When to show and tell?

Welcome to the largest ever issue of Cranes & Access - all 124 pages!

As well as the usual industry news and features, this bumper edition includes the Vertikal Days show guide. Over the past 12 years Vertikal Days has grown to become one of the largest crane, access and telehandler events in the world - with more lifting equipment than Intermat and a decent number of new product launches.

The benefits of launching new products at a show are obvious but it puts pressure on manufacturers to announce or launch machines to a timetable not related to either the development programme or product availability.

Every salesman loves a new model, particularly if it has the latest features and/or improved performance etc. An exhibition launch helps build excitement and encourage buying decisions. But how often have we seen machines displayed which then take forever to reach production, by which time the customer, and even the salesman may have lost interest. Worse still, the machine ships before it is ready to face the challenges of a real job site.

The crane industry is arguably the worst culprit, primarily because of the size and complexity of the product. Terex's '1,200 tonne class' AC1000-9 All Terrain crane is an oft cited example. Having been announced in 2006 with orders booked as early as 2008, it appeared on the Terex stand at Bauma in 2010 but the first unit was not delivered until the end of 2012, six years later!

Japanese manufacturers on the other hand are 'criticised' by dealers for the excessive time taken between prototype testing and availability to sell. Their culture demands that the final product be 100 percent right before the first orders are taken and is probably the reason why Japanese products tend to be so reliable from the off. Tadano's new 60 tonne ATF60G-3 was announced at Bauma 2016, but it was not until Intermat last month that the company finally agreed to open its order books for the new crane. Such delays are frustrating for sales people itching to start selling and to customers wanting it in their fleet. And don't even mention Tadano's triple boom 600 tonne ATF600G-8!

Delays can also affect the perceived image of the product as people imagine problems that might have caused the delay. Everyone likes a new product but the time between unveiling it and delivery are critical. The media must accept some blame in this process, we love to publicise new models as early as possible, with 'scoops' and sneak previews stirring up demand, even though the product may be years away.

Perhaps manufacturers should not divulge any information until a product is truly ready? Terex has learnt the lesson of premature launches, and now says that products will only be promoted when they are ready for market. A wise move, but difficult when a competitor announces a similar product way in advance of it being available creating interest and perhaps orders. Manufacturers might do better to be more open about development progress and timescales? Shows such as Vertikal Days are ideal venues to see products in the metal - prototypes and the finished articles - and discuss future developments.

However even if a product is ready for production, the next problem is long lead times as initial orders flood in.... but that is another issue.

Largest flat top in the UK

The first 50 tonne Linden Comansa 21LC750 has been delivered to London-based tower crane sales and rental company City Lifting, making it the largest flat top tower crane in the UK. The 21LC750 usually has a maximum capacity of 48 tonnes but has been modified to achieve the higher capacity by using a new lighter trolley and hook set, along with compact wire rope.

The crane has been installed on the site of a new 14 storey hotel next to Terminal 2 at Heathrow Airport, London. It has a freestanding height of 51.3 metres with a jib length of 55 metres and can handle 16.2 tonnes at the jib tip or 17.28 tonnes when using the standard PowerLift system. The crane will be used to lift prefabricated modules weighing 13,200kg.

City Lifting owner Trevor Jepson said: "We are convinced that when the crane finishes this project we will receive plenty of rental enquiries, because the trend in construction is to use heavier prefabricated units and cranes like the 21LC750 will be increasingly required by contractors to work in a quick and efficient way."

CPA publishes plating and testing details

The UK exemption for the plating and inspection of larger truck mounted lifts and cranes on commercial chassis is ending. In order to help crane and access companies, the CPA has published a Technical Information Note highlighting the government's transition plans for the change in the rules which mean cranes or large platforms mounted on standard HGV type chassis must now have a valid Goods Vehicle Test Certificate and plate, or proof of a valid safety inspection at the time of the first Vehicle Excise Duty (VED) renewal date after May 19th 2018.

Until the renewal date arrives, vehicles without the test certificate must carry proof of a safety inspection - as opposed to general maintenance inspection - which has been carried out by a competent/qualified person. All Terrain, Rough Terrain or other cranes and platforms on custom chassis are exempt. Kiloutou acquires Butsch & Meier

French international rental group Kiloutou has acquired German powered access and telehandler rental company Butsch & Meier. Butsch & Meier operates from 13 locations in South Western Germany, mostly in Baden-Württemberg, including Freiburg, Baden-Baden and Karlsruhe. The company runs a fleet of 470 aerial work platforms and telehandlers and is a member of the Systemlift network of independent rental companies. The move follows last year's acquisition of Hamburg-based Starlift.

Kato updates City

cranes

Kato will launch new versions of its 13 and 20 tonne City Cranes later this month. The new models the CR-130Rf and CR-200Rf retain most of the structural aspects from the CR-130R and CR-200R including the



24 metre, six section boom and 5.5 telescopic offsetable jib on the CR-13, and 28 metre boom, 5.8 metre jib on the CR-20 but include a host of new features such as:

- New cleaner Stage IV diesels Hino on the CR-13, Cummins on the CR-20.
- A higher 62 kph/38.5 mph maximum road speed.
- A completely redesigned operators cab with greater glazed area, improved information displays and a slew of operator comfort features.
- Automatic outrigger levelling with five extension widths, a standard Parking Distance Assist system with sensors front and rear, rear view cameras and standard two position 3,000kg searcher hooks.

Hiroshi Ide of Kato said: "Introducing new models to the European market and growing our product range together with our customer base in Europe is a key focus for us. The Rf Series are impressive machines and we look forward to delivering the first units over the Summer."

Colin Cleary managing director of Kato dealer Rivertek Services added:

"We intend to display the new models for the first time in Europe at Vertikal Days. Many of the enhancements and new features are a direct result of feedback between Kato engineers and UK crane users."

UK rental company Total Solutions High Access has ordered two 50 metre Teupen spider lifts, a Leo 50GT and a Leo 50GTX. The Leo 50GT has a platform capacity of 200kg with an outreach of 17.1 metres or 20 metres with 80kg.

The 50GTX has a platform capacity of 400kg which it can take to 13 metres, or 15.2 metres with 200kg. One of the lifts sold by Teupen dealer Alfa Access Services will be displayed at Vertikal Days.

Geda and Arcomet to develop tower crane hoists

German Hoist manufacturer Geda and Belgian international tower crane rental group Arcomet have formed a strategic partnership to develop accessories for Geda's tower crane operator hoist.

As part of the agreement Arcomet has ordered 200 Geda 2PK hoists, with the aim to increase this to 500 over time. The two companies have already developed a number of items, including folding attachment brackets that allow a 45 metre tower crane hoist/elevator to be installed in less than a day. Some of the brackets will initially be exclusive to Arcomet and sister company Matebat. The two companies also plan to co-operate on the development of a new internal tower crane hoist.

Matebat acquires Reflex Group

The planned merger between sister companies Arcomet and Matebat has been delayed by a couple of months for regulatory reasons, but in the meantime Matebat has acquired tower crane and hoist service and maintenance company Reflex group from founder Christophe Sellier. The company represents Geda in France and is a parts, service and support agent for Liebherr.

Arcomet also formed a strategic alliance with electronics company Ascorel

to establish a 'Laboratory of Ideas' with a small team of students working in a development hub, to originate and test new products and services for tower cranes.

Dropped load proves fatal

At the end of March, a woman was fatally injured when a pallet of bricks dropped from a tower crane working in the City of London. The incident occurred at Bow Corner, a six storey apartment block being built by Higgins Homes in the east end of London.

The falling bricks landed on Michaela Boor, 29, who was walking past the site, having taken her child to school. The brick pallet was netted but something appears to have given way. Higgins Homes said it was working with the Health & Safety Executive to determine the cause of the incident.

Wolffkran moves into France

Wolffkran has opened a sales, rental and service depot in Paris, France headed by Ludovic Delcourt. The new subsidiary joins Wolff operations in Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Belgium and the UK.

Delcourt said: "Our goal is to cover all types of construction projects in France and drive the development of the Wolff rental fleet. Wolffkran's rental fleet of 700 cranes worldwide makes it possible to serve the French market with luffing jib cranes whose availability is otherwise rather low in France. For the time being, the focus of our activities is on the Paris region, but in the medium term we plan to expand our commitment to the whole of France."



Boels confirms three more acquisitions

Dutch international rental company Boels has confirmed the acquisition of three new companies, Already Hire in the UK and Delta Rent and Amdyte in the Netherlands.

Already Hire is based in Slough with three branches in London - Heathrow,
Tower Bridge and Dartford. It offers a wide range of
products including light weight aerial lifts and low level
access. The move follows the acquisition of Supply UK
Hire Shops last April and takes Boels' UK network to

29 locations.

Delta Rent is based in the south west of the Netherlands, where it is active in industrial rental and more specifically the petrochemical market. Woudenberg-based specialist rental company Amdyte, claims to be market leader in temporary fencing rental.



TCA Lift changes name to Falcon Lifts

Danish spider lift manufacturer TCA Lift has changed its corporate name to Falcon Lifts, matching its well-known Falcon brand. Bringing the company and brand name together is intended to help the company present a stronger, more coherent and logical image as it expands under new ownership.

