating the first stages of an AR system which it plans to use to provide full information on each of its products. The long-term aim is to

provide users with details about

each machine such as workshop

and parts manuals via a screen

or Smart phone - all paperless.

Although still in the earlier stages it currently has all the performance information and a 3D scalable and rotatable image with features such as changing the colour schemes and adding or removing the various machine options, similar to an online car configurator. As the system advances it will include a breakdown of the machine with full parts diagrams and information on diagnostics and repairs.


There are already a large number of systems that can collect an enormous amount of data from machines but what can we do with it? If there is a technical problem most machines can now generate a general fault code which can be transmitted remotely to the manufacturer or communicated by more traditional means. However, there are already products on the market, such as the Haulotte Activ Screen, that indicate exactly what and where the fault is with a full colour illustration and can even explain how to fix it! It is all about using the mass of data being generated in a user friendly interface.

Boom and hook cameras

While the original Orlaco boom tip camera has been on the market for more than 15 years, lower costs and high definition cameras are making the technology more widely available and adoption of such systems is on the increase making lifts safer and more efficient by giving the operator a clear view of the load and surrounding area, even when it is out of direct view. This is such an obvious benefit that it must someday soon become standard equipment.

BlockCam is one of the more recent

wireless camera introductions, it can easily be installed to the hook block or boom tip of the crane with the live HD 1080p audio visual feed transmitted via an antenna system to a high definition screen in the cab. The information allows the operator not only to clearly see the load and surrounding area, but also hear what is going on and even receive instructions from the signaller/banksman without the need for a radio. A BlokCam system can be installed in about an hour with the high-powered magnets attaching external components to the hook block or boom nose. The camera feed can not only be seen in the high definition screen but also be recorded on a 30 day continuous loop or transmitted for later use or live lift monitoring.

Improvements in communication technology, computing power, higher resolution cameras and vastly improved batteries, together with highly accurate GPS is changing the way machines are designed, work and interrelate at a pace which manufacturers are only just beginning to understand. Those who grasp the potential at the right time will reap the rewards.



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

The dangers of overhead power lines

South Dakota-based Black Hills Energy and the Black Hills Electric Cooperative have joined forces to provide overhead power line educational sessions and demonstrations for school children.

The most recent event included a session for 60 pupils from the Hot Springs Elementary school at Black Hills' depot in Hot Springs, South Dakota. The company used its trailer mounted demonstration rig to show what happens when a person makes contact with an overhead power line. The children then went outside to learn about its aerial lifts and how they are used with some of receiving a hands-on demonstration. The sessions are aimed at educating youngsters on the dangers of electricity while perhaps interesting some of them in a career in the utility sector.



Who trained them then? Spotted by a reader in the Netherlands, a man working from a boom lift we believe in Louisiana, USA. His large boom lift does not have quite enough reach and height so he decided to get by with the help of a large ladder. We assume he lived to repeat the exercise.



Fall after leaving the platform costs £63,000

Kingmoor Park Properties of Cumbria in the UK, has been fined £55,000 plus costs of £8,599 after employee David Gill fell six metres through a skylight after stepping out of the platform of a boom lift while working on the roof of a building at Kingmoor Park, north of Carlisle.

Gill, in his fifties, landed on a conveyor and suffered a punctured lung and 17 bone fractures. The building was locked at the time and his son, who was working with him, was unable to get in to help him, in spite of trying to smash his way in with a hammer. Gill managed to drag himself to a fire door and escape in spite of his injuries.

Their routine duties included unblocking gutters and non-specialist roof work such as fixing leaks - typically two or three times a month. If a roof repair was major, they would call in specialist contractors. The company's health and safety manual included a general risk assessment for the work platform the men used, but had not been brought to their attention, although they had attended a one-day training course in the safe use of the platform. In spite of this they were not harnessed in at the time.

On the day of the incident in April, 2014, Gill and his son used the boom lift to patch one roof and then looked at another roof job but decided to bring in a specialist. However Gill senior went back on the roof to retrieve some tools when the skylight gave way. He spent a week in hospital and was off work for three months. The prosecutor said: "It is accepted that there was no risk assessment and no safe system of work to address the risks of working at height. Neither Gill nor his son had been given training for roof work."