A new Falcon logo and corporate identity is part of the change. Danish private equity firm Generationsskifte Invest acquired a 65 percent stake in the business last July. Managing director Finn Schlitterlau and finance director Thyge Mikkelsen hold the other 35 percent of the share capital.

The company has seen numerous name and ownership changes over the past 13 years - including WorldLift, Skako and TCA - but the Falcon product name has remained

a constant throughout.

The Falcon logo has also been updated.



A mixed bag at Intermat show

Last month's Intermat show in Paris proved a mixed bag with train strikes, a variety of weather conditions and a lack of several major exhibitors. While cranes were disappointing, aerial lifts were certainly better represented, but the stars of the show were telehandlers. While JCB's absence was noted, most manufacturers were out in force with new product launches. Merlo alone launched 10 new telehandlers, with Magni, Manitou, Dieci and Farasin all showing new models. A pictorial review of the show can be found on page 89. In the meantime here is some news from the show.

Haulotte unveiled the HA20 LE, the first in a new range of electric/hybrid Pulseo Generation lifts and part of a major corporate strategy dubbed 'Blue Orientation' to drop diesel powered models within 10 years. The strategy is more than product related though, the company is seriously looking to eliminate paper from its operations and switch from an engineering driven company to a service related business. This will include the addition of

new company stores in markets where it is not currently represented. More details on the HA20LE can be found in the boom lift feature.



Locatelli replaced its 45

tonne RT model with the new 52.47 booking several sales at the show - Netherlands based van Adrighem ordered four units with an option for four more, and two units were sold to Canada, including one to Saint-Pierre et Miquelon, the French territory off the coast of Canada.





French vehicle mounted lift manufacturer **Klubb** launched what is claimed to be the world's smallest van mounted platform.
The 9.8 metre K20, developed in partnership with Renault and mounted on a Kangoo van.
Outreach is 4.8 metres and a platform capacity 120kg, designed for telecom, CCTV installation and street lighting/signage.
On the Monday morning of Intermat



On the Monday morning of Intermat **Tadano** opened the order book for its new 60 tonne, single engine ATF 60G-3, with first shipments due this summer. The launch was delayed by key component supply issues, which have now been overcome. The new three axle crane

can run with 10, 12, 13 or 16.5 tonne axle loadings, and boasts a 48 metre main boom and a 58 metre maximum on board tip height. The new team at Tadano France claim to have taken a 15 percent market share in the 18 months since the subsidiary was established.



Kranlyft announced the promotion of Jurgen Vater to chief executive, replacing Christer Dijnér who will continue as senior advisor, and take care of the European market for Maeda cranes. Vater joined the company in January from one of Sweden's largest Scania dealers, Atteviks Lastvagnar.



Time International

unveiled its new VTL -Versalift Telescopic Light - series of vehicle mounted platforms, merging the ultra high-strength, profiled steel boom design of the Versalift VT series with the low weight of the ETL series resulting in a lightweight telescopic



platform for 3.5 tonne vans, chassis and pickups.

Potain's dedication to manufacturing some of the most reliable tower cranes in the industry falls in line with our dedication to offering the highest-quality products and service to our customers."




Intelligent manufacturing line for XCMG

Chinese crane and equipment manufacturer XCMG has completed the installation and testing of what it claims is the world's first intelligent manufacturing production line for large crane superstructure/turntable frames and other large fabrications.

It says the new line has a capacity to manufacture up to 40 superstructure frames a day and can produce more than 20 different types. The automated line is 100 metres long with an intelligent rail guided vehicle carrying the superstructure on a special pallet. It can dock with the welding or machining stations along the way and be locked accurately in place to complete the 18 steps to create the frame. Each technician on the line can manage 10 workstations.

Danish loader crane manufacturer HMF has unveiled a new crane designed for grab work specifically for handling construction and road waste such as concrete and asphalt. Designed and tested in the UK market, the HMF1310R has a maximum radius of more than eight metres and a slewing range of 440 degrees. The crane is available with manual or remote control and has two operating platforms with easy access between them via a catwalk.

The crane features HMF's RCL5300 which monitors all movements ensuring the chassis remains stable and with all four legs on the ground and the crane only works within the permitted load. It also is fitted with HMF's HSL-Q safety system which creates a virtual cage around the operator that the crane cannot enter. All systems are fully enclosed in waterproof boxes to ensure all-weather performance.

34 Terex RTs for Italy

Italian crane rental and sales company Tecno-Gru has ordered 34 new Terex Rough Terrain cranes. The order includes three 35 tonne RT35-1s, three 45 tonne RT 45s, 10 of the 45 tonne RT 45Ls, seven 65 tonne Quadstar 1065s, seven 75 tonnes Quadstar 1075s and three Quadstar 1075Ls and one 90 tonne RT 90.

TH White acquires **Outreach Truck**



AMCS for Hinckley Point cranes

French electronic systems manufacturer AMCS technologies has won the contract to provide the tower crane anticollision and crane management systems on the Hinckley Point C nuclear power plant in Somerset.

The contract, with construction companies Bouygues Travaux Publics and Laing O'Rourke, includes installion of the latest AMCS

DCS 61-S anti-collision and zoning systems on about 50 cranes as well as additional safety devices, such as cameras and night lights etc. The DCS 61-S calculates the distances between the cranes and their loads in three dimensions and merges this data with the actual real time movement speeds to maintain safe distances between each crane, automatically bringing them to a stop if they stray into pre-determined proximities or no-go zones.

New Microcranes M1

Canadian manufacturer Microcranes has launched the compact M1 Global lightweight modular mini crane which features a 905kg maximum capacity with a tip height of 6.7 metres.

The crane has an overall width of 762mm and weighs 816kg with 136kg of removable counterweight. The crane is equipped with castors on both the base frame and outriggers allowing

loads to be moved into position.

Chief executive Josh Clark said: "We work with many industries to provide equipment for tight spaces and alternatives to renting or buying expensive large cranes."

Magni to use Liebherr slew drives

Liebherr is to supply Magni with its DAT 200 drive slew motors for Magni's 360 degree telehandlers. The DAT 200 is a three-stage coaxial planetary unit with high pressure piston motor drive and integral spring operated hydraulically released wet brake, which can be adjusted to eliminate backlash. The drives will be installed in new Magni telehandlers from 26 to 39 metres and the 46 metre RTH 6.46 model later in the year.







Cta Financials round-up

Tadano has reported a 3.5 percent fall in full year revenues to ¥173,703 million (\$1.58 billion). Pre-tax profit was ¥14,676 million (\$133.8 million) down 19 percent on the year. Most of the decline in sales came from an 18.6 percent drop in European mobile crane sales, with total mobile crane sales 9.7 percent lower at ¥99,022 million (\$903 million). North American sales increased 15.7 percent to ¥29,428 million (\$268.4 million). Loader crane sales were marginally higher at ¥19,677 million (\$179.5 million), while aerial lift sales improved 6.4 percent to ¥24,678 million (\$225 million). Other revenues were 11.4 percent higher at ¥30,324 million

(\$276.6 million). The company is forecasting a 10.5 percent increase in 2018, to ¥192,000 million (\$1.75 billion), with pre-tax profits 10.7 percent higher at ¥16,500 million (\$150.5 million).



UK-based HSS - which owns UK Platforms - has reported full year revenues two percent lower at £335.8 million reflecting a 5.7 percent drop in rental revenues and a 10.6 percent gain in the Services operation which includes

training and its One Call re-rent operation. UK Platforms and other specialist divisions reported revenue and profit growth. In spite of substantial cost savings, the pre-tax loss jumped from £17.4 million to £85.2 million partly due to £66.6 million of write offs.



United Rentals posted first quarter revenues 27.5 percent higher at \$1.73 billion, thanks largely to the acquisitions of NES in April and Neff towards the year end. Pre-tax profits jumped 44 percent to \$232 million. The company added \$280 million of new equipment, with the average age of the fleet at the end of March of 47.5 months or 53.4 months for

the aerial work platforms. Rental rates improved by an average of 1.8 percent, rising to 2.2 percent in March.



Palfinger has reported revenues of €394.2 million - up nine percent on last year - due to higher loader crane sales in Europe and North America. The group's Land division which includes loader cranes and aerial work platforms, improved 13.6 percent to €337.8 million. The Sea division that serves the marine and offshore oil & gas industries saw revenues shrink 12.7 percent to €56.4 million. Pre-tax profit for the period was two percent

higher at €29.8 million.



JLG has reported a 29 percent jump in first half revenues to \$1.56 billion. This was made up of a 34.5 percent surge in aerial work platform sales to \$810.7 million, while telehandler sales jumped 49.5 percent to \$364.4 million. Other revenues, including spare parts and used equipment were 7.5 percent higher at \$381 million. Operating profits for the first half increased almost 68 percent to \$111.5 million and the order

book at the end of March was more than 2.5 times last year's level at \$1.79 billion.



Snorkel's full year revenues for 2017, increased 27 percent to \$165.8 million with an operating profit of \$1.64 million compared to a loss in 2016 of \$2.8 million.