Kingmoor chief executive Ross Nicholson pleaded guilty on behalf of the company to a breach of health and safety law. Its lawyer said: "The firm is decent and reputable and had an unblemished record. Its response to the accident was exemplary, it had quickly settled a civil claim, compensating Gill, and given him full pay while he was off work and fully supported his son and wife. There were no systematic health and safety failings and the two maintenance men had used work at height equipment before. It is not as if they were not provided with personal protection equipment. They had all the equipment with them which would have allowed them to do this work safely. They were both aware that the roof lights were fragile. The firm also employs a health and safety contractor."


A statement said: "Kingmoor Park Properties deeply regrets the accident, which has been deeply felt by all in the company. Prior to the accident, the company had a good health and safety record and takes health and safety seriously and had no prior enforcement actions in 17 years of trading. The safety of employees has always been of paramount importance and it was not appreciated at the time that the documented work procedures were not sufficient."



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IPAF spans the globe

IPAF has posted another year of sustained growth, with a 6.6 percent increase in international membership and a 12 percent rise in annual revenues. 158,727 people completed an IPAF training course in 2016, almost 10 percent higher than in 2015, while the number of certified IPAF training centres increased to 680. Further new centres have joined in 2017, including Reachmaster in Houston, Texas and Boogart Technical in Kitwe, Zambia. In the UK and Ireland IPAF membership increased 3.5 percent to 466, while the most rapid membership growth came from Turkey - up 75 percent, China - 39 percent and the Middle East - 31 percent. IPAF issued a record 150,458 PAL Cards in 2016 up 10 percent on 2015.

IPAF chief executive Tim Whiteman said: "With new powered access standards being introduced around the world and businesses concerned about how best to become compliant, IPAF training is still the global 'go-to' for operators and site managers alike. Our fantastic and hard-working network of trainers continues to expand, and it is their hard work and commitment that makes IPAF's voluntary training programme such an enduring success. The safe use of powered access machinery is the same wherever it is operated and IPAF aims to help operators and managers become compliant with the latest standards and to promote the safe and effective use of this equipment all around the world."

IPAF white paper on new North American standards

IPAF draft service technician guidance

Who is qualified to maintain Mobile Elevating Work Platforms is one of the questions that has vexed the powered access industry for some time. Now IPAF has taken the first steps towards developing internationally recognised qualifications for work platform technicians. by partnering with industry associations to develop new guidelines, outlining three different levels of service technician, and setting out expected skill-sets and competencies for those employed to inspect and service platforms. The first draft is now ready to be shared with the wider access industry, in order to develop the new framework and the terminology employed.

The draft guidance proposes three distinct levels of service engineer: Technician - a mechanic with mechanical training or experience but not necessarily aerial lift specific, a MEWP/Aerial

Technician, who is trained in the safety aspects of maintaining aerial work platforms and a MEWP/Aerial Master Technician, denoting specific qualifications for the appropriate machine and system, authorised to

perform all aerial lift maintenance. including non-standard procedures. The new framework also recognises an entry-level Apprentice Technician.

Tony Groat, IPAF's North America Manager said: "We initiated this more than a year ago as a by-product of discussion around standards development. We hope once the new framework is finalised it will help companies outline the expected competencies for each type of technician to their employees and ensure that inspection and maintenance tasks are being carried out by individuals with the appropriate level of knowledge and experience. We also hope it will allow the industry to identify skills and knowledge gaps and develop new training courses to assist technicians to skill up and

to attain the next level of competency in the framework. Chief executive Tim Whiteman added: "The industry long has struggled to define appropriate

language that may be adopted within industry standards to address service technician training and presently relies quite heavily on 'on the job' training. It was felt that there is a need for greater industry guidance towards standardisation, which prompted this project. We began with small group of members looking into it, which opted to begin with a short, concise document to increase industry buy-in and discussion. It is now time to expand the consultation and maximise the industry voices involved developing the draft, we hope that the industry as a whole will engage with the outline guidance and help take it forward into something that can provide a platform for industry recognised training and qualifications to be developed."

Committee overview & updates

Early 2017 has been a busy period for ALLMI's committees and board, with each of them meeting throughout March and April.

ALLMI Training Standards Committee

Having the important role of developing and maintaining ALLMI's training standards, the committee met in March to discuss a forthcoming update to the association's operator course, as well as a Continuing Professional Development (CPD) facility which will soon be launched through the ALLMI website.