Manitou has published first quarter sales revenues 21 percent higher at €461 million, while order intake surged taking the order book at the end of March to a record €870 million. Revenues for the Material Handling & Access division, largely telehandlers and aerial lifts were



24 percent higher at €322 million with improvements across all regions, causing the company to start ramping up production volumes.

Haulotte's first guarter revenues were nine percent higher at €139.7 million, driven by ongoing improvements in the European market as well as China and the Middle East. Sales of aerial lifts in North America, grew five percent, offset by shrinking scaffold sales.



Liebherr has reported full year results for 2017, with revenues 9.3 percent higher at a record €9.84 billion, while pre-tax profits jumped almost 22 percent to €576 million. Sales of construction and mining equipment - which

includes mobile and tower cranes - increased 14.5 percent to €6,182 million. Mobile crane sales - wheeled and crawler - were roughly flat however at €2.06 billion. The company said its share of the All Terrain market declined to just over 52 percent.



US-based H&E Equipment achieved first quarter revenues of \$260.5 million, almost 15 percent higher than last year. Rental revenues increased more than 20 percent, while new equipment sales were 14 percent higher.



Terex Cranes has reported first quarter revenues of \$314 million, 19 percent up on the same period last year. The company reduced its operating loss from \$31.9 million last year to \$9.7 million this year. The order book at the end of March was \$643 million, 58 percent higher than at this time last year.



Genie posted first quarter revenues of \$638.9, up 35 percent, driven by strong growth in both North America and Western Europe. The order book at the end of March was \$891 million, 43 percent up on the same period past year. Meanwhile operating profits almost tripled to \$60.1



Hiab has reported first quarter revenues of €276 million, two percent up on last year, with order intake seven percent higher at €307 million, leaving the order book at the end of March at €329 million. Operating profits slipped nine percent to €36.1 million.

New Jekko SPK60.2

Jekko has started shipping its second generation six tonne SPK60.2 mini crawler crane with the first half dozen units going to customers in Hong Kong, Germany, Switzerland, Belgium, the UK and the United States.



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Change is in the air

Over the next 20 years, as many as two billion more people will live in cities, resulting in a total of five billion urban dwellers worldwide. Major cities are already facing up to the challenges of air pollution and rising health issues resulting from airborne vehicle emissions. An increasing number of countries have announced future bans on internal combustion vehicles, while a growing number of cities are introducing ultra-low emission zones. This is already causing equipment buyers to consider switching to electric or hybrid powered machines, and why so many aerial lift manufacturers are starting to look at alternative power sources to diesel for their larger models.

Over the past few months several manufacturers have launched hybrid and lithium powered boom lifts as a result of the increased customer interest. The market for hybrids has been pioneered by UK manufacturer Niftylift which recently launched its third generation hybrid boom lifts and now offers two and four wheel drive models up to 86ft.

Niftylift has also launched its first telescopic/straight boom - the 65ft HR22 S - following customer demand for true hybrid versions of this type of boom lift. And it launched the HR21 E, a new all-battery electric version of the updated 62ft HR21 - its first with direct electric drive - which offers 13 metres of outreach, 250kg platform capacity, 150 degree articulating

jib, 30 percent gradeability and an overall weight of 6,640kg.

Demand for hybrid booms is particularly strong in Germany where Niftylift is now market leader in some sectors, initially due to the growing appetite of German rental companies - and more importantly their customers - for clean, quiet platforms, no matter what their size. Buyers have also now bought into some of the company's other features, such as low weight and built-in secondary guarding.

Niche no more

For many years the major manufacturers took no notice of the hybrid or all-electric concept for Rough Terrain lifts, given that it was very niche and certainly not something that the big American

> producers saw in their home market which has traditionally tended to drive the development of new concepts or products. Even European-based manufacturers such as Haulotte and Manitou seemed unpersuaded that this type of product would ever be anything more than a small niche market. Although it must be said that JLG did some significant and critical development work in this area, launching





the 60ft E600J all electric boom lift with on-board recharging generator as long ago as 2000. Its problem was that it was ahead of its time and therefore never sold particularly well. And in order to improve battery life it was built as light as possible and was quite different from the company's regular 60ft articulated Rough Terrain boom lifts.

The company also tested a fuel cell powered boom lift in 1999 which never made it into production. Other companies have also offered a variety of bi-energy models over the years, which were intended to offer hybrid like characteristics, but never offered sufficient battery

life to perform as a true electric powered platform. In the late 1990s UpRight, looking to produce a simple alternative to Genie and Niftylift's Bi-Energy boom lifts, added a small Kubota marine diesel with generator to its all electric AB46E, with enough generator power to top up the battery pack faster than the machine was capable of drawing down. As with the JLG E600J, it worked up to a point, but powering the traditional hydraulic wheel drive system with an electric motor was not the best combination.

In contrast Niftylift's Bi-Energy models had dual electric and diesel systems, so were true diesel

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powered units when ploughing through tough ground conditions, while the battery electric power train was slower and no match for the gradeability of the diesel power train. The lack of 'grunt' on the electric Niftylift booms, was the initial reason it created the Bi Energy option in the first place. So in a way it was this failing which led to Niftylift's development of the first hybrid boom lifts.

Genie also had a very credible Bi-Energy power pack option, a popular option on its market leading Z-45 boom lifts in Europe, but it sold few if any in North America. The main breakthrough in battery electric Rough Terrain lift development arguably came from JLG when it launched its 34ft 340AJ articulated boom in 2014 which featured four AC electric wheel motors, the first major aerial lift manufacturer to risk placing electric motors in an area where they are subject to abuse and contamination from mud and water.

The company had trialled direct electric drive in the late 1980s with DC wheel motors within the rear axle of its 30ft 300A. Genie took this a step further in 2007 when it added direct electric AC drive to the rear axle of the industrial Z-40/23N boom lift. But a four wheel drive, four wheel steer Rough Terrain direct electric drive boom lift had to wait for the right components to come along and then be proven able to handle the abuse of the rental market and tough construction sites. Genie added to the development process with the launch of the 60ft Z-60/37 DC in early 2016, together with the FE 'hybrid' version with onboard diesel recharging generator. While sales of the Z60/37FE have been steady they have been a

This is the first unit in its Pulseo Generation and part of a radical new 'Blue' strategy which involves the company ceasing production of diesel boom lifts over the coming years as it converts its entire product line to emission free power sources.

Haulotte Pulseo range

Haulotte made a great deal of the launch of the first in a new range of Pulseo machines - part of an overall corporate strategy dubbed 'Blue Orientation'. The main element of which is to end all diesel powered production within 10 years and hopefully in half that time, but practicalities will have some impact on the actual timing. The company is starting with full traction lead acid battery packs, before switching to AGM and then lithium ion battery packs and finally - if all goes according to plan - fuel cells.

The new machine incorporates most of the structural elements from the current HA 20 RTJ but has reinforced riser weldments and boom to handle the optional dual platform capacities, with 250kg unrestricted for a working height of almost 21 metres and outreach of 11.9 metres. Or 10 metres outreach and 18 metres working height with the 350kg maximum capacity. Up and over reach is 8.5 metres.

Dual capacity is selected in the platform and monitored by the platform overload system. The counterweight is also slightly smaller, compensated by the two chassis-mounted full traction 72 volt/435Ah lead acid battery packs with centralised water top up system. The lift can be plugged into any 230 volt - ideally 16 amp - socket or recharged from the 18Kw Kubota diesel with generator - something the company refers to as a 'Range Extender'. All power from the generator goes into the batteries, but the company claims that even with totally flat battery packs the machine will operate within a minute or two of starting



the engine. It also claims that the machine can work a full shift on a single battery charge. A chassis mounted battery charge indicator is said to be more accurate than those typically found on aerial lifts. A second indicator is provided on the platform controls.

Four wheel-mounted AC electric motors provide 45 percent gradeability while a separate electric motor powers the hydraulics. The riser descent has also been changed from power down to gravity descent. Four wheel steer and an oscillating axle are standard equipment on both the LE and LE Pro. Haulotte's latest technical features such as Activ'Lighting systems, Activ'Shield Bar 2.0, Activ'Screen and universal telematics plug are all standard equipment.

JLG hybrid boom

JLG is set to launch the production version of its new 80ft articulated 4x4 hybrid boom lift at Vertikal Days this month. The H800AJ goes head to head with the Nifty HR28 4x4 Hybrid which has been a runaway success in several European markets.

new JLG H800AJ is physically larger with 1.6 metres less working height and 2.55 metres less working outreach at 16.45 metres. Up and over height of the JLG is however better at 9.78 metres and gradeability is superior but platform capacity is 50kg less and at 16.1 tonnes it weighs almost 1.5 tonnes more. One of the reasons for this is that it is based on the regular diesel 800AJ, in fact after the electric motor it is basically identical, but the big battery pack replaces some of the counterweight. The unit combines an 84 volt electric system with AGM maintenance free batteries and Kubota Tier 4 final


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diesel replacing the Deutz motor.

Power on both machines - described as a parallel Hybrid system - is provided in a very similar way. Both use a small Kubota diesel coupled to a large electric motor which when reversed and driven by the engine becomes a generator that tops up the battery pack. In diesel mode the engine powers the pumps and the 'generator'. When extra power is required for steep inclines or heavy mud etc the electric motor kicks in and adds the additional required horsepower.

Both platforms can also run as a pure battery-electric machine with minimal noise and zero emissions.



As with the standard machine it is equipped from four wheel hydraulic drive, an oscillating axle with a four wheel steer option.

Lithium battery platforms

New energy and power developments are moving on apace. In recent months Niftylift has launched a lithium powered boom - the HR 12 LE L - while JCB has introduced lithium batteries on its scissor lifts. Both of these are the result of a request from Netherlands based start-up rental company Hoogwerkt which is planning an all lithium fleet which can be collected on a two axle equipment trailer. The Nifty HR12 LE L is also available as the HR12 LE (Light Electric) which Niftylift expects will make up the majority of machines sold as it uses the much cheaper AGM batteries which it says can still last up to four days on one charge. (See Niftylift moves into lithium power, page 24).

JCB announced its move into booms early last year and showed the prototype 50ft diesel AJ50 D at Conexpo and Vertikal Days 2017, however no other models in the range have been seen and as far as we understand production units have yet to ship. Another interesting boom seen at Conexpo was JLG's 460SJ on a self-levelling chassis - but no further information has been released on when production models will be available.

Lithium power on aerial lifts is clearly becoming more mainstream and pioneer Hinowa will celebrate 10 years of lithium battery power in

October. It says that it has delivered 1,000 lithium lifts so far and has not had to replace a single full battery pack. It took five years to fully eliminate initial teething problems, changing out several component suppliers before finally perfecting its lithium battery pack which is currently in its second generation.

Third generation Manitou booms


Manitou has launched a third generation 46ft/52ft - 160 and 180 ATJ articulated boom lifts, matching a smaller Kubota diesel engine to the company's well proven Load Sensing hydraulic system with LSU pump which manages to extract more performance from the smaller engine. Gradeability increases from 36 to 45 percent, new lifting and tie down lugs make it easier to lift the

machine without putting pressure on the new modified covers or the need to use a spreader beam. Other features include smoother controls, wider wheels and tyres and the Stop & Go automatic engine stop/start system gives a claimed eight percent reduction in the 'total cost of ownership'.

Hi-spec MEC

MEC's latest boom is the high specification 45ft 45-AJ Rough Terrain articulated boom lift. The Kubota diesel powered machine is very Genie 45 and offers 360 degree continuous slew, solid rough terrain tyres, a triple entry platform with swing gate and oscillating front axle. Outreach is 7.6 metres, with an up and over height of 7.5 metres. Maximum platform capacity is 227kg. The unit is built for MEC by Dingli in China to its detailed design changes in order to deliver a cost

effective product with all the MEC 'bells and whistles' resulting in 'full-featured, rugged, simple and reliable boom lifts'.



Let's get together

The current ANSI standards are being completely updated, to the point where new machines complying with the updated US standard will be much closer to the models that meet current European, ISO and Australian standards, which have largely been harmonised. We look at the main changes from the old ANSI standards and how machines are changing and what effects this might have on North American-built platforms shipped to overseas markets.

Historically European and North American aerial work platforms have differed in several key areas because they comply with different standards - the American National Standards Institute -ANSI and the European Standard EN280.

Units sold in the USA currently comply with ANSI A92.5 and A92.6, which deal with manufacturers' stability, testing and safety requirements. The Canadian Standards Authority (CSA) standards are also quite

similar for obvious reasons. ANSI certified platforms are also used in many Central and South American countries.

Aerial lifts sold into Europe have had to adhere to the Machinery Directive since the single market came into force in 1992 with the CE mark designating compliance. In 2002 the first EN 280 standard was published, which guided compliance with relevant machinery directives. More recently the International Organisation for Standardisation (ISO) standard ISO16268 was









drafted, it largely followed the latest version of EN280 and guided the update of the Australian standards. With the ANSI standards well beyond their sell by date, it made sense that they be redrafted along the lines of the ISO standard, helping move towards a single global safety standard.

The changes to ANSI are guite significant and will have an impact on the way some North American contractors work. It has also created some real challenges for manufacturers as well as dealers and rental companies as these new machines begin to ship. The changes might also carry some product liability issues in the USA, such as in the case of a fatality that might have been avoided if a safety device required under the new standard or previously used in Europe was fitted to the machine involved?

The new ANSI standards - A92.20 will bring North American platforms closer to the European machines by eliminating most of the current variations. Standards for safe use (A92.22) and training (A92.24) bring them even closer. Work on the new standards is being carried out by the Aerial Platforms Committee ASC A92 - approved by ANSI - and made up of a wide range of individuals and groups from the access industry. The core changes include platform overload cut outs, indoor/outdoor ratings, stability calculations, entrance gates, guardrail heights and operation when off level. While these are welcomed by most end users, those who typically overload platforms or operate on excessive slopes will obviously be irritated when a new machine cuts out and stops them from abusing the machine and putting themselves



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
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

Under the new standards the platforms will be classed differently - those that move vertically but stay inside the tipping lines (scissors for example) and those where the platform extends beyond the chassis (e.g. booms). Both can be divided into three further categories - those only driven in the stowed position, those driven elevated but controlled from the chassis and those driven elevated and controlled from the platform.

Occupants in the platform must have the knowledge on how to work safely, including how to use fall protection and the location of the harness anchor points, how their actions could affect stability, how to safely use accessories, how to stick to the safety plan and avoid site specific hazards and how to complete emergency procedures in line with manufacturer's warnings and safety information.

Load sensing

The addition of active load sensing is probably the most obvious change. Current standards place the onus on the operator not to overload the lift. However, complying with A92.20 means aerial work platforms must be equipped with a load sensing device that disables the lift functions and activates an audio visual alarm when overloaded. Those that have overloaded machines in the past will have to re-plan their work or use a different machine. While load sensing adds some complexity to the platforms, the technology has been in use in Europe for more than 20 years and is now well proven. Scissor lifts will use a combination of scissor stack angle sensors, pressure transducers on the lift cylinders and/ or load sensing pins, while booms will use load cells to measure platform load. In order to overcome obvious objections from users, manufacturers are busy adding higher or dual platform capacities



to their machines - in some cases requiring structural changes to the lift structure - which benefit users worldwide. Additionally, the fact that all machines will now have overload devices, allows manufacturers to build this into the machine, reducing cost and improving reliability.

Wind forces

One of the main differences between the current ANSI and EN/ ISO standards is the manner in which the effect of wind loading is applied to stability tests and calculations. Under the new A92.20 standard scissor and mast-type vertical lifts will be impacted considerably, with narrower slab electric units affected more than the wider, heavier Rough Terrain units. For example, a current ANSI scissor lift may have a two person capacity with a 12.5 metres a second wind rating. Under A92.20 it may be reduced to two people and zero wind - 'indoor use' - with one person capacity possible for 'outdoor use'. Narrow outdoor rated scissor lifts are also likely to weigh more which affects loading and transport, as well as floor loadings and the ability to ride elevators etc.



One of the main differences is the effect of wind loading when applied to stability tests and calculations. Here is an example of an A92.20 decal.

Manufacturers may opt to simply switch the rating on current indoor/ outdoor machines to indoor use only. Rental companies need to consider this when purchasing in order to match their customer's requirements.

When it comes to boom lifts most self-propelled booms over 40ft are less likely to be affected by the new wind rating requirements, but narrow aisle boom lifts may require more weight or a change in rating? Certainly, expect more

material loaded into the platform and supported by attachments such as glazing kits and pipe racks etc.

Tyres

Changes in the way stability and overturning moments are calculated will in most cases result in a switch to foam filled or solid tyres, a trend that has been gathering pace in North America for some time. Once again this has been a requirement in Europe for many years. What is likely is a further move towards solid perforated side wall cushion tyres.

Platform entry and guardrail heights

Currently many North American platforms, especially small scissor lifts, have a guardrail height of around a metre. Going forward they will have to be 1.1 metres, the same as in Europe. This could mean that some units will no longer pass through a standard door without folding the guardrails down. The chain gate entrance will also go - no 'flexible' devices are permitted under the new standard - gates with toe boards or drop bars with fixed toeboard will replace them.



Tilt sensing requirements

Going forward platforms will need to cut out before they reach an unsafe slope angle - most boom lifts are currently fitted will tilt alarms that simply make an obnoxious noise when a machine moves onto a slope of two or five degrees and more. With most machines rated for working on firm level ground and tested to five degrees in the most unstable position, manufacturers will need to decide on a cut-out angle that will not destroy the

practicality of the machine. The option exists - particularly on boom lifts - for manufacturers to combine the overload sensor and boom position indicator to effectively have a load chart that allows working on slopes where overturning is unlikely, such as with shorter booms, lower boom angles, lighter or some cases heavier loads. Some manufacturers are considering a slope selection switch that allows user to dial in, something like ...Level ground up to two degrees, or Up to five or even 10 degrees, with the system then limiting the machine's working envelope to match, cutting out when the selected slope is exceeded, thus adding to a machines capability rather than detracting from it.


Machine manuals

Operator manuals must include a list of the machine's functions, features. operating characteristics, limitations and devices needed for machine familiarisation. Each machine must have a space to mark the date of the last annual inspection.