ALLMI Technical Standards Committee

As the consultative body for all technical and legislative aspects of the association's activities, the Technical Standards Committee met in April with the key task of reviewing new ALLMI Guidance Notes covering Thorough Examinations and Work at Height, both of which will soon be published. The committee also reviewed draft guidance for persons conducting Thorough Examinations on loader cranes mounted to waterborne vessels, a document which ALLMI is producing in conjunction with the Maritime and Coastguard Agency.

ALLMI Operators' Forum Executive Committee

The Executive Committee is elected by Operators' Forum members in order to represent their interests and progress matters on their behalf. Many of its activities feed into those of the Training and Technical Standards Committees, providing a fleet owner perspective. The committee's meeting in April focussed on a wide range of important issues, including the auditing of members, recruitment/ retention, and also lone working, a subject for which ALLMI will develop a Guidance Note in 2017.

ALLMI Board

The board is elected by members to oversee all ALLMI activities and is responsible for managing the direction of the association. The board meeting in March included a discussion on ALLMI's current projects, as well as agreeing that a new area of the association's website would be developed in 2017, aimed specifically at promoting the lorry loader industry to young people and facilitating their contact with member companies. It was also confirmed that a new Guidance Note would be produced covering the subject of on-site risk assessments, procedures and behaviour, all in relation to service/repair work.

ALLMI chief executive Tom Wakefield said: "ALLMI's board and committee structure is fundamental to the running of the association. We are extremely fortunate that member companies, training providers and affiliated organisations, such as the HSE, are willing to commit valuable time to work on ALLMI matters, as their input facilitates the continual raising of standards for the betterment of the entire lorry loader industry."



ALLMI Membership Event 2017 - 11th October

ALLMI will build upon the success of its previous Membership Events with an industry wide get together at the Forest of Arden Marriott Hotel & Country Club in Meriden on 11th October this year. ALLMI chairman, Mark Rigby said: "Although we are still in the very early planning stages, we have already received a great deal of interest in what continues to be the largest gathering of lorry loader professionals in the industry's calendar." EN 12999 update

The revision to EN 12999 is currently being finalised and should be published in the coming months. This European Standard specifies minimum requirements for design, calculation,

examinations and tests of loader cranes, and their mountings on vehicles or static foundations. Look out for updates in future issues of Cranes & Access, including ALLMI's guide to the changes this will bring.

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Removal of annual **MOT** exemptions

The Department for Transport is proposing to remove certain vehicles from the list of exemptions from the annual Heavy Goods Vehicle MOT test. New legislation is planned to be released this month and if it is enacted, will come into force in May 2018. The vehicles affected will include mobile cranes on a lorry/commercial truck-based chassis, mobile concrete pumps, vacuum excavators and truck mounted aerial work platforms. This will effectively mean that these vehicles will be subject to the annual HGV MOT test from the proposed date of May 2018.

However, mobile cranes on bespoke chassis, which make up the majority of the UK fleet, will remain exempt from the annual MOT test, as they come under the STGO (Special Types General Order) regulations. To assist its members demonstrate the roadworthiness of their mobile cranes, the CPA, with the approval of the Department for Transport, is drawing up a voluntary roadworthiness inspection and testing scheme, based on the current HGV MOT. The aim is provide CPA members with a robust scheme, having the required degree of independence, to demonstrate to both customers and the public the effectiveness of their maintenance regimes. Further information will

be released by the CPA as soon as it is available.

Research on telehandlers

overturning

The Health & Safety Executive (HSE) has released a report entitled **Exploring the Human and Physical Factors Associated with Telescopic** Handler Overturning or RR1085 for short. The research was undertaken to identify human factor issues that may contribute to overturning incidents and to identify any operator knowledge gaps that may increase the probability of overturning.

The report noted that a combination of machine instability and human factors were important aspects of overturning incidents. A telehandler is more likely to overturn when the boom is raised or





extended whilst on soft or uneven ground. This causes lateral (side to side) instability and not longitudinal (front to back) instability. Some operators were not aware of the factors that cause lateral instability, and weaknesses in site management and supervision further increase the risk of overturning. The report concluded that the installation of lateral instability warning devices could help reduce overturns by warning operators before a critical threshold is reached.

The Strategic Forum Plant Safety Group, chaired by the CPA, has already produced comprehensive guidance on safety with telescopic handlers, including the handling of suspended loads and operator training requirements. The work undertaken by the group is noted in the HSE's research report and the group both welcomes the report and is satisfied following analysis of RR1085, that the factors noted around overturning issues are already contained with their guidance. The RR1085 report and the Strategic Forum Plant Safety Group guidance documents can be downloaded free of charge from www.hse.gov.uk and www.cpa.uk.net respectively.

and facilities managers involved in working at height in the City of London and beyond.