Summary

When ANSI A92.20 is finally published manufacturers have 12 months to meet the new standards. The new standard will not be retrospective This means that buyers can choose to stock up on platforms that comply with the existing standards, while others restrict their purchases to machines that comply with the new standard. Some manufacturers have already been redesigned their models to comply. Larger international contractors are likely to stipulate all machines on their sites must comply with the latest standards, while smaller companies may seek out the older, 'less restrictive' models for as long as they can.

The net result is that manufacturers will be able to move closer to a 'world' machine allowing owners to sell their used machines anywhere without major modifications. It will also allow a new approach to some system designs, integrating them into the base machine rather than a 'bolt-on' for certain markets. This tends to lead to better designs with a lower cost. All in all, a positive change for the longer term.



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Niftylift moves into lithium power

As the saying goes 'there is many a true word spoken in jest'. The joint 'Star Trek' April Fool news story on Vertikal.net jokingly said: "We (Niftylift) decided to boldly go where no one has gone before... The technology will put us light years ahead of competitors who still cling-on to old technology."

The story of course builds on the new Nifty HR12 LE (Light Electric) and HR12 LEL (Light Electric Lithium) which has a lithium ion or AGM battery pack. **Unfortunately Di-Lithium crystal** technology is still currently unavailable, but the HR12 LEL has 'crossed the final frontier' of battery design using lithium power in a standard production self-propelled boom lift for the first time.

The new Nifty HR12 LEL has caused something of a stir, firstly because it can be powered solely by lithium ion batteries and secondly it weighs almost a tonne lighter than its previous models the HR12 4x4 and the 'narrow' HR12N which are also considered to be at the lighter end of the boom lift spectrum.

The 33ft HR12 is the elder statesman of the boom lift world, dating back almost 30 years but is still as popular as ever even though it is largely unchanged - at least visually. In the late 1980's Niftylift launched its first self-propelled boom lift - the 26ft Height Rider 10 - but its limited outreach quickly prompted the development of a telescopic version, the Height Rider 12. It also pioneered the bi-energy concept, mainly due to the poor battery life and gradeability of the all electric model. However the concept struck a chord with many rental companies, in that one machine could be used both indoors and outdoors, helping boost utilisation. It has remained popular over the intervening years - in spite of only the most modest of design changes and several attempts from other manufacturers to make it obsolete with alternative product

offerings - thanks to its light weight, narrow overall width, simple design and first class reliability.

Mostly sold with Bi-Energy -Battery/Diesel power - the only criticism in the early years was its mediocre performance on rough terrain. However in 2006 Niftylift rectified this with the introduction of the 4x4 model which carried over all of the proven componentry from the standard HR12, but featured a new chassis with four hydraulic drive motors, greater ground clearance and a larger two cylinder Kubota 452 engine. The lift still retained its Bi-Energy battery power pack allowing it to work inside or in quiet locations as well as on site. The standard tyres were lugged tractor tread, although a non-marking white

version was also available. The overall weight was still a handy 3.3 tonnes and while the unit has greater ground clearance stowed height was still under two metres.

Until very recently Niftylift still produced the HR10 which had a 10 metre working height, 4.5 metre outreach and 1.5 metre overall width, the same as the narrow version of the HR12N - which has 12.2 metres working height and 6.1 metres of outreach but was heavier at 3,435kg. The standard HR12 has a 1.8 metre overall width but weighs just 2,630kg compared to the HR12 4x4 at 1.62 metres wide and weighing 3,470kg.

On first glance at the table above, the latest lithium powered HR12 LEL appears to have a very similar specification, however this is not the case.

Working height is 100mm lower at 12.1 metres however outreach has increased by 300mm. The width is now 1.79 metres, almost as wide as the original HR12 but it is also slightly shorter and slightly higher. Travel speed on lithium power is much quicker at six kilometres an hour.

The HR12 LEL's new covers, new controls and a compact version of the Nifty Tough-Cage - which is still bigger than previous models brings its total weight with lithium ion batteries to just 2,540kg. It can also be ordered with AGM batteries which increases its weight by about 100kg. The low weight allows it to be towed on a standard two axle equipment trailer, a concept that appears to be growing in popularity again, especially in the Netherlands, Germany and even London in the UK, where demand for same day delivery or collection is increasingly popular. Niftylift has almost travelled back in time with the new HR12 LEL with a very similar weight and width to the original, but the new technology

has breathed new life into the HR12

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The case for hydraulic luffers

Tower crane development over the past few years has been rapid, with most manufacturers adding new models with increased performance to cope with the demands of current construction techniques. However, one type of tower crane - the hydraulic luffer - which was once a bit of an oddity is now appearing in the product ranges of an increasing number of manufacturers. We take a look at the benefits of this type of tower crane and compare what is currently on the market.

There are several reasons for the increased popularity of the luffing jib tower crane. On congested, inner city sites the crane's ability to raise its jib, thus avoiding oversailing adjacent property or safety hazards such as rail lines or power cables is particularly appealing, especially in markets where this is an issue such as the UK, Hong Kong and Australia. Luffers are also particularly useful constructing tall tower blocks when working space for each crane is severely restricted, reducing the risk of collision with its neighbours.

With space restricted sites being the natural habitat of the luffer, there is often insufficient room available



for delivery, set-up and erection/ dismantling. While luffers are ideal for this habitat, the topless hydraulic luffer is even more suitable, especially on the smallest sites, being more compact and quicker and easier to erect. It is therefore no wonder that demand and usage is on the increase.

Luffing cranes have been particularly popular in the UK primarily because of the ancient legal principle that a landowner's rights stretch from the centre of the earth all the way to the stars. Although legislation has given aircraft rights to pass over without causing any trespass, the principal holds good when nearer the ground. So when a contractor slews a tower crane there is a real risk that oversailing neighbouring airspace will amount to trespass, not to mention to the dangers of lifting over an area not controlled by the contractor.

Users appreciate the benefits of using a luffing jib crane particularly on such sites which resulted in manufacturers producing more compact cranes with smaller out of service radii. However, despite the use of hydraulic powered luffing booms - such as the Liebherr HB series launched in the 1950s which had a very fast luff speed - hydraulic luffers went out of fashion in Europe causing the company to halt HB series production.

The reason for their demise? Possibly

leaky hydraulic systems and the potential for the jib to creep down overnight or when the crane was out of service?

A current alternative crane which offers similar benefits is the articulated crane which is also making a comeback - such as the four tonne capacity Artic Raptor 84 and its bigger brother the eight tonne Raptor 184 pioneered by City Lifting in the UK. 20 to 30 years ago similar cranes would have been the Tornborgs Magni S-40 and S-46 which had a maximum radius of 30 metres and a 2.2 tonnes capacity. The advantage of articulated cranes such as the Raptor 84 is the very small out of service radius of just four metres. Even the larger capacity Raptor 184 has an out of service radius of just 4.5 metres.

The pioneer of the modern hydraulic luffer was German company Jost and in late 2005 it introduced its third generation tower cranes - the JTL 108 and JTL 158 hydraulic topless luffer which offered the versatility of a luffing jib and a topless crane in a single unit. The JTL 158 had a capacity of 2.4 tonnes at a 50 metres radius, while its 75 degree maximum jib angle

gave an 8.3 metre overall length from counterweight to jib tip. The products got off to a very good start selling well, satisfying pent up demand for such a crane. In the years that followed Jost developed a comprehensive line of hydraulic luffing cranes from 80 to 300 tonne/ metres and has delivered more than 200 cranes since then.

New launches

Over the past year or so Potain has entered the sector with its first topless hydraulic luffer - the MCH 125 - and Raimondi is in the final stages of launching its first hydraulic

This means there is now - or will soon be - a choice of hydraulic luffing tower cranes from seven manufacturers - Wolffkran, Jost, Jaso, MTI Lux, Saez, Potain and Raimondi. Wolffkran is believed to have a new hydraulic luffer on the drawing board - the 133B which is a smaller version of its 166B - but is deciding whether this is the right size for the market. Perhaps surprisingly Liebherr, Terex and Comansa do not have any products in this sector - probably because of the limited geographic demand and relatively small global market at the present time, although this is changing.

Potain MCH 125

At the beginning of this year Potain launched its first topless hydraulic luffer - the MCH 125 - first seen as a prototype at Bauma China in November 2016. Since then pre-production units have been on test on Potain distributor job sites in Thailand, Australia and New Zealand. The crane has a maximum capacity of eight tonnes, five jib lengths from 30 to 50 metres and

a jib tip capacity of two tonnes. Maximum hoist line speed is 100 metres a minute when fitted with the 60 LVF 20 hoist. The crane has been designed for fast erection and dismantling. Potain claims a 40 metre free-standing height crane can be erected in less than six hours and the entire upper works of the crane including its full 50 metre jib can be transported on four trucks.

The MCH 125 can be mounted on existing 1.6 or two metre Potain towers with jib sections from the MCR luffing jib cranes and can raise its jib from horizontal to 87 degrees in around two minutes. We mentioned the speed of the old Liebherr HB series - the four tonne capacity HB 50 took just 50 seconds to fully raise its jib! And some modern rope luffers are almost as fast.