Price cut for Good Practice

Guidance

NASC & CISRS support AIF

NASC and CISRS took an active role in the recent Roof Work and Work at Height training event, organised by the Access Industry Forum as part of the Working Well Together campaign. Other than the inspection module which required us to split the group into Basic and Advanced inspection all other information passed on was relevant to both grades of cardholder."

Eligible delegates who took part in the pilot courses will receive their updated CISRS card with CPD, Inspection and Aluminium Tower module endorsements free of charge. CISRS is considering more funded pilot courses, prior to the scheme going live in July, after which all CISRS Scaffolder and Advanced cards can only be renewed by completing the CISRS two day Scaffolder Refresher Course.

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Genie **Z-60/37FE**

The Genie Z-60/37FE is a 60ft articulated boom with a working height of just over 20 metres, and a maximum outreach of 11.2 metres. It comes in two versions - the FE version is a Fuel Electric hybrid. while the DC version is battery only. Both versions weigh under seven tonnes and the real units feature direct AC electric wheel drive motors. NZG Models has produced 1:32 scale replicas of both machines with the differences being the graphics and the colour of the tyres. The model reviewed here is the FE version.

There is no detail underneath the model, with the undercarriage hollow, and with a purely functional layout. It is metal and there are simple graphics at each end. The rubber tyres have a realistic tread pattern. The model rolls well and the steering axle also has some oscillation. The steering angle is very good.

The superstructure body has a heavy feel and a nice curved shape. The detailing though is limited to the indented Genie logo to replicate the cast counterweight on the real machine, and a control panel on one side which has the emergency stop button highlighted.

The dual riser and telescopic boom



sections are engineered in metal with fairly discrete connection rivets, and the hydraulic cylinder barrels are plastic with simple pipe detail, but there are no hoses shown on the model. The riser section of the boom works well and the cylinders are stiff enough to hold a pose.

The main boom lift cylinder also has reasonable stiffness. The telescope section extends smoothly and there are three locking positions.

The platform is mounted on a small metal articulated jib with a full range of movement, and the platform rotation works to a full 90 degrees in each direction. The guardrails are metal and there is a nice mesh floor, and a simple control console is modelled.

At full height this is a big model some 600mm tall, which is close enough in scale to the real machine, and it is stable at full reach too. NZG has produced a nicely engineered model of the Z-60 and it is typically heavy with a high metal content. The detail level is not high, but the model looks good on display. It costs £85 from the Genie web shop.

The following open letter was sent to the CPA by contractor St James Group, regarding an incident in London with a telescopic crawler crane. The letter refers to a report that has now been published and fully details the cause of the incident. The report is an ideal document which provides lessons for rental companies, manufacturers and end users alike. Imagine how safety and development would progress if this was the response to every incident?

St James Crawler Crane Incident (9th January 2017)

On 9th January 2017, a serious incident occurred at a St James Group construction site that involved a Hitachi-Sumitomo SCX400T hydraulic crawled crane.

During the lifting of a compressor, the crane's boom began to rapidly descend toward the ground due to a mechanical system failure. The incident was reported to the Health and Safety Executive as a Dangerous Occurrence on the day of the incident (F2508 reference: 57D39D61 DF).

A joint investigation was undertaken with Eagle Crawler Crane Hire Ltd (the crane owner) and NRC Plant Ltd (UK distributor for Hitachi-Sumitomo Cranes).

All parties have agreed that the direct cause of the telescopic boom collapsing, was the fracturing of an adaptor that mounted a hydraulic gauge snubber and pressure transducer to the hydraulic actuator supporting the telescopic boom. The 'hole' left by the adaptor allowed hydraulic oil to leak out of the system and the boom to rapidly collapse to a horizontal position.

NRC Plant have confirmed that the mounting adaptor was fitted as original equipment to the crane by the Hitachi Cranes European importer/representative. An independent report by Penenden Engineering suggests that the likely cause of the adaptor fracturing was metal fatigue - Hitachi Sumitomo do not specify a service life for the failed part.

We draw this incident to your attention, as we believe there is a potential misperception within the construction industry, that hydraulic cranes are fitted with check valves that prevent hydraulic system failures resulting in such incidents.