The Potain is unusual in that it features a short, fixed counter jib rather than the usual dynamic counter jib on this type of crane. The crane also features Potain's Vision 140 cab, claimed to be one of the largest on the market. Deliveries will begin shortly, with the crane initially being available initially in Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Russia and South America, but surprisingly not in Europe.

Raimondi LRH174

Over the next month or so Raimondi will launch its first hydraulic luffer - the 10 tonne/50 metre LRH174 - which has a maximum jib tip capacity of 2.4 tonnes at 50 metres. Raimondi says its 10 metre out of service radius is a major feature of this crane compared to a traditional luffer with a minimum double that radius.

The crane boasts easier installation - similar to a flattop crane - due to the lack of A-frame and tie rods. The jib is assembled at ground level for a single lift. Preparation of the jib, hoisting winch and rope reeving are all completed at ground level reducing work at height requirements. Raising the jib to 85 degrees takes only 108 seconds and the crane houses the new generation Raimondi safety control system.

Jost JTL 68.4s

Jost's latest topless hydraulic luffer - JTL 68.4s - has an out of service radius of just four metres - small enough to rival the articulated Artic Raptor 84 - with the first unit recently delivered to UK tower crane company Bennetts. The JTL 68.4s features a short, four metre counter jib, rather than the 6.9 metre jib on the standard 68.4. The crane and jib have significant structural reinforcement to cope with the high stresses imposed by the smaller sail area for weather vaning/free slew when out of service in strong winds. Maximum radius is 35 metres at which it can handle two tonnes.

The crane has been designed specifically for the smallest job sites and urban areas where contractors face serious issues of over sailing. The new crane's first contract was

a student accommodation block for Exeter University on a site in the centre of the city. The site is not only tight but abuts both a busy road and commercial and residential properties, leaving little room for manoeuvre. It was erected using an existing Jost JTL 108 luffing jib tower crane that had been positioned a few weeks previously. Bennetts managing director Edward Seager said: "The new Jost JTL 68.4s is an excellent solution for this site. With such a short counter jib and out of service radius there is no issue with it over-sailing properties, however it can still lift four tonnes. We see this crane being very popular in London, where sites can be small and very challenging."

The Jost is available with three different jib lengths - 25, 30 and 35 metres - providing five metres more than the Arctic Raptor. The 25 metre jib has a maximum capacity of four tonnes at a 20.6 metre radius which is similar to the Raptor 84's maximum at 21 metres. At 25 metres the Jost can lift 3.3 tonnes and with the 30 metre jib it can take four tonnes to 17.7 metres - 2.1

metres less than the Raptor. The Raptor also has an additional two metres free standing height but uses a larger 1.26 metre square tower. All in all, these two very different types of tower crane offer similar overall performance. Overall the Raptor just has the performance edge, but perhaps most importantly, both have the critical out of service radii of four metres.

Jaso

Over the past two years or so Spanish manufacturer Jaso has launched several new models including two hydraulic luffers - the 45 metre/six tonne J118HPA and more recently the larger J168HPA, which can handle six tonnes at 30 metres radius and 2,500kg at its 50 metre jib tip. The Jaso HPA series is unusual in that it has the single hydraulic lift cylinder at the rear of the tower rather than at the more usual front. Jaso claims the design provides a more reliable luffing mechanism, extending the service life of the cylinder, reducing power consumption and giving the crane a compact minimum out of service radius of seven metres. The hoist











is located on top of the jib which it says is safer in operation and allows the crane to be transported by six trucks.

Jaso has also launched its cloud based Smartlink system which allows full remote monitoring and reporting of the crane's performance, including an alarm system that warns of overloads and excessive wind speeds etc.

Wolff 166B

Wolffkran launched its first hydraulic luffer - the 166B - in 2012 and to date it remains its only hydraulic tower crane in the company's range. We understand that the company is looking to add a smaller model - possibly the 133B? - but is still researching potential market demand.

The 166 tonne metre Wolff 166B slots between the company's traditional 100B and the 224B rope luffers and utilises a single hydraulic luffing cylinder along the same lines as Jost. Maximum capacity is 12 tonnes when dual reeved - six tonnes on a single line, while jib lengths of up to 55 metres are possible in five metre increments with a maximum jib tip capacity of 1.8 tonnes increasing to 2.8 tonnes at 50 metres.

The standard 60kW jib mounted hoist can handle up to 500 metres of rope, which can be reeved on the ground before the crane is erected. Minimum radius on full jib is around three metres at which point the counterweight tail swing is reduced to about two metres giving a total clearance radius of five metres. If the main top section is separated the heaviest single component is 7.4 tonnes. If left assembled the tower top, jib connection frame and luffing cylinder weighs 13,120kg. The standard concrete counterweight can be replaced with the more compact steel

alternative as an option.

Summary

The hydraulic luffing jib tower crane was pioneered by the German company Jost which found an immediate market in the UK where congested city centre sites are plentiful and oversailing a major issue. Since then other manufacturers have entered the market including Potain and over the next few months Raimondi. With so much focus on this niche sector higher sales and geographic spread are surely likely, encouraging Liebherr, Terex and Comansa to join the party, which would give this market an even more significant boost which could spread the concept beyond the classic luffing jib markets.

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Doing it the right way'

Since 2015 Falcon Tower Crane Services has been the largest independent tower crane rental company in the UK. Rapid expansion particularly over the past five years has seen its tower crane fleet grow from less than 200 units to more than 400 today. Mark Darwin, visited its sprawling head office facilities at the old American airbase at Shipdham near Thetford in Norfolk and spoke with commercial director Andrew Brown and national sales director lan Gray.

Gray has been with Falcon for 20 years and has seen the changes which have taken place throughout that time. "The old company carried out its work well but has adapted considerably to keep up with innovations and changes in the industry. With the huge investment made in the depot facilities we are keen to encourage all our clients to visit to see the scope of the operations being carried out," he said.

Falcon has completely transformed itself over the past ten years, reinvesting profits into equipment, workshops, training and people. It went through a Management Buy Out in May 2006, involving six directors and managers. However, a year ago, the various companies

into one trading company and one holding company. Falcon Tower Crane Services Limited - which deals with all the equipment rentals - includes Brown and Gray, as well as managing director, Barbara Brown, operations director, Philip Gale and sales director Steve Paxman. The holding company -**Tower Crane Asset Management** sales. Company revenues in 2017 were around £60 million and these are projected to increase to £70 to £75 million this year.

"We ordered our 400th crane at the beginning of this year with our expansion achieved by retaining existing customers and winning new ones - a combination not only

of price, but also the quality of the product and customer service," says Brown. By reinvesting in the fleet, the average crane age is down to six years and eight months which we think is good, considering the fleet size - now 410. The cycle now is to reinvest in cranes, people and facilities both here and our depots in Birch, Manchester and Lesmahagow in Scotland."

Falcon is also UK distributor for Spanish tower crane manufacturer Jaso and has developed a power division with more than 150 large generators. In addition to this the company has added state of the art shot blast and spray facilities in both depots and a training academy. Founded in the 1970s, Falcon began

life as a self-erecting tower crane rental company and evolved into a national tower crane supplier. It then progressed selling and renting tower cranes internationally. During the 1980's the focus moved towards conventional saddle and luffing jib cranes with the fleet steadily increasing to more than 200 tower cranes. For a short period the self-erectors were phased out owing to market conditions and also the company rented goods and passenger hoists.

25 years ago, the strategy was to update and standardise the fleet with Jaso cranes, by selling older units for export. During the financial crisis of 2008, UK rental activity plummeted and the company shifted its focus to international crane sales.

In doing so, key members of staff were retained and the training of apprentices continued, positioning the company in a strong position when the economy recovered.

The company has continued to expand and currently employs 460 staff. This includes a new dedicated self-erecting tower crane division with 75 cranes. The company is probably close to its maximum fleet size, limited by the availability of staff to install and maintain them correctly and available workshop space in which to overhaul and repair them.

"Initially, an early concern was how to sell second-hand Jaso cranes which were unknown in the UK. However, with the growing popularity of the Jaso brand internationally, this problem has disappeared. Following the recession, Jaso sold the majority of its rental fleet, so if its agents or customers around the world look for used cranes, we try to sell our older units to Jaso and replace them with factory built, new units," said Gray "We have just sold three J360 cranes to Australia after they finished a contract in London and we have replaced them with new larger J560s which are now on a contract in Birmingham."

Falcon has also just recruited Mel Edwards who was with the CITB for more than 29 years involved with the CPCS card scheme, most recently as technical developer for plant. She starts her duties with the company next month to head and expand its training department.

"Mel was responsible for facilitating the changes to the CPCS standards for tower cranes so for her to join Falcon is fantastic for us," said

Brown. "The industry has a shortage makes it hard to recruit. To counter this we run erector courses in our dedicated training yard - taking on cranes in the yard's controlled environment, before being allowed people, on our own equipment, it helps to provide the company with staff. It is our intention to expand this activity to offer our services to said Brown.

"At Vertikal Days this year, we will show all the areas in which we are involved, including our generator division which, having begun with a single unit for a customer in London, has expanded rapidly. The division only runs Stage 3A compliant sets and is currently ordering forward to achieve Stage 5 compliance as and when it is needed. We have engineers strategically placed over the UK and can now look at hiring generators outside of the tower crane business."