St James Group deem it has a professional and moral duty to raise this potential design failure with the CPA Crane Interest Group. Could we ask that you please bring the matter to the attention of your members and in turn raise the matter with manufacturers.

We would be willing (subject to legal approvals) to share the CCTV footage and reports, if you so request it.

Staying on safety bulletins we received three letters/emails this month on a new protocol for the writing of Safety Alerts mainly because we were a little slow to publish it online. The fact is that a well-meaning contractor's health & safety officer may draft what might be intended as an internal alert to warn colleagues of an incident involving a machine, often standing down similar machines while an investigation continues. The problem is that those receiving the alert share it with friends at other companies and within a few hours it goes viral causing a major issue for a specific machine which may well not have been at fault in the first place.

Dear Leigh,

The Strategic Forum Plant Safety Group - MEWP Safety Group has published a Safety Alert Protocol following members' concerns of specific instances where safety alerts had either been issued with incorrect information, or without notification or consultation with parties identified in the bulletin or recirculated bulletins years after the original incident.

As you are aware, the circulation of factually incorrect, misleading or poorly written information contained in a safety alert can and does repeatedly cause unnecessary confusion within the industry. Once issued the author loses control of the document, as it is passed from company to company around the world, often being re-issued or rebranded with a different company letter head and frequently re-appearing years after it was first issued. In some cases, the misinformation has had the opposite effect to that intended by the author and negatively affects confidence with a specific machine or manufacturer, which may ultimately compromise safety in the workplace. It was specifically to address these concerns that the Safety Alert Protocol was drafted and approved by the group.

The document is now being presented to other industry groups such as CONIAC, CPA's Cranes Interest Group and BuildUK, for their consideration with the hope that it can be adopted, supported, promoted, by other organisations and for other types of plant, bringing uniformity and consistency to address an issue that goes beyond aerial work platforms and the UK market.

I have been watching the Vertikal website in the hope that you would publish a news item bringing the document to the attention of your wider readership, but as yet have not seen one. Is that for any specific reason? Did you receive any notification from CPA or IPAF? I would really appreciate it if you would consider publishing a news article bringing it to the attention of the industry. Or if you feel that is not possible I would love to understand and appreciate your reasoning.

This letter was an amalgam of two of the letters we received and given that it mixes words we thought the right thing to do was not to publish the writers names. As to why we did not publish the announcement right away? No reason apart from pressure of too much work for our small staff with a spate of exhibitions and events in the first few months of the year. And it then got overlooked for a week or two. 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
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
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














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Dear Leigh.

I hope you are well.

Please see attached some photos of our Grove GMK4100L crane that 'rolled over' last Thursday evening. We are all very quick to publish our 'good news' stories (eg, new crane arrivals, recent project awards, pictures of spectacular lifts and events we are involved in) but the reality is that events like this incident happen us all and if we all were to share our 'bad news' stories it might serve to:

- 1. Highlight the risks to some who may not know.
- 2. Maybe help avoid a similar event occurring to another company.
- 3.Detail the impact an event like this has on a) a small company like ours b) those involved in the recovery operation & c) the environment.
- 4. Discuss preventative measures.

The crane was being escorted along a route that was unfit to carry it and despite HEROIC efforts by the operator to save it - the road split and he hadn't a chance.

Our operators are told that, in the event of road subsidence - make every effort to extend the outriggers on the 'good side' and if the ground is good enough to carry the crane for such time that 1 x (or better with 2) excavators can be sourced to apply weight on the outriggers - this acts as a levering effect that will stabilise the crane and in many cases be sufficient to allow the crane to be removed using crab steer. (this is the best tip I can offer any crane user - it should be discussed with all operators as it DOES work).

So no, the crane wasn't driving with its outriggers extended as I have heard said, what a ridiculous, ill-informed comment.

The crane is upright again after 4 days of hard work by a fantastic team of lads, but it will be a further 3 - 4 days before the operation is complete to allow time to safely remove the recovery crane and winch vehicle, gather up all the equipment that was required, and to reinstate the surrounding area to leave it as it was prior to the incident.

I will issue a full report in the coming days, but I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who helped with the recovery, the many offers of help and assistance, texts and e-mails of support etc and also to advise the 'haters' that you should not laugh at others misfortune because it is very true that this is indeed, 'out there waiting on us all'.