All the lifting ancillary equipment, generators, lighting and anticollision systems are based at the Birch, Manchester depot, which has recently installed a large paint and shot blasting facility, matching the one at Shipdham.

"We decided to invest in the main facility at Shipdham for our crane inspections," says Brown. "It has to be one of the best in the country with two spray and one shot blasting booth, housed in one of the old World War II hangers on site. We have invested a lot of money

of experienced crane people, which eight trainees at a time who learn by constantly erecting and dismantling onto site. Yes, it is a struggle to get good people but by training our own a good source of trained competent external companies, in due course,"

in this side of the business for two reasons - health and safety, because blasting the components back to bare metal makes it so much easier to inspect the crane thoroughly for cracks and defects, before it goes back out on hire and secondly, to maintain the appearance of the company's equipment so as to offer clients smart cranes in keeping with their own image".

Falcon now runs a fleet of 150 Stage 3A compliant generators

"The paint operation is at full capacity at the moment and could expand the facilities further by taking on more outside work. We have painted tractors and telehandlers, but the hanger is big enough for a mobile crane. When we sell a used tower crane we always respray and service it first."

Current market

"Rental rates over the past few years have increased but we always maintain the price of the crane over the contract, even if it over runs. With long-term customers we felt we couldn't just increase the prices. We have increased them, but not to the extent of other companies," says Gray. "The market is strong at the moment, particularly for luffers, although this can fluctuate for no apparent reason. Last year we had big demand for the Jaso J160s - a mid-range saddle jib crane - and purchased 20 of them. However, now the J168 hydraulic luffer is very popular and we have 35 in the fleet. Surprisingly, Jaso has even had demand for its hydraulic luffers in North America."

"Years ago, we collaborated with Jaso in the production of a small luffer for the UK market, capable of fitting inside a lift shaft. They built two J80s which we purchased to start replacing older Liebherr models. They relied on us to make the model a success and we now have over 50 of them. From that model, the J138 was evolved and now that in turn has been replaced with the J168 hydraulic luffer.





Our most popular luffer is the 60 metre/18 tonne J208. We now standardise on the J118, J168 and J208."

"The advantage of the hydraulic luffer is its low power requirement and narrow parking radius," says Gray. "But we have worked with Jaso to develop a park radius device for the rope luffers that sits against the A frame, to reduce the out of service radius. With wind sails in the jib to weather vane, even the large J380s can be reduced to a 10 metre parked radius - as long as the tower is large enough to take the additional forces. We have also won contracts in London due to the greater free-standing heights of the Jaso cranes. We have a J138 erected in Wembley, with a 96 metre free standing height with 3.6 metre sections at the base."

But why have a young, modern fleet when rental rates are the

same for both new and old? "The advantage of the new Jaso cranes is the telematics/black box system which will allow us to diagnose faults remotely. They are highly efficient - the black box reports the faults and soon there will be twoway communication passing on lift information/performance with the ability to repair remotely. The design and performance of the cranes are similar but new cranes have the advantages of the new technology."

The Falcon fleet is primarily Jaso but it also includes Potains and Liebherr 32TTs in the self erecting division. "In 2015 we won a competitive tender to take over the running of McCarthy & Stone's in-house fleet of 29 tower cranes," says Brown. "They had decided to follow a business model which did not include owning and running their own plant and we were delighted to be able to offer our services in supplying them with whatever craneage their sites might require. We now look after their requirements nationwide supplying them with around 80 cranes a year most of them higher capacity cranes than they had in their own fleet

as their site needs have evolved and changed. This in itself is a good-sized business, scattered all over the coastal towns of the UK, which has actually helped improve our back-up service ability. A few weeks ago we put two J160s on the Isle of Skve. We also have a few cranes in mainland Europe - two in the Netherlands with a third going in soon, a J300 going into Germany and a few in Belgium, all through Jaso agents."

Direct operators

"Since the inception of the company, all of our operators are directly employed. All have been trained on our cranes and we have all their training and medical records. Of the total of 460 staff, about 300 are operators. It is harder to get operators for the self-erectors, particularly during the winter - no one wants to stand outside with a remote control all day! Around half of the machines are rented with operators in other cases, our customers supply their own staff. We do occasionally rent out larger towers without an operator, but the client's drivers are carefully vetted and inducted so as


to ensure safe working."


Future

"We have a lot of investment plans, not only for cranes, but also the infrastructure of the company. We have built a new workshop with overhead cranes in Shipdham and are expanding the Manchester depot with another yard, making it more like the head office facility. It is out intention to concentrate on supplying our clients with the cranes they need to successfully and efficiently carry out their contracts. We also aim to continue with our training policy to try to encourage young people to enter our industry."

BT charged £93,000 for putting public at risk

British Telecom (BT) has been fined £90,000 plus costs of £3,394 by Transport for London for putting the public at risk during street works at Bishopsgate, London, UK in August last year. The company failed to properly sign and guard the work area and also used the wrong traffic management methods. Despite repeated demands by Transport for London, BT also failed to take actions to improve the situation.

Transport for London director of network management Glynn Barton said: "We have prosecuted BT for streetworks offences 47 times since 2010 and they still continue to breach the rules. We are working with utility companies, including BT, to ensure that roadworks are carried out safely in the future, with minimal disruption to road users."

CIS moves to bigger premises

Crane Industry Services (CIS) has relocated to a larger training centre in Carrollton, Georgia, USA. The 826 square metre facility features multiple training rooms, an NCCER testing centre, a simulation room, land for crane training and two warehouses for hands-on training. Previously the 'Centered on Safety Training Center' was located on the West Georgia Technical College campus.

Chief executive Debbie Dickinson said: "Our partnership with West Georgia Technical College continues, but this new facility allows us the space to now offer skills training in welding, electrical, millwright and carpentry, as well as rigging and crane operation."



Engineer hit for £165,000 for fall

An aircraft engineering company based at London Stansted Airport, UK has been fined £160,000 plus costs of £5,492.90 after two men suffered broken bones when the platforms they were working on were knocked over. The two men were carrying out checks to each side of the tail of an aircraft in June 2015, when another employee accidentally closed the wrong circuit breaker, opening the plane's airbrake, knocking over both platforms. The men fell from three and 4.5 metres. One suffered injuries to his pelvis, back, ribs, elbow and lung, whilst the second suffered a broken wrist and a chipped a bone on his spine.

HSE inspector Tania van Rixtel said: "Our investigation found the incident could have been avoided had adequate monitoring been taking place. Aircraft maintenance companies are reminded that not all risks are covered by the Aircraft Maintenance Manual and additional measures need to be introduced."

Ladder fall costs £851,000

H.P.A.S, trading as Safestyle UK, has been fined £850,000 plus costs of £1,083 after a window installer fell three metres from an unsecured ladder, breaking his knee cap. The accident happened last year in Doncaster, South Yorkshire, when the man was attempting to install a bedroom window on the first floor of a property.

HSE inspector Stuart Whitesmith said: "This incident could easily have been prevented had the company implemented reasonably practicable precautions. Such precautions include having effective and enforced safe systems of work, whereby windows are installed internally where possible, or by using suitable access solutions which provide edge protection, and having a formal system in place to ensure works are appropriately supervised."

Manitowoc opens **Brazilian training centre**

Manitowoc has opened a new Crane Care training centre in Santana de Parnaíba, São Paulo, Brazil. The new centre is equipped with modern simulators, helping technicians to practice a wide range of actions on the different operational systems found in crane models in use in South and Central America, such as EPIC, Canbus and Manitowoc's own Crane Control System (CCS). Sessions are available in Portuguese, Spanish and English.

Training manager Keith Opperman said: "Since it is not possible to bring the simulators to our customers' facilities, we have to use cranes provided by them on local training classes. But it is not an ideal situation because the owners have to take a crane off the job for use in the training programme, and they lose money for every day that the cranes are not working. The new training centre eliminates this cost while removing the risk of damage to the cranes."

Vice president of sales for South America Cristian Galaz added: "This new training centre facilitates the logistics to train more people across the region, São Paulo, provides much easier access than Passo Fundo, south of Brazil, where the former training centre used to be located."

Powered access safety begins with good planning

IPAF has launched a new safety campaign, which made its debut at Intermat in late April. The new campaign highlights the fact that falls from height are still the main cause of deaths in the workplace. The EU Temporary Work at Height Directive 2001/45/EC, which has certainly helped saved lives, states: "Work at height may expose workers to particularly severe risks to their health and safety, notably to the risks of falls from a height and... fatal accidents."

Aerial work platforms are specifically designed to safely conduct temporary work at height and have been recognised as such by safety bodies across Europe. Working safely at height using such lifts is underpinned by good planning, along with trained and properly supervised operators using the correct machine for the job.

Operators and managers conducting work at height using lifts should plan ahead for safety, carry out proper risk assessments, choose the correct equipment for the job, conduct site and machinery inspections, use trained and familiarised operators under proper supervision and implement adequate segregation from other equipment, machinery and traffic.

IPAF technical & safety director
Andrew Delahunt said: "From IPAF's
accident data analysis, we've
identified four key accident causes
that result in falls from the platform.
These accidents can be prevented
by proper planning and safely
managing the use of aerial work
platforms. We are highlighting these
factors so managers and operators
know the risks and know their
responsibilities."


Some of the key points of guidance to consider include:

Risky behaviour: Operator



behaviour when using platforms is usually a positive factor in terms of safety, but risky behaviour can be a contributing cause of falls from the platform. Common risky behaviours include overreaching or leaning out of the platform, climbing on the guardrails, tying gates open or overriding safety controls. To discourage such behaviours, managers must ensure all operators are properly trained, that the right machine is selected for the job, and work at height is adequately supervised.

Exiting at height: To avoid falls from height while using platforms, operators should only enter or exit the work platform at access gates at ground level or on the chassis for



Setting up near other machinery or vehicles: Aerial work platforms are frequently positioned in proximity to other moving equipment or alongside vehicular traffic. A collision between a platform and a crane, other equipment or a road vehicle can be catastrophic. Therefore, always restrict movement of machinery and/or traffic near the platform. Ensure job site planning and risk assessments are conducted prior to positioning the lift, and implement adequate exclusion zones and a vehicle traffic management plan.

Mechanical failure: To avoid accidents through mechanical failure and to ensure work platforms are maintained in safe working order - which is the owner's legal obligation - all owners should implement a rigorous inspection, maintenance and thorough examination regime. The period and scope of the inspections are stipulated by government legislation and by the manufacturer and is listed in the operator's manual. The inspection schedule includes: Pre-use inspection, periodic inspections at three or six months and annual inspection which must be conducted by a competent person with adequate training and experience on that type of work platform.

To support IPAF's new safety campaign a new online spreader pad calculator has been launched at pads.ipaf.org. IPAF also offers Andy Access safety posters that can be used to deliver quick and simple safety talks on sites or in breakrooms and to further support this is also developing a series of Toolbox Talks to help get these important messages across.



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Updated guidance on Lifting Operations With Excavators

The UK Strategic Forum Plant Safety Group has published an updated safety guidance document entitled 'Lifting Operations With 180° and 360° Excavators.' The group has revised, expanded and updated the original guidance which was published in 2008. Additions are so widespread that the guidance has increased from seven to 72 pages.

The group is chaired by the CPA, with permanent representation and support from the Health & Safety Executive, contractors, rental companies, manufacturers and training organisations. The latest guidance thoroughly sets out the precautions and procedures that should be taken into account when planning and carrying out lifting operations with excavators and backhoe loaders. The precautions and procedures specified in the publication should enable work to be carried out safely and in accordance with the law.

A core message within the guidance is that in terms of selection of lifting equipment, excavators are primarily designed for excavating and handling loose materials rather than lifting suspended loads. The document advocates that an excavator should not be the first or only choice for lifting, even if it is already on site, is quicker and maybe more cost effective than using more appropriate lifting equipment that has been specifically designed for lifting operations such as cranes and telehandlers.

The guidance details that the use of excavators introduces a number of additional risks when carrying out lifting operations which are not present with conventional cranes, such as:

· Fast articulation and slew movements

- The need to operate the boom and dipper arm simultaneously to keep the load vertical when lifting or placing loads.
- Standard excavator rated capacity warning devices generally only warn, do not prevent the handling of loads in excess of the rated capacity and can be muted by the operator.
- · The rated capacity varies if lifting over the front and rear or side-on to the machine and if features such as blades, stabilisers and axle locks are engaged or not.
- · That some appointed persons may not have the experience of planning and supervising lifting operations with excavators.

Topics covered within the guidance include planning and supervision requirements, machine selection, roles and responsibilities, specific issues and maintenance and inspections. A key part of the guidance is a flowchart that introduces a hierarchy and sequence to the planning process. The section on specific issues includes information on the factors that affect stability, ground conditions and specific issues when using 180 degree excavators, fork attachments and tilt-rotators during lifting operations.

New Lifting Technician Trailblazer Apprenticeship now available

A new Lifting Technician Trailblazer Apprenticeship is now available and ready for delivery, following final approval from the Institute of Apprenticeships. The new apprenticeship framework has been devised by an employer-led Trailblazer working group and is supported by the Construction Plant-hire Association (CPA).

Designed for those who will operate a mobile, crawler or tower crane and undertake slinging and signalling duties, the new apprenticeship replaces the existing Construction Civil Engineering Plant Operator (Cranes Lifting) Framework Apprenticeship which will eventually be phased out.

The Trailblazer working group was headed by Laing O'Rourke and included Ainscough and Baldwins Crane Hire, BAM Nuttall, Balfour Beatty, Bronzeshield Lifting, Emerson Cranes, Skanska, Select, Sarens and Liebherr, as well as the CPA and CITB. The group was formed in 2014 to devise the standards and assessment plan for the apprenticeship, with the aim of integrating both crane operating skills with slinging/signalling skills to provide both the apprentice and employer with a greater scope of skills and to fully understand the lifting operations sector, preparing a pathway for the apprentice to become a crane supervisor and ultimately an appointed person.

The new Level 2 Lifting Technician Apprenticeship has a total training period of up to 24 months including work experience. The core training period has been derived as a minimum of 300 hours and as with all Trailblazer Apprenticeships, a formal training qualification does not form part of the apprenticeship. It is the End Point Assessment which determines competency, however NVQ's in Plant Operations (Cranes and Specialist Lifting) and Controlling Lifting Operations (Slinger/ Signaller) need to be achieved before the end assessment can be undertaken.

This apprenticeship has been placed within the Education and Skills Funding Agency's funding band 11 allowing apprenticeship levy paying employers to spend up to £15,000 for the training and assessment of

the apprentice. Non-levy payers can receive up to 90 percent of the maximum. Further information can be found at www.gov. uk/government/publications/ apprenticeship-funding-bands.



















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Manitowoc MLC300

The Manitowoc MLC300 crawler crane made its debut at the ConExpo Exhibition in 2014, its main feature being the Variable Position Counterweight (VPC). This 1:50 scale model is made by Towsleys.

It comes in a big box and a comprehensive assembly guide for the model is included which has an annotated parts list and step by step instructions covering the largest configuration of the crane. Tools are provided to aid the task, and a number of hours is required to complete the model.

A highpoint of the model is the detailing. The tracks are metal, and excellent, and the frames are detailed and include fold out lugs and access steps. The operator's cab tilts and is fully detailed with windscreen wipers, grab handles and a mirror, and at the rear various signs are fully replicated with tiny writing. Handrails and platforms are metal and very



model when fully assembled The VPC-Max 'superlift' counterweight arrangement is very good with nicely modelled energy chains. It works well, and is a major plus on the model as on the real crane, as it is possible to position the counterweight to keep the model in reasonable balance whether it has a load or not.

The lattice boom, back mast and jib sections of the crane are nice castings with excellent geometry. They are nearly all metal and include useable lifting eyes, mesh walkways and ladders as appropriate. The connections are made with tiny black nuts and bolts, and the straps are very thin metal.


Three hooks are supplied. The main block is a large piece with a swivelling double hook. The second hook is a smaller block, and the whip line has a single metal piece with rotating hook.

To operate the model a key is provided for the winches. When the key is pushed in, the drum presses against a spring and away from a brake surface such that it turns freely when the tool is turned.

This is another excellent large Manitowoc model with great detailing and very good functionality. A big plus point is the flexibility of the model with the use of bolted connections throughout, allowing many display possibilities. It costs €550 from the Manitowoc Europe web shop which is good value given the size and quality.

A well-liked and genuine crane rental professional, he began his crane career when he joined Stanley Davies Crane Hire in 1976, which became part ofHewden Stuart.



He progressed through the organisation to become operations manager he left the company in 1983 but returned in 1993 as operations manager Heavy Cranes Division based in Castleford. He moved again after Finning acquired Hewden and began making changes going to Ainscough Crane Hire for a while. He then re-joined Hewden in 2000 as crane manager at its Corus, Scunthorpe location becoming quality manager for the company in 2003. In 2009 he moved to Baldwins Crane Hire as depot supervisor, followed by a short spell at Mammoet before settling into an operations role at tower crane company HTC as accessories manager for Reco hoists, a job he held until his

One ex-colleague said of him: "I knew Chris from my time as depot manager at Hewden's Willenhall depot in Birmingham, and I always found him to be helpful, supportive and he was always willing to lend an ear when required."

Other comments posted on Vertikal.net include:

"So sad to hear this. I can still remember exactly what his voice sounded like, even now. I had the pleasure of working and dealing with Chris when I was a young man learning the business at Hewden Stuart. Such a lovely, lovely guy. My sincere condolences to his family."

"Probably not many crane manufacturers around now who knew and appreciated Chris. Sad News. Met him recently ironically at a funeral. We had a good relationship and he was always a pleasure to speak with. He had a great technical knowledge of cranes and transport and always on top of his game. I wish his family strength to get through this sad and difficult time."

"I am deeply shocked at the sad passing of one of the industries nice guys."

"We always used to deal with Chris, when we had our first 200 ton Demag crane on many a Hewden Tower crane cross-hire. Chris was always a pleasure to talk to on the hiredesk. For all at NMT especially the ex-Hewden guys, you will be greatly missed. Thoughts are with your family."
